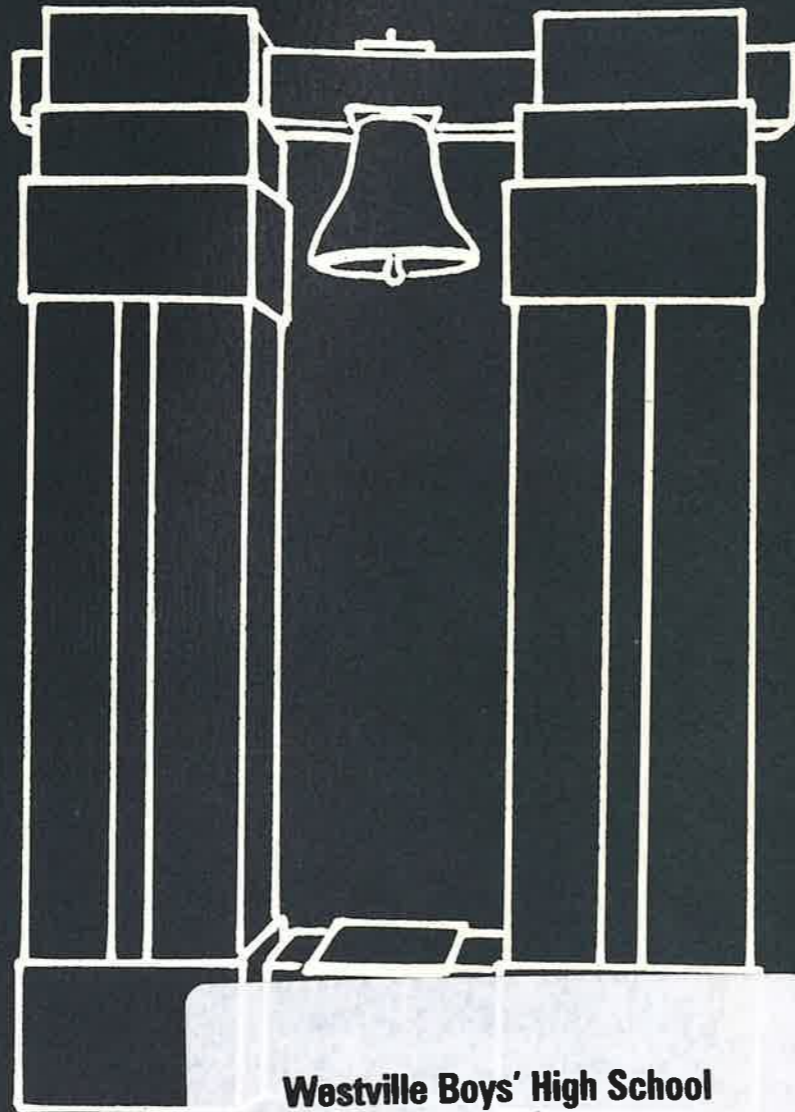



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ANNUAL SPEECH DAY & PRIZE GIVING

It is customary to invite senior boys to present short addresses at the annual prizegiving. This year both A. Colvin and P. Hirsch delivered light-hearted, amusing speeches.

A. Colvin concerned himself directly with the concept of Humour itself. He stated that in the difficult times which we are presently experiencing, humour has a tremendous relevance. Humour, like language can serve to blanket the terrible ugliness of the world. In asking how humour works, Colvin gave various explanations and cited anecdotes to substantiate his theories.

Amongst other things, he said that laughter is often the escape route for irreconcilable tension or humour may result from a logic which is inconsistent with a given situation. Inappropriate use of language easily arises out of a misunderstanding of the complexities of English expressions and results in humour. Ambiguity is, similarly, one of the most common causes of humour especially when the intention is to be serious or informative. Finally, much depends on the attitude of the spectators as to whether or not a situation is humorous.

P. Hirsch invited the Matrics to reflect upon their schooldays and to indulge in the flood of pleasant memories which this would entail. The audience was then entertained with an overview of a typical schoolboy career. This included such important milestones as initiation, the educative experiences afforded by rubic cubes and electronic games, selected accounts of the sadistic

intentions of teachers and such infamous occurrences as "the Great Berry Throwing Affair at Assembly". Hirsch emphasised the common grounding with which all Westville matriculants were equipped before wishing his peers well in their separate journeys into the future.

The Headmaster, Mr R.W. Couzens, in his address, dealt with what he regards as the Problem of Parenthood. Too often the Youth is criticised without delving deeper to understand the reasons for the perturbing standards of behaviour. Mr Couzens suggested that parental and societal pressure on children to achieve and perform is so great that it ultimately generates a negative response. Thus the youth appear to opt out when they reach the adolescent years or they seek refuge in conforming with their peer group. Mr Couzens stressed moderation and the need to achieve a balance between performance and relaxation, which allows time for self development. Parents need rather to exert strong discipline than to passively allow their children to do as they please.

Finally Mr Couzens pointed out that the real purpose of his criticism, was to urge the 1985 Matrics to approach their futures with a sense of purpose and then he expressed his thanks to all those concerned with the school community.

After the prizes were presented by Mr R. Mountain, the Head Prefect, S. Schnell, delivered his message to the School before closing the ceremony.

1. ACCOUNTING

1985 Business Game

A combination of careful decisions and team participation helped the team through the preliminary round into the quarter-finals where they were beaten by a meagre R600. cerned with Art, organised workshops and had articles published in magazines.

Pupils

A number of pupils were prize-winners in art competitions and had their work displayed in the Municipal Library at Westville. The Matric exhibition proved to be a proud climax for our hardworking and talented class of boys.

Development

Part of the Art Department moved to new premises which were altered to accommodate the arrival of an electric kiln. The School hopes to offer ceramics to some Standard 6 pupils in 1986 and it should be a fully integrated subject by 1988.

General

1985 saw an unprecedented response from the Standard 7 pupils who were encouraged to experiment with various printing techniques including silk screening, calligraphy, photography and graphic design.

With parental support such as it is, the Art Department is assured of a creative future. It is hoped that Painting, Sculpture, Photography and Ceramics will be offered to all pupils in the near future. 1986 will see some Matriculants submitting photographs in the practical examination, while our Standard 6 classes will try their hands at ceramics.

4. AUDIO-VISUAL AUDITORIUM

Work is almost complete on the conversion of our Team-Teaching Room to a fully equipped audio-visual auditorium holding 165 pupils. This is the largest single project that the Trust plans to embark upon this year, and it will provide exciting possibilities for the School for years to come.

The impetus for this project is the changing nature of education. Team-teaching should become a reality in the near future and the audio-visual room will make this effective.

We are envisaging the creation of three audio-visual rooms with seating capacity of 165, 60 and 25. The largest, the present team-teaching room, will be the major project. In this venue we hope to provide the following amenities:

- * Comfortable, but functional seating and writing space for 165 boys.
- * Slide projector and 16mm film projector.
- * Video projector.
- * Overhead projector.
- * Audio system.
- * Infra-red control system to operate these.

This facility would allow the teacher a multi-faceted approach to the teaching of his subject to five or six classes at a time. He would be able to prepare illustrations on slides, have back-up films or videos to deepen the response of the audience, use the overhead projector to demonstrate on-the-spot problems, and he would be able to operate these and interchange them with the press of a button. This speed and ease of operation would not only make the task of the teacher easier and more efficient, but would cut down on time spent on setting up machines, and hence increase productive teaching time.

The other two smaller venues would not have the full range of equipment of the larger venue, but still have slide, film and video facilities available.

The main auditorium will not only have these facilities available, but will allow for the screening of material through a new approach: rear screen projection. Instead of the normal method of projecting, from the back of the hall, onto a screen, our new audio-visual auditorium will have all the equipment locked in a room behind the screen. The screen is in fact a glass window

covered with a special screen material so that the image, rather than be reflected off a surface, is projected through the screen at the audience. This system has two main advantages: it allows for expensive equipment to be safely locked away from the inquisitive prodding fingers of the demolition experts: the pupils; it also allows for projection into a lighted auditorium. This latter point is important. If the room lighting can be turned up during the screening, it allows pupils to write while they are watching the video or movie. In this way, the watching process does not become merely a passive learning process, but through the note taking task, becomes an active learning process.

We have hoped, in planning this facility (and this is only the first stage in an ongoing development process), to ensure that its functional value is of prime importance. We want an audio-visual auditorium which is used educationally, not a cinema for entertainment; we want a facility that will provide for the needs of the future, not for the wants of today.

We think we have set the foundation for a teaching facility which can meet the needs of the present, and grow to become the hub of the scholastic life at W.B.H.S. in the future.

5. BIOLOGY

Standard 8 and 9 pupils visited the Beachwood Mangrove Swamps to study the unique ecological environment of this ecosystem, and the associated plant and animal communities.

A total of eleven boys of the Standard 8 Biology class entered Science Expo 1985 and five entries received prizes.

6. COMPUTERS

The Computer Department continues to thrive. During the year, the School was fortunate to receive a further supply of six Apple Computers supplied by the Education Department, bringing the full complement to thirteen. A second computer room is now envisaged.

A computer literacy course of one period per week was introduced for Standard 7 pupils, the topics covered being elementary programming in Logo, word-processing and the use of spreadsheets and data bases. This

course will be extended to the Standard 6 classes next year.

Pupils of all standards have access to the computers during the afternoon sessions. One encouraging feature has been the use by the pupils of these facilities in compiling projects in a wide variety of subjects.

7. COUNSELLING

During the course of the year, the Matrics have been addressed by a number of speakers on a wide variety of careers. Many of the talks were accompanied by a slide-tape presentation, and pamphlets were available for those requesting further information. The Rotary Club of Pinetown held a Careers Information Week in June, during which over 50 careers were discussed and explained. It is also encouraging to note that many more pupils are making use of the Bursary and Career Information Files available in the Counselling Department.

8. ENGLISH

The English Department again in 1985 was involved in a number of extra-curricular activities.

a) English Olympiad

Although 10 candidates were entered, none was placed. Unfortunately this competition seems to have limited appeal for W.B.H.S. pupils despite its very real academic advantages, not to mention the generous prizes on offer.

b) Alan Paton Literary Competition

Westville continues to be a very strong force in this competition. Our Standard 9 winner of 1984, A. de Waard, was unfortunately knocked out in the early rounds of the Standard 10 competition, but in the Standard 9 competition, P. Willies came second in the semi-final round, and G. Davel won the semi-final round, to go through to the finals.

c) Alan Paton Creative Writing Competition

In this phase, Westville was not as successful as in the public speaking phase. Although we submitted some exciting pieces, particularly from Standard 8, no candidates were successful.

d) Jan Hofmeyr Speech Contest

J. Krause, our contestant for this year, did very well for his first year in the competition, to reach the second round.

e) Rotary Team-Speaking Competition

Learning from our mistakes from 1984, our junior team of P. Hunter, M. Blewett, M. Chabant and C. Havemann emerged winners in their section. Unfortunately, the junior section is not run on a knock-out basis and hence there is no grand finale. This team should, however, do very well when they are seniors.

Our senior team of G. Young, A. Colvin and R. Witton-Smith won their first round, but then was surprisingly knocked out in the second round.

f) Shell Public Speaking Competition

The popularity of public speaking, and the strength of our candidates, were clearly shown in this competition where 12 contestants competed in an internal contest in order to pick 2 candidates to represent the School in the senior competition. B. Mountain and R. Witton-Smith both reached the semi-final round, with Witton-Smith going on to the finals.

The Standard 8 team of G. Davel, B. Bell and J. Strydom produced excellent team efforts, winning their section.

g) Rhetoric

A large number of senior boys attended a 10 week course on communication presented by Professor Sneddon. This course initiated the boys in the fundamentals of communication and persuasion, laying the foundations for greater self-confidence in public speaking and daily discourse.

h) Speech Festival

An innovation this year was the participation by pupils in Standards 6 and 7 in the annual Speech and Drama Festival. The entrants produced work of an exceptionally high standard.

The highlight of our Festival was a play written, performed and produced by members of Standard 7A. Their efforts were rewarded by an A++ grade from an outside adjudicator, Miss T. Hughes.

It is hoped that this will become an annual feature of our drama calendar.

9. HISTORY

G. Davel presented a paper entitled, *Zimbabwe: An unfulfilled revolution?*, at the Young Historians' Conference. He was placed first in the Regional Conference and

achieved third position in Natal at the finals which were held at the University of Natal. A stimulating morning was experienced by all the boys who attended the Conference.

10. LATIN

In September, the Latin pupils attended a "Latin Evening" at Howard College Theatre, hosted by the Classics Department of the University of Natal. The evening afforded an opportunity to meet Latin pupils from other Durban schools as well as Pietermaritzburg. The Standard 7 class presented a play, written in Latin and produced by themselves. Several of our junior pupils were commended on their work or received awards for projects submitted.

11. MATHEMATICS

a) Mathematics Olympiad

Ten of our pupils entered the first round of the Mathematics Olympiad. Although they performed creditably, none was successful in winning through to the final round.

b) Mathematics Lectures

C. Meijer was the School's representative at an evening of lectures which were prepared and presented by pupils from Durban and surrounding areas. The evening was organised by the Natal Mathematics Teachers' Association. Meijer was highly commended for his presentation.

12. RESOURCE CENTRE

1985 has seen growth in a number of areas in the Resource Centre. With the regular help of Mrs Johnson we have continued extending our slide collection and have also augmented our audio-visual equipment in this area. Our other non-book material collections include Tape Recordings, Video-Recordings, Gramophone Records, Films, Pamphlets, Periodicals, Work Cards, Illustrations and Cuttings. Our book stock has continued to expand. One of our priorities for this year was the building up of our Afrikaans section and this collection now exceeds a thousand books. At the time of writing this report our total book stock is numbered at 11 037.

Our thanks to Mesdames S. Miller, L. Young and J. Adams for giving of their time to assist in the December 84 stocktaking.

The third term saw the return of Mrs E. Wilson, after an absence of 10 years, to the Westville Boys' High Staff while Miss K. Kearns enjoyed a term's long leave.

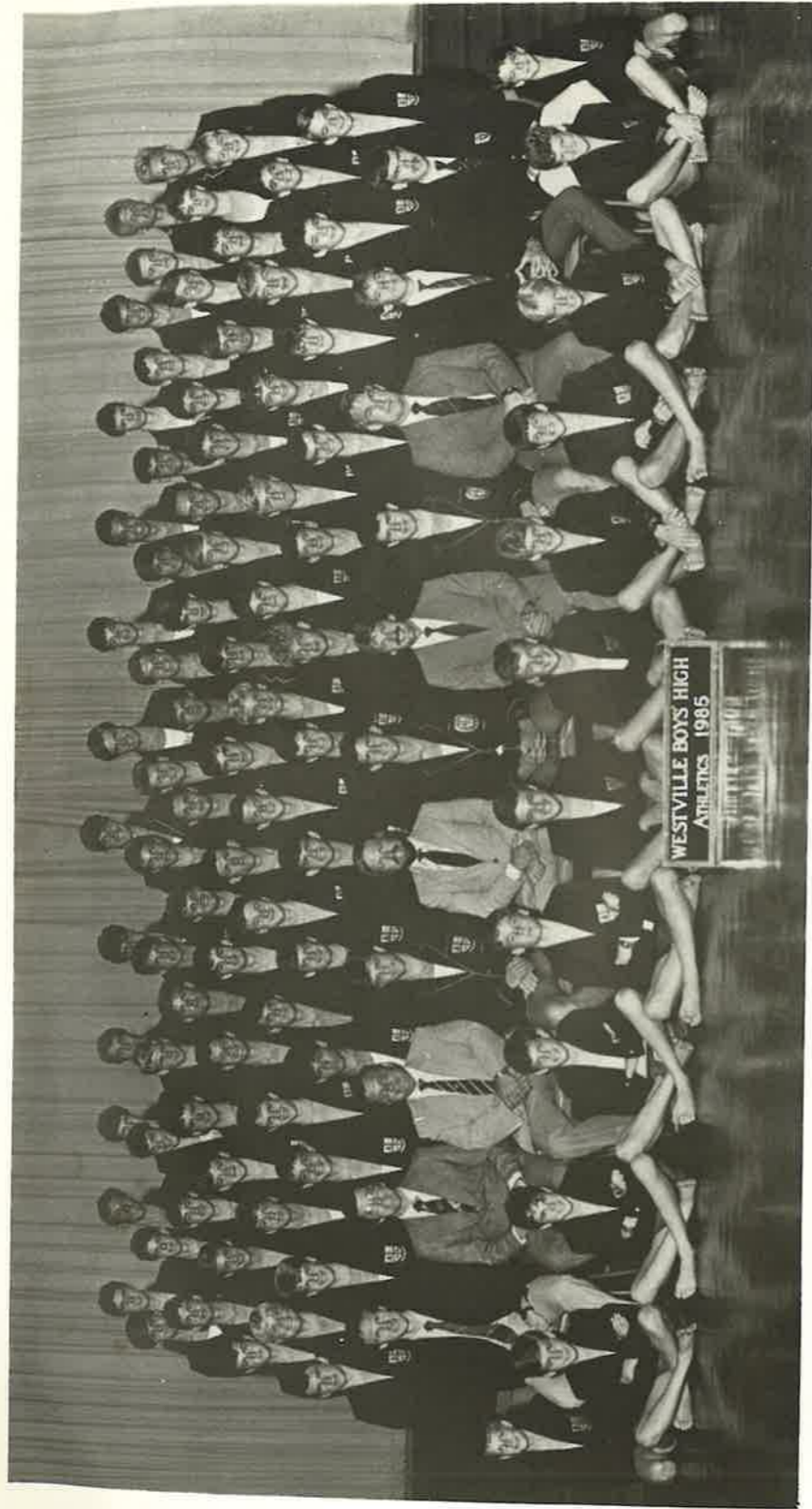
It is obvious from these results that Westville Boys' High Athletics has attained a position of prominence.

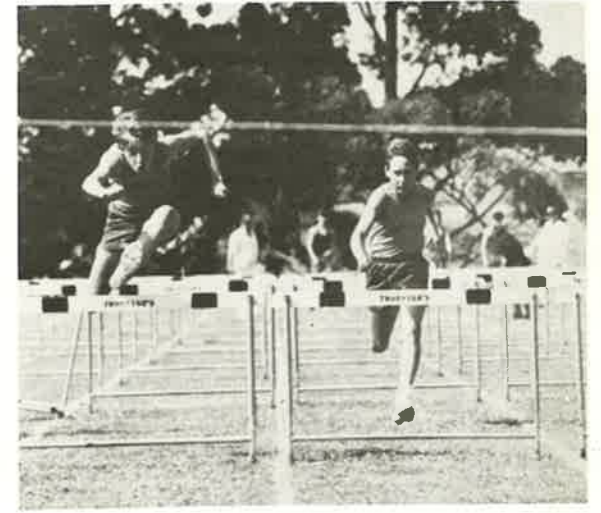

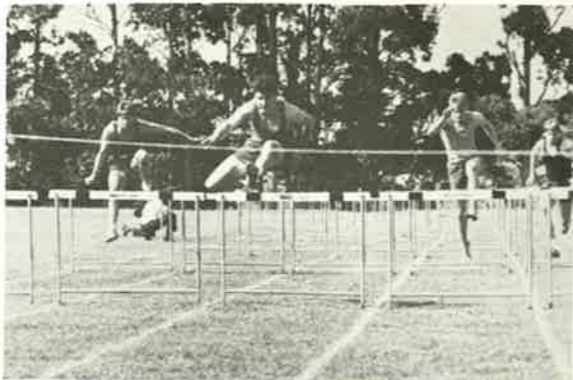

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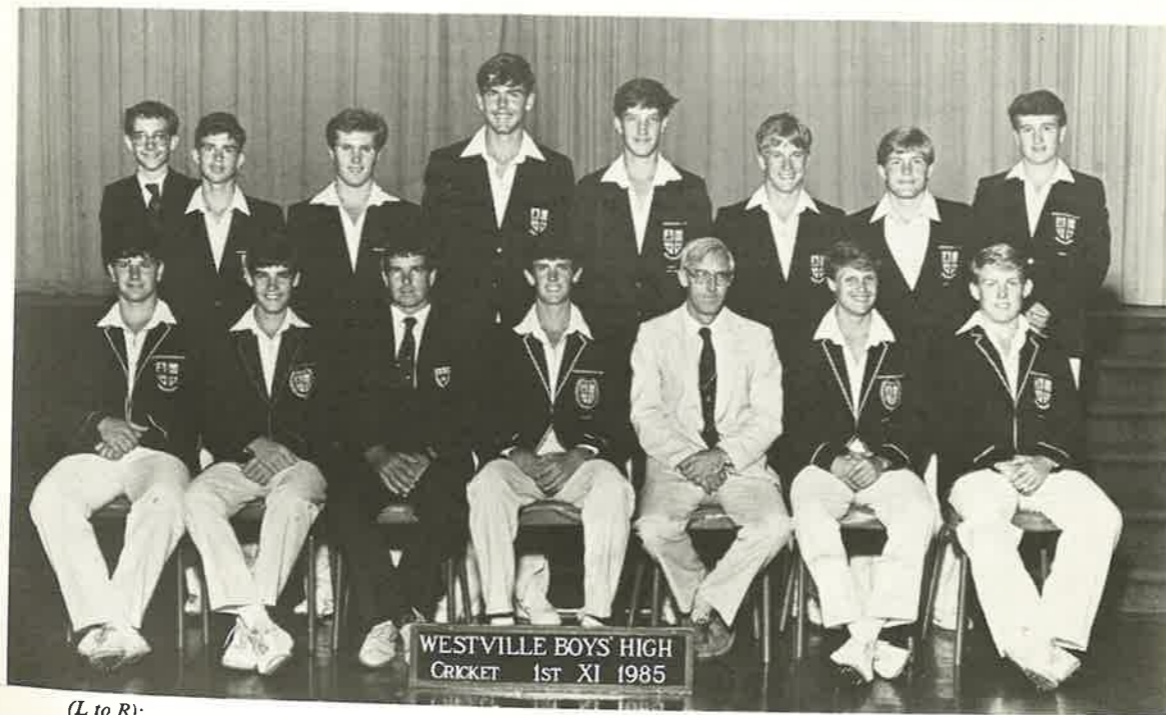

Team Report:

This team's remarkable run of success, which began at last year's Offord Week, continued throughout 1985 and enabled a very good overall record to be established. The nine victories were all achieved in convincing style and, since the two deserved defeats early in the first term, the side has never appeared to be in any danger of losing another match.

Although the team's success was largely due to the talents and achievements of a minority of the players, the team as a unit at last believed in their ability, and had the inspiration to play positive,

winning cricket. Of the players to make marked progress during the year, Arthur, Vine-Morris, Palm and Horne, due to their dedication, determination and pride were well rewarded. The obvious talents of Webber have yet to be fully realised, while useful contributions came from Le Roux and Kriese.

The first term provided a lot of excitement and a series of thrilling finishes ensured a most pleasing start to the year. Beachwood was hanging on grimly in an eventful final over in which two sharp catches were grassed, while the moderate targets of St Henry's and Alexandra were only reached due to some good batting in a race against time. With a little more responsibility and application by some batsmen, the DHS fixture could also have been won — nevertheless, it was a fine game of cricket with Westville just short of the target at stumps. The first defeat, to a very ordinary Glenwood side, and the second to a Kearsney team that exploited a deteriorating pitch, were due to batting collapses and were thoroughly deserved.

During the Michaelmas holidays the team conducted a most successful tour of the Border and recorded good wins against Cambridge, Dale in a night game, and Queens, followed by defeats of Queensburgh, Grosvenor and then by bowling out Northlands with only two balls remaining. The D.H.S. fixture again ended in a draw with Westville displaying the inability to bowl out their opponents after dictating the day's activities.

The major strength of this team was its batting, and overall, the successful efforts of the upper order denied the middle order batsmen the opportunity to display their skills more regularly. The run-hungry Arthur had an outstanding year and his success has been conclusively proven. This fine young batsman has a magnificent technique, perfect timing and remarkable powers of concentration, and he produced many outstanding innings. Most notable were his two undefeated centuries and he scored a further nine half-centuries. His consistency and importance to the team over the years has been invaluable, and with his present modesty and dedication, he has the ability to succeed at higher levels of cricket.

Vine-Morris, who promised so much for a long time, partly fulfilled his ability during the year. Although not making really big scores, his steady influence as an opening partner to Arthur was vitally important to his side, as he contributed some useful totals. Although his captaincy was at

times questioned, his tactical awareness and appreciation was, as far as school's cricket is concerned, excellent, and he has led his team with distinction. Stewart, promoted from the Colts for the Tour made an immediate impact at this level with his attractive strokemaking to score almost 300 runs, and he proved to be a capable wicket-keeper. He is a natural attacking batsman who hits the ball very hard and yet possesses a fine defence. Webber, also a good strokemaker who continues to be promising, still gives the impression that he needs to think about his game rather more in order to eliminate unnecessary errors in his technique. With a young side next year, and given more opportunities, his experience and responsibility will be severely tested.

Of the other batsmen, Scott had little success at number three, while Le Roux, with his aggressive and impetuous approach, made some valuable scores. Palm also displayed the ability to hit the ball hard and far while Exsteen, a fine team member with batting talent was unable to score consistently, despite a few opportunities.

At the beginning of the year, there was a desperate need for a strike bowler to partner Witton-Smith, and it was indeed fortunate that Palm, an exchange student from Australia, was able to fill

this role. He is a strongly built right arm bowler with a heart to match, prepared to keep going for long periods. He certainly deserved greater success than the 34 wickets he took all year. He also developed considerably in all-round capacity, and his outfielding was a pleasure to watch and a fine example to his fellow team members. Witton-Smith who promised so much at the start of the year, was wayward, less penetrative, and with his unpredictable form, had a very disappointing year. His only performance of any note was that when he took six wickets to win the match against Northlands.

Horne, with his vast potential as an orthodox left-arm spinner, was underbowed and so enjoyed limited success. He needs to be able to bowl for long periods with tighter control of length — he will be a vital part of the attack next year. Vine-Morris, although rather lacking in penetration again bowled his off-spinners with a little success while Kriese, who also tended to be underbowed, took some important wickets with his deceptive seam and swing bowling.

A personality the 1st XI has to thank is Ian Airey who again gave up many hours of his time to score for the second year. His quiet disposition, loyalty and scoring ability is most appreciated.

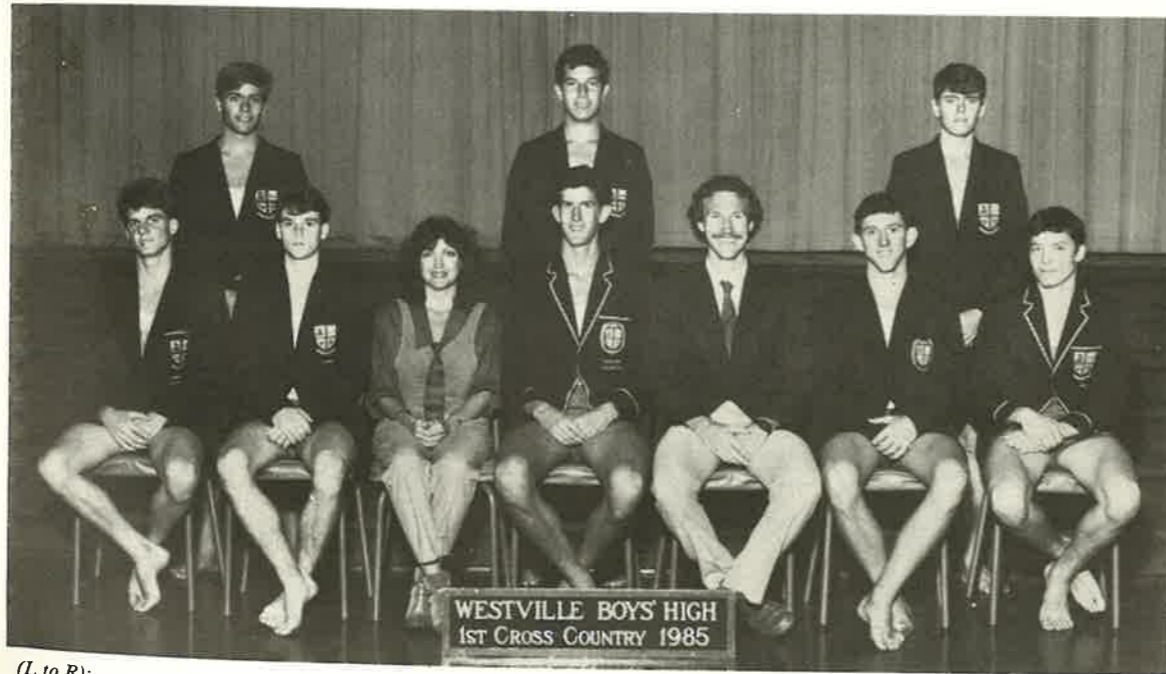

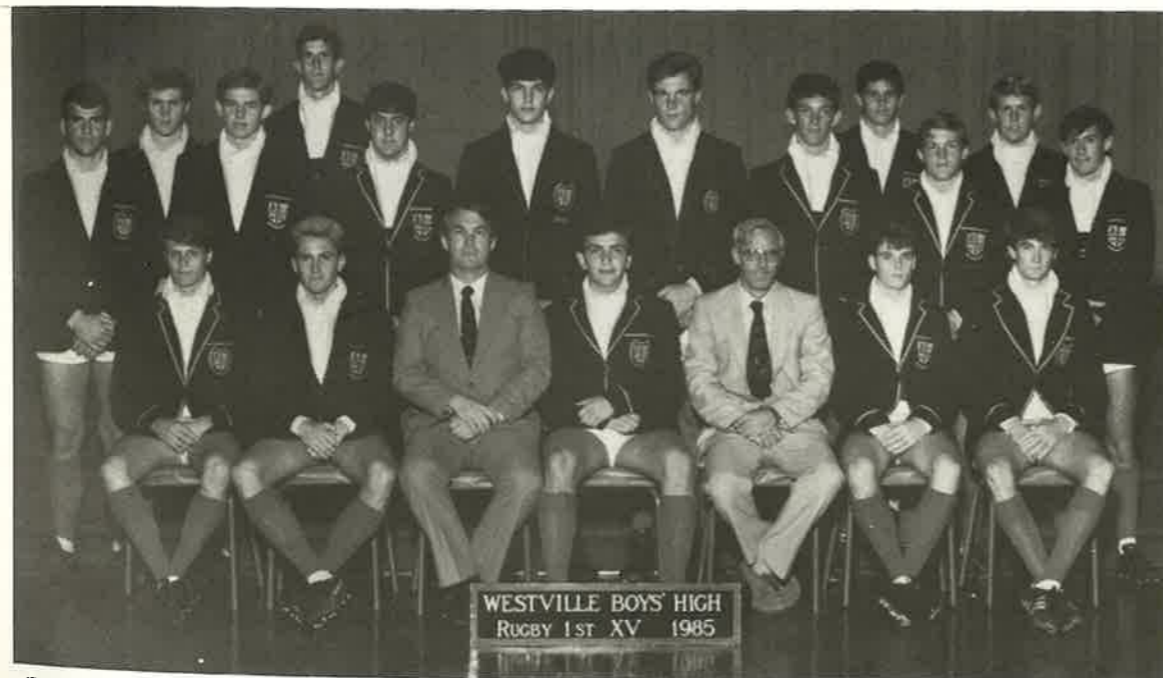

Perhaps the key note of the season was the steady improvement in the standard of play, both by individuals and the team as a whole.



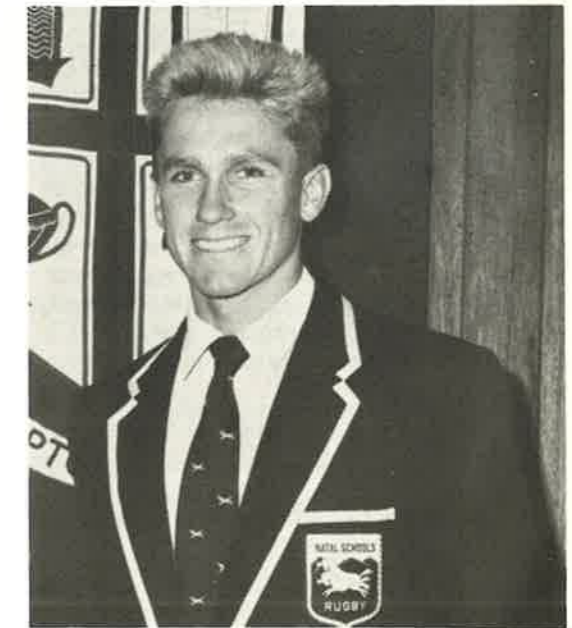

The locks Platford and Van Rooyen won plenty of lineout ball and were often prominent with strong driving runs, particularly off the back of the lineout. Both richly deserved their honours awards and Platford is to be congratulated on his selection for the Natal Schools' team.

The loose trio of Kreinacke, Lang and Fry were always in the thick of things. Kreinacke tackled well and grafted in the tight, while Lang dominated the back of the lineout and had many strong runs in the loose, but poor passing sometimes ended moves prematurely. Slack on the left wing scored 10 tries, many with electrifying runs. drop goal but S.A.C.S. replied with a penalty to make the score 3-3 at half time.

together half the length of the field, either to set up a try or score themselves.

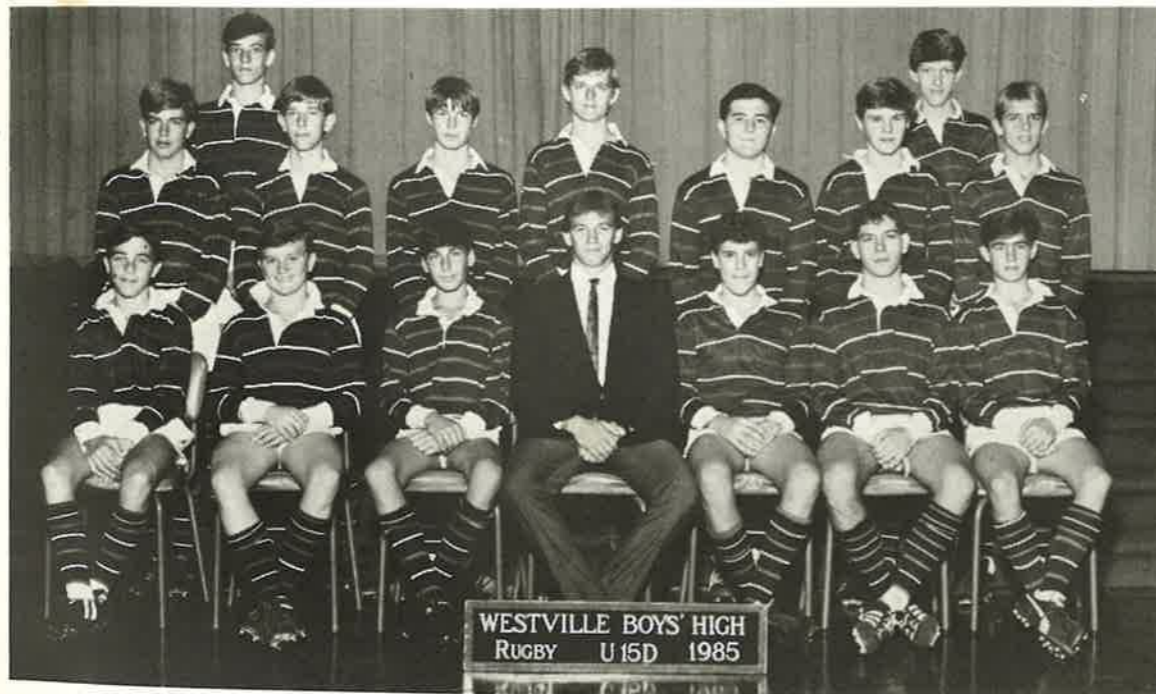

Koenig were selected for the Natal Schools' Under 15 side.

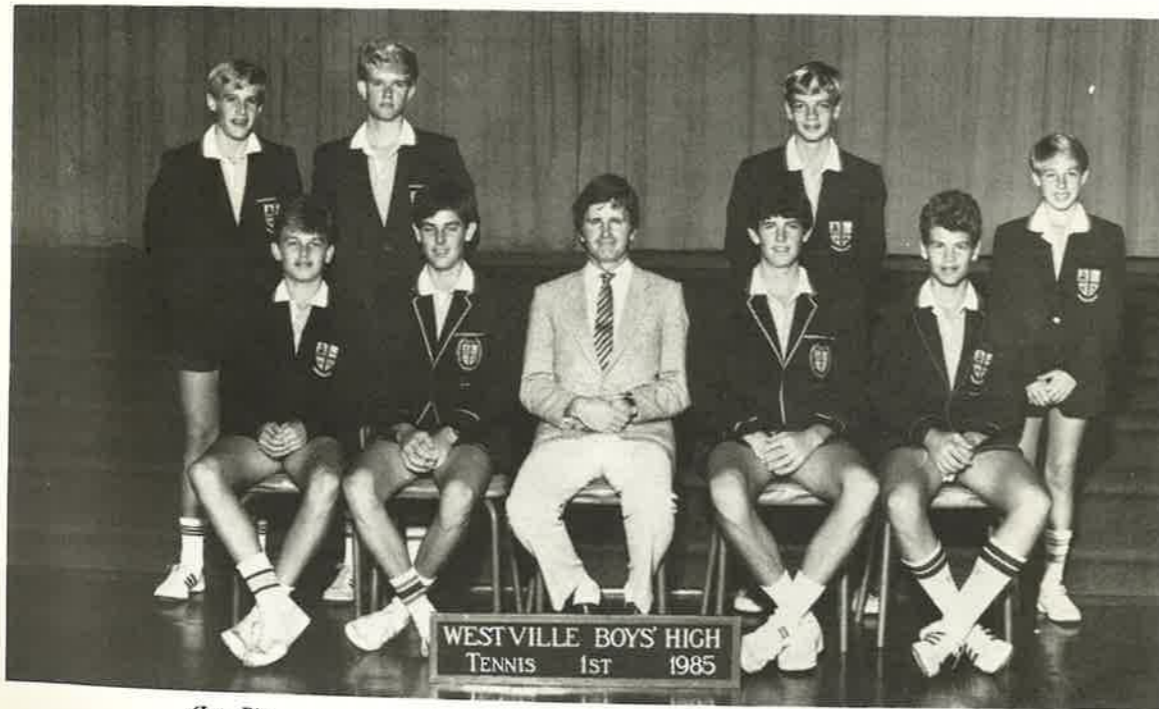
W. Manning proved to be a most able and respected captain of the first team. The interest and enthusiasm displayed especially by the juniors and the social players was another encouraging feature of the season.

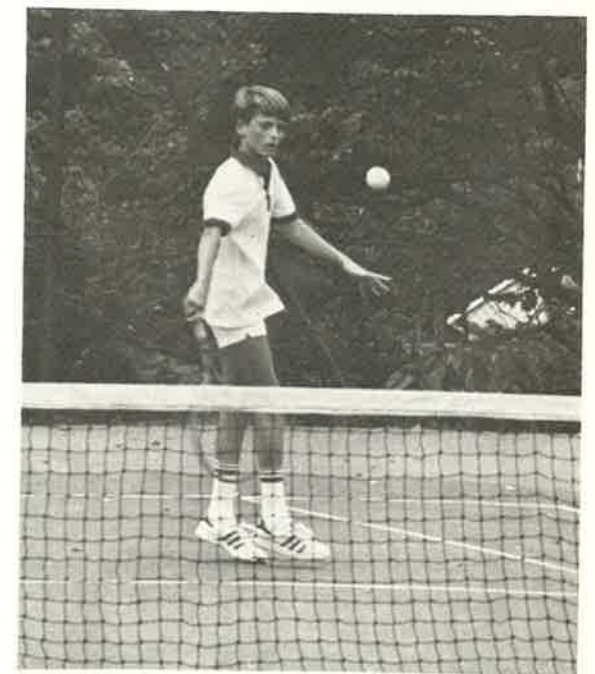

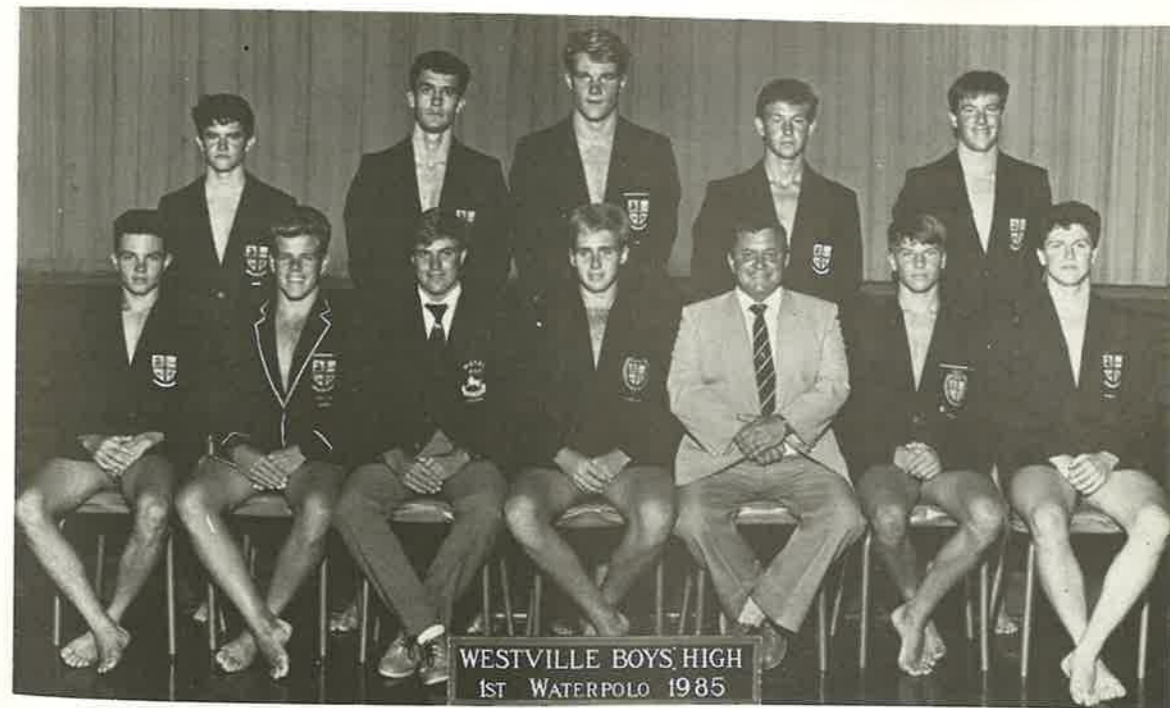

Photographic Club

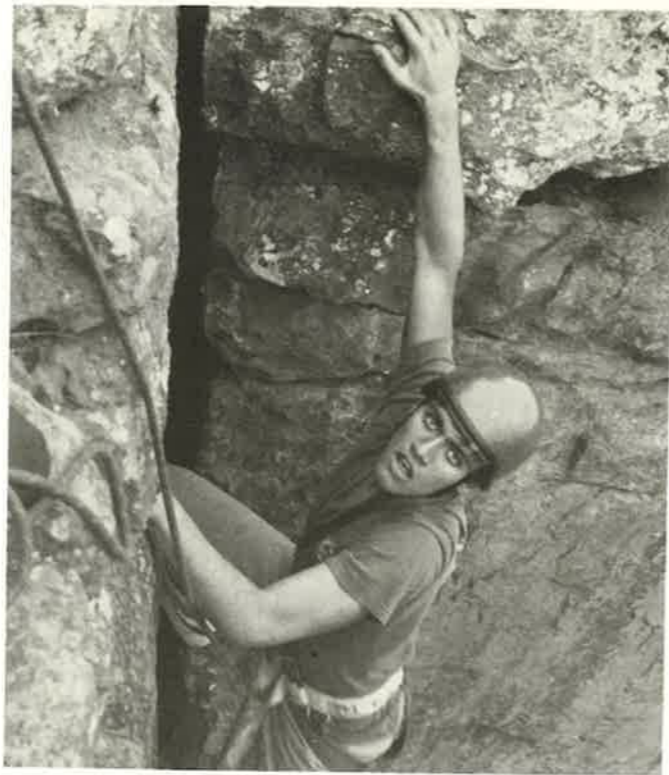
