HEADMASTER'S ADDRESS AT SPEECH NIGHT 2005

Good evening ladies & gentlemen, guest of honour- Gareth Morgan, and the Matrics of 2005.

2005 is a major milestone in our history, marking our 50 years as a high school, and an eventful year it certainly has been. To sum it up in a few words, I would say that this has been a year made up of 5 major elements – campus development, technological upgrades, unprecedented sporting success, curriculum development and increased political interference in education – all carrying with them both euphoria and frustration to a greater or lesser extent.



At the outset, I would like to thank all those people who have contributed to our success this year.

To the Governing Body, under the chairmanship and direction of Peter Dixon. You have maintained the exceptional standard of governance which makes us the envy of other schools. Thank you for your sound judgement, professionalism and the valuable time and energy which you devote to this School, without monetary reward. A special word of gratitude to Neil Nothard for his role in securing the funding which will culminate in our magnificent new Multi-Purpose Centre in the near future.

To our major sponsor Pharos Medical Plan, and particularly the late Gerald Sweidan; to the Trustees of the Educational Trust under Brian Thomas; the Trust Campaign Committee under Paul Armer; the WBH Trust chaired by Nicky Armstrong; and the Association led by Andre Fitt. Thank you for your immense contribution – you remain crucial to our continued success.

To the parents who are always there when we need them, whether it be organising, catering, transporting or donating. We appreciate your role and your support.

I am deeply indebted to our committed teachers and our efficient administration and estate's staff. As the activities in this School grow, so too do the demands placed on them. My thanks to the directorship team, Anthony Ash, Jennie Bircher, Trevor Cowie, Alan Miller, Reg Pennefather, Nestor Pierides and Tom Stokes and to the entire staff for their dedication and commitment. We know we are ahead of the game when it comes to the curriculum change which we will welcome next year. Thank you for the thought and care you have put into this process and for always going the extra mile.

And to the Matrics – the Class of 2005. Well, I'll come back to that later.



This being our 50th year as a high school, I looked back on the Headmaster's Addresses at Prize-givings of the past half century, commencing with Mr. Bowden's speeches from the 1950's and '60's. The reports focus on enhancing the high academic standards, increasing the sporting and holistic experience, and acknowledging the hard work of volunteer fund-raisers. In part they also mentioned concerns that are similar to the ones we have today, including cramped conditions, decreased government spending, and behavioural issues, but in those days those issues centered on smoking, buzz-bikes and the abuse of bashers. For the information of the boys here tonight, those were the things the pupils wore on their heads as part of the school uniform in those days. Be thankful you have not had to worry about them.

After speaking to some of our academic under-achievers at the end of last term, I took solace in the words of Mr Bowden who said in 1960, and I quote: "With scant sympathy, I must warn parents not to be unduly impressed by two or three weeks' hectic swotting just before an examination. Those who endeavour to do a year's work in a fortnight merely make a bad situation worse."

So, who said poor work ethic was only a modern occurrence?

In paying tribute to his hard-working teachers, Mr. Bowden stated that 'teaching in these times is no easy task'. He warned about the dangers of pupils 'going steady at an absurdly early age' and he was also not happy about the abuse of the school uniform, Again I quote: 'Periodically someone comes to school wearing a pair of yellow shoes or something in suede. When challenged, he says his mother bought them and he has no others. Whatever mother's views are on shoes, she knows full well that she is encouraging her son to defy authority.'

Mr Bowden also spoke about a new construction in Westville – the municipal Swimming pool, and its social effect on the youth. He said: 'I am disturbed to find that the schoolwork of a number of keen swimmers has deteriorated considerably since the opening of the bath.' And he also lamented the wasted time spent in cinemas, in milk-bars or at the ice-rink.

In 1963, Mr Commons announced the completion of the School Hall, the history of which mirrors that of our current Multi-Purpose Centre. He said: '1963 saw the completion of a project which the School has long awaited and the lack of which our past students have felt grievously. I refer, of course, to the Hall. The Hall has been in construction for a long time – considerably more than a year – but has been well worth waiting for.'

I must admit that I found reading the reports of those early Headmasters, right up to those of my predecessor Ted Maddams, quite therapeutic. But what struck me above all else was the care that they displayed in creating and building, in the words of Roy Couzens, 'this damn fine institution'.

Had I wanted to address you on the nature of high school education in the new millennium, I could have used Mr Bowden's and Mr Commons' addresses verbatim tonight. I could have simply substituted a few things such as night clubs for milk bars, cell-phones for buzz-bikes, Pavilion Shopping Complex for Swimming Pool, or Multi-Purpose Centre for School Hall.



The fact that those Headmasters said those things 50 years ago proves that the major objectives

of good discipline, moral values, high academic standards, and sporting excellence have been with us for the past five decades.

As I pondered their remarks, I wondered whether Mr Bowden or the other excellent Headmasters, Governing Bodies, fund-raisers, staff and pupils who followed him, would have appreciated the roles they played in ensuring 50 years of excellence here at WBHS.

I wonder whether they would have been able to connect the dots from 1955 to 2005, which have led us to our position today – the position of a nationally-respected boys' high school, leading the way in not only Academics, but in the holistic education we value so highly, with technological and teaching facilities that we would never have dreamed of 50 or even 5 years ago.

With hindsight, it is easy to see how each generation has added value to WBHS. However, looking forward from 1955 I expect it would have been impossible to predict the journey we ended up taking over the 50 years which followed.

This concept of 'connecting the dots' was a message that Steve Jobs, the founder of Apple Computers, gave to graduates at Stanford University in the USA this year, but it is a message that is also applicable to the young men sitting here in front of me tonight, as they embark on an exciting and daunting new phase in their lives.

Steve Jobs said that it was ironic that he, a university drop-out, should be giving a speech to successful graduates at one of the world's prestigious universities. His story is one of connecting the dots. Looking back, his first dots were put in place before he was born. He was given up for adoption to a couple who battled financially, yet still promised his mother that they would make sure he would get a university education.

Steve ended up at an expensive university, but after 6 months of not enjoying this experience, and feeling guilty of using up his adoptive parents' savings, he took the scary decision to drop out. He simply stopped attending the required lectures that did not interest him, but he then dropped into the ones that looked more interesting. And, by following his curiosity and intuition, he did stumble into something that turned out to be priceless later on. And that was Calligraphy – the art of lettering and typefaces – a discipline that appeared to have no relevance to his life. But ten years later, when designing the first Mackintosh computer, it all came back to him. And he designed it all into the Apple Mac – the first computer with perfect typography.



If Steve Jobs had never dropped into that single course at university, the Mac would never have had multiple typefaces or proportionally spaced fonts. And since Windows copied the Mac, it is likely that no personal computer would have had them either.

Of course, it was impossible for him to connect the dots looking forward when he was in his twenties. But it was very, very clear to him looking backwards 10 years later. So, in his words: 'You have to trust that the dots will somehow connect in your future. You have to trust in something – your gut, your destiny, life, karma, whatever'.

Maybe you can look back over the past five years and try to connect your own dots that have brought you to this point sitting here tonight. Please do not think that Steve Jobs is suggesting that you drop out of Matric right now. I must stress that he did matriculate. But thinking back over the past five years, maybe you can identify the effect of certain things that happened in your

life, however insignificant they may have seemed at the time. Maybe Mr Lichkus did you a favour by tearing up your pathetic work of Art in Grade 8, or maybe Mrs. McHale did you a favour by keeping you at School until midnight to perfect your Drama pracs. Maybe it was the rancorous personal lectures given to you by Mr Miller, Mr Pierides or Mr Jennings that made the difference. Maybe you were fortunate enough to be jolted out of your academic complacency last year if you were in Mrs Dovey's class when she tried her extreme crowd-surfing stunt. Maybe it was all the quiet reflection time you had in detention, or the occasions when you should have been studying but didn't – maybe it will be times like that which will affect your future in some way.

Steve Jobs' story of connecting the dots does not end there. After building up Apple Computers and releasing their finest creation to date – the Macintosh, he publicly and quickly got fired by his own shareholders. His reaction was simply to start over again. He did not see it then, but getting fired from Apple was the best thing that happened to him. The burden of success was replaced by the lightness of being a beginner again and this freed him to enter one of the most creative periods of his life. He moved into creating computer-animated feature films and developed the technology that made movies such as Toy Story the benchmark for modern-day animated movies. The irony is that his new company, NeXT, was then bought out by Apple, and this moved Apple into the most creative phase in its history. As a result, in addition to our new cell-phones, we now have the ubiquitous iPod as one of our necessary appendages.

One might say that Steve Jobs is fortunate because he has a certain ability, but I think that would be too simplistic. What makes the difference in his case in the long run is his attitude of always bouncing back, of seeing things through to the end, and his mission to be passionate about producing great work.

Success is much more than ability. Modern research is showing that success in connecting the dots of your life is more about interest, attitudes and values.



Business expert, Chuck Russell, tells us that traditional ways of predicting success in the workplace are now being discredited. In the past those people with lesser 'ability' or 'intelligence' were perceived to be more limited, while those who were thought to have a lot of 'ability' were expected to do almost anything well. And that if they did not, then they simply had to be trained and motivated or offered an incentive.

However, businesses are now getting wise to the fact that they are making huge mistakes in employing people on the basis of perceived ability and intelligence alone. In any one population of people, whether it comprises managers, or salesmen or accountants or Rugby players, you will find the 'top' performers, the 'okay' performers and the 'questionable' performers. The category where you will end up depends on you, and it will be more a factor of your personal qualities – your attitudes, values, ethics and interests – than it will be about your perceived ability or intelligence.

Yes, you do need a certain amount of skill and ability. That helps to get you through the door. But ultimately unless you have the right 'fit' in terms of personality requirements, no amount of training or motivation will turn you into a success for any sustained period of time. We have seen countless examples of actors and entertainers who lose direction, professional sportsmen with undeniable talent who never make it, or businesspeople and politicians who under-achieve and come short.

Why is this so? I actually think that most of you know the answer to that question.

The Matric group of 2005 will be remembered for raising the bar of all-round achievement. The evidence is there – think of the tremendous cultural highlight of Kismet, the success of our top academics in the Olympiads, and the best results ever of our sports teams across a wide range of disciplines. There have been the highs – the unprecedented results this year of our Swimmers at the D&D gala and those of our Rugby, Squash and Golf teams being prime examples. There have been low points too, but you had handled both extremes equally well. Thank you for the mature and positive attitude with which you have accepted both victory and defeat.

Since the start of your Grade 8 year, you rattled the cages of our traditional rivals. You noticeably left an indelible mark on this School and you are leaving a very powerful message to those who follow you – and that is that we are as good as, if not better than, our competitors. Your strong belief in your own abilities has left a lasting impression. Go and look in the record books – the results are there.

I just have one favour to ask. I know that some of you are firmly of the opinion that academics should not interfere with your education, but please translate your belief of self into similar success in the public exams which start next week.

Thank you to our student leaders under Chris Micklewood and the LRC under Wynand Greffrath and to those of you who have added value to WBHS both in the classroom and on the sports fields.



I truly hope that we at WBHS have helped you put your dots in place. I trust that we have positively influenced not only the skills and abilities that you will take with you, but more importantly the core values and attitudes that will ultimately determine your success. So keep looking until you find what you are looking for. Don't settle for second-best.

And when you do look back at some stage in the future, I trust that you will realize how the dots of your life fell into place.

To Mr Morgan, thank you for taking time out of your busy schedule to join us tonight. It is a great honour and a privilege to see such an accomplished and proud old boy returning to his school. I understand that you may not accept gifts over the value of R200, so would you please accept this small token of our appreciation.

I would personally like to thank everyone who has helped me through the year. It has been extremely challenging and one with many highs and lows. To all my teachers, mentors and friends, thank you so much. To my parents. We know that without you both by my side, I wouldn't be here tonight. Thank you so much for everything you have done for me.

WBHS History Timeline



MILESTONES – 50 YEARS AS A HIGH SCHOOL

2005 was an important year in the School's history as it marked our 50th anniversary as a high school. It was in 1955 that Mr HW Bowden was appointed as Principal, and the School admitted its first group of Standard 6 boys and girls (i.e. Grade 8 learners).

2005 was also significant in that this was the year in which the School's physical campus became transformed forever as a result of the construction of the magnificent new Multi-Purpose Centre on the site of the old tennis courts. This was made possible as a result of a generous donation of R6m from an anonymous donor trust.

The records reflect the following milestones:

1861 The first record of the school in Westville was mentioned in Natal Mercury of 18 March 1861. The first classes were held in the meeting hall used also for Sunday Church services. This 9 by 4 metre wattle and daub structure was built by the German immigrant farmers and sited on the main Durban-Pietermaritzburg road.

1935 The next recorded date of a school in Westville was March 1 1935. On her 21st birthday, Miss Gladys Carr (later Mrs Cooke), a newly qualified teacher, rang her school bell in the same Church hall (on the site of the present town Engineer's office). She had six kindergarten pupils at the outset.

1936 Six more pupils enrolled and the school kindergarten graduated to a "Farm School" and was entitled to a provincial grant of 60 pounds per annum.

1938 The school became a Government-aided institution and moved into the back of the new administration offices, its "home" until 1941. It was at this time that the junior school's colours were decided upon- blue and white.



1941 The school was moved to Bernard's House, an old house situated on the present school site. This residence on six acres of land had been donated for educational purposes. In 1941 Miss Carr had fifty pupils and four staff members – her sister Miss Pat Carr, Mrs Selfe, Mrs Murray and Miss Cornelius. The school extended to standard IV, with standards II, III and IV grouped as one class.

1944 The school had now acquired a reputation for providing an excellent grounding and by 1944 the roll had increased to sixty-six. The provincial administration talked about opening a new school and Miss Carr decided that the days of her private school should end. Following a highly successful school concert, Miss Carr's school closed at the end of 1944.

1945 The school reopened as a provincial school with Miss Fitzgerald as Headmistress.

1947 Mr F.H. Lumsden succeeded as Principal and made it his task to fix the school grounds. In the same year the School Parents' Association was formed and, with considerable foresight, began to formulate plans for expansion. It was not long before the school was able to offer tuition at Standard V level.

1948 Mrs E. Edminson succeeded Mr Lumsden, at a time when it was decided to erect a new school on the site.

1949 By this time there were 166 pupils on the roll. With accommodation stretched to the limits, 43 younger children worked in a room above the town hall, under the guidance of Mrs Pat Stockil.

1950 On 24 January, 229 pupils assembled in the new building and on 1 March, Dr R. Banks, Director of Education, formally opened the school, exactly 15 years after Miss Carr had first inaugurated her school.

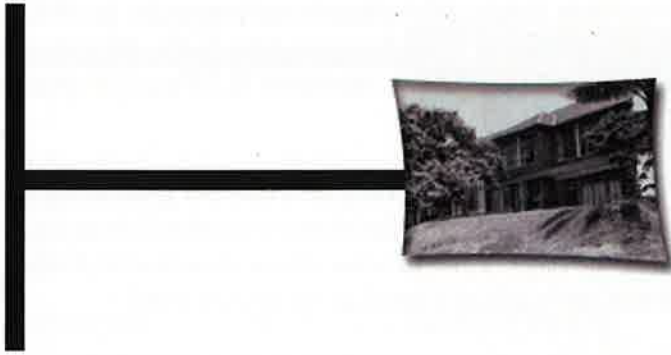
1951 Mr V. Millard became the new headmaster and remained until his retirement at the end of 1954. During this time the school grew with the same rapidity as the village. A Standard VI was added and a new wing was built on to the school.

1955 Mr N.W. Bowden became the first headmaster of Westville High School and began to lay the foundations of a secondary department and to guide the fledging school eventually to full high school status.

1956 The requisite number of pupils was reached for a standard VII class but not without considerable difficulty. By the time Mr Bowden left Westville in 1963 the roll had increased from 21 to 797, from a staff of 3 to a complement of 42. A new school uniform was designed along with a new badge.

1957 The school acquired its first memorial – the Charles Swain Memorial Bell. Gradually, physical amenities were added. Boys and girls no longer had to change for sport in the classrooms – a 'ticklish' exercise requiring careful co-ordination by staff and pupils and source of great concern to parents – as new change rooms were completed.

1959 The first matriculation class in the school's history wrote the public examination in November 1959 and achieved quite an astonishing record.



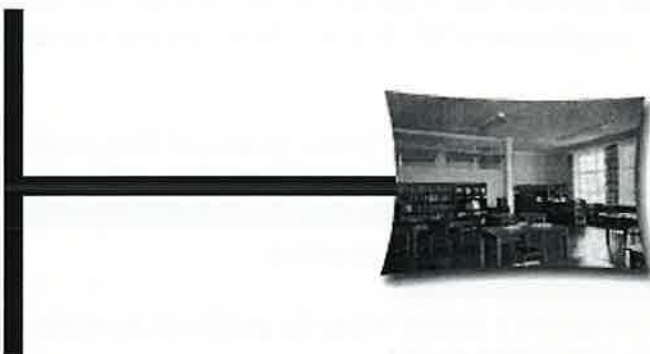
1961 The last of the infant and primary classes were accommodated in separate institutions. Lahee Park in Pinetown served as the rugby ground. When, at last, work commenced on what is now Bowden's Field the Building Provincial Services provided two bulldozers but only one operator. Revelling in his dictatorial position, the operator took twelve months to level the field and thereafter a further period of months elapsed before the surface was grassed and ready for use. Without a proper Hall, assemblies and parents' gatherings were held in the area, which now serves as the school foyer, and Speech Days were held in the local MOTH Hall or the Town Hall.

1961 Commons Field, expertly leveled by a private contractor was a pastoral scene, with cows grazing in the school precincts, was lost with the demolition of the massive water tower which was removed when building commenced on the school hall in 1962.

1961 The pavilion and scoreboard were built on the main field, which soon became a gathering place for Westvillians on a Sunday afternoon to watch the rugby matches against visiting schools. The main field served both as cricket oval and rugby fields and must rank as one of the most attractive in Natal.

1962 The first school magazine was published, edited by Mr R. Hurworth with a preface written by the director of education, Mr L. Biebuyck. Its high quality of presentation has provided the main source of information for these annals.

1963 This year marked two radical changes in the school's history – Mr Bowden was promoted to the position of principal of the Natal Teachers' Training College in Pietermaritzburg, and the building commenced on a Westville High School for girls. In 1963 building commenced on a three-storey complex overlooking the tennis court, a building program which developed at a rapid rate of expansion over the next ten years.



1964 Mr Bowden was succeeded as Headmaster by Mr H. J Commons who in effect had served as Vice-Principal over the previous seven years. 1964 was indeed the start of a new chapter in other ways. With the construction of a new High School for girls, only those who were writing the Matriculation and Junior Certificate Examination, 135 girls in all, remained until the end of the year.

1965 Mr Commons was promoted as Headmaster of Maritzburg College giving the impression to many perhaps that Westville was still a rung below the established schools. Yet it was a promotion well-merited for Mr Commons - an outstanding mathematics teacher and administrator.

1966 For six months the Vice-Principal, Mr Burnett, acted as Headmaster, while the school awaited the arrival of Mr D. C. Thompson, promoted from Newcastle High in July 1966. Mr Thompson's reputation as a disciplinarian preceded him, and during his tenure the reputation of the School as a well-ordered and respected high school became accepted by the wider community.

1971 The new Headmaster, Mr C.D Harcourt, promoted from Brettonwood High School, settled in quickly and was to steer the school through further important advances. Mr A.J Wilkinson, also previously from Brettonwood, became the school's first Deputy Headmaster in 1971.

1971 A start was made to building additions amounting to more than half a million rands. These included classrooms, general purpose rooms, five new Science and Biology laboratories, a team teaching room, a new library and staff room.

1974 In the Matriculation Examination, Westville achieved 23 distinctions in History, believed to be an all-time record in South Africa for a single subject. Also during the year the school acquired its own swimming pool, thus fulfilling a long overdue need in a school of 900 boys.



1975 Mr P. Doyle arrived from Kingsway High as the fifth Headmaster of Westville with Mr M.J.P. Maher promoted from Vice-principal to Deputy Headmaster, after Mr R. Barry had been added to the list of émigrés promoted to the rank of Headmaster of another school.

1983 Mr Doyle's successor as Headmaster was no stranger to the school. After a two year absence, as Deputy Headmaster at Durban High School, Mr R.W. Couzens succeeded in July as the sixth Headmaster of Westville. Mr Couzens' passion for the School endeared him to all in the community. His ability to bring out the best in others ensured that the School rose to new heights of achievement in academics and sport. Mr Couzens' foresight in establishing the WBH Educational Trust is a legacy which has led to the enhancement of the School's facilities.

1987 Mr T. W. Hall was appointed as Deputy Principal – the first WBHS old boy to be appointed to this position.

1990 Mr Couzens' promotion to the Inspectorate was to prove the bittersweet announcement of 1989. Mr K. Elliot arrived from Kingsway High School as the Headmaster to succeed Mr Couzens. He resigned at the end of 1990 to enter the tertiary environment.

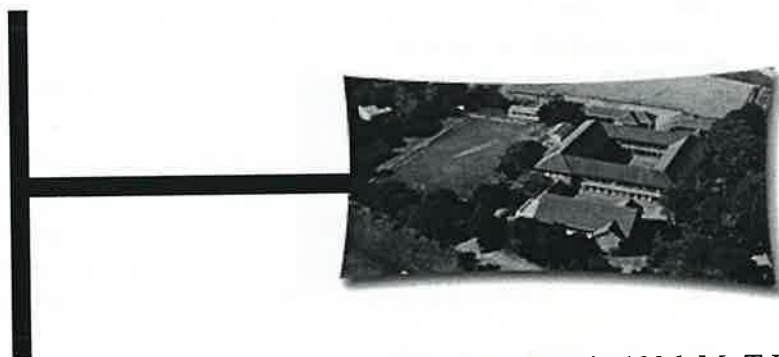
1991 Mr E. W. Maddams succeeded Mr Elliot as Headmaster. Mr Maddams came to Westville with the reputation of a fine administrator and a gifted teacher of English. His influence was soon felt in the fields of literature and the performing arts.

1992 In accordance with the legislation of the day, the Governing Body opted to convert its status as a public school to 'Model B' status. This meant that the School would become a fee-paying school in terms of the School's Act, and the Governing Body would be entitled to determine its pupil admissions criteria. Up until this point, legislation restricted admission to white pupils only. As a result of the change in status, the School opened its doors to boys of colour in 1992. The School subsequently converted to the 'Model C' status of a self-managing public school. Although this ensured greater freedom in the making of decisions, it led to a decline in funding from the State.

1994 The WBH Educational Trust voted for the development of the School's Media Centre overlooking the Bernard Quad, the previous site of the Art Room. The Art Centre was relocated to the site of the old Woodwork Room, adjacent to the Tennis courts.

1996 Following the change of government and the establishment of the new Constitution of the country, the new SA School's Act came into being. The status of WBHS was once again changed, this time to that of a self-managing high school in terms of Section 21 of the SA School's Act.

1997 Supported by the Educational Trust, the School opened its new Computer Centre, laying the foundations for the IT development of the future.



1997 Mr Maddams accepted voluntary retirement in 1996. Mr T.W. Hall was promoted to the position of Principal in April 1997, the first WBHS old boy to be appointed to this position.

1998 The WBHS Sports Academy was formed to enhance the School's policy of sport for all pupils. This programme included timetabled sports periods for each grade, programmes for development and advanced groups and individuals, and local and international tours, in addition to the existing traditional fixtures and practices. The School also embarked on the recruiting of experts and consultants to raise skills levels of players and coaches. These strategies led to an immediate increase in demand for sport at WBHS. The increased achievements of WBHS pupils in gaining selection to provincial and national representative sides are testament to the initiatives of the Sports Academy.

1999 New developments, the Long Room and Griffin Room, were opened by Mr Dave Cuthbert. This feature on the upper level of Bowdens Pavilion transformed Bowdens Field forever.

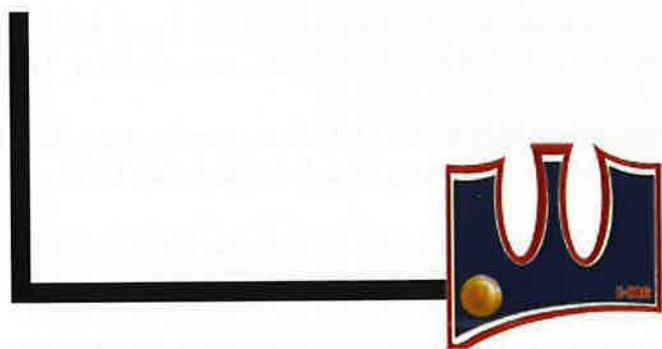
2000 The WBHS Dux of 1999, Colin Bigg was announced as the top 1999 matriculant in the country at a special assembly addressed by the KZN Minister of Education, Mrs N Shandu. WBHS continues to set new standards in terms of achievements of Matric pupils in the public examinations.

2002 Pharos Medical Plan starts a 5-year association with the School as major sponsor of the WBHS Sports Academy.

2003 The pupil leadership structures in the School are reviewed in line with the concept of 'Service Leadership'. Pupil leaders are expected to plan, lead, organize and serve others in addition to their control function.

2004 Old Boy, Gareth Morgan, becomes the youngest member of the National Parliament following the general election.

2005 The School received a R6m donation from an anonymous donor trust for the construction of a Multi-Purpose Centre on the site of the old tennis courts. This facility revolutionized the operation of the School in general and the Sports Academy in particular, and provided an ideal venue for assemblies and large-scale dramatic productions. A plan was devised to convert the existing Roy Couzens Hall into a Performing Arts facility.

LEADERSHIP AT WESTVILLE BOYS' HIGH SCHOOL

It is part of the School's stated mission and objectives to produce young leaders of quality. Strategies are in place to produce young men whose evolving skills in leadership will benefit not only the School, but also society at large in the future.

Up to the 1990's, the pupil leadership structures in South African high schools remained static due to the slow rate of change in the world outside the schools. The world is now experiencing social and technological change at a rate never experienced before. This has had a profound impact on:

- The attitudes of the younger generation. This topic was covered in a presentation to parents and staff by Keith Coats, an expert in Generation Theory, and
- The legal framework within which schools and school leaders have to operate (the SA Constitution and the SA School's Act are perfect examples).



For the past several years certain leading high schools, including WBHS, have critically assessed their pupil leadership structures to consider whether they are aligned with the changing social and political conditions. Various opinions, on this subject, have been discussed at inter-school forums.

Changes in the leadership structure have been applied over the past decade at WBHS. Whenever refinements or changes are made, these are done in order to:

- Add value to the leadership experience of our boys. (Specifically the aspects of leadership through service and leadership through the empowerment of others.)
- Provide the appropriate opportunities and expertise to the pupil leaders to enable them to be effective in their roles.
- Retain what is good and effective from the past structures. It is not our intention to remove the policing/control aspect from the WBHS structures. As in the past, the pupil leadership structures will help preserve a disciplined and purposeful school environment dedicated to the improvement and maintenance of holistic education.

The leadership structures at WBHS have been evolving over the past decade to cater for the changing social and educational circumstances and needs.

FEATURES OF THE CURRENT LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME ARE:

• 1. Leadership Through Service

The School has always emphasised the concept of leadership through service. This concept is described by the Greenleaf Leadership Center as:

“It begins with the natural feeling that one wants to serve, to serve first. Then conscious choice brings one to aspire to lead. The difference manifests itself in the care taken by the servant – first to make sure that other people’s highest priority needs are being served.”

The process of Leadership as applied at WBHS is:

- Developing a sense of ownership in all aspects of the School – facilities and activities
- Determining a direction in which to lead (vision, mission, objectives and deliberate strategies)
- Planning, organising and controlling with emphasis on the desire to serve others
- Developing inter-personal skills to effectively fulfil the role of leader (e.g. confidence, tolerance, conflict resolution)
- Inspiring others to follow and empowering others to take leadership roles
- Leaving a positive legacy.



In order to address all the above concerns, it is important for all stakeholders to appreciate the issues at hand and, if necessary, undertake a paradigm shift to consider that the processes of the past are not necessarily the best for the future.

The concept of ‘organising teams’ or ‘task teams’ is nothing new in this or any other school. However, it was a deliberate strategy at WBHS this year to implement ad hoc task teams prior to the announcement of the successful applicants for leadership positions. This was to entrench the concept of ‘service’ and to communicate to all aspiring leaders that their contributions are valued, irrespective of the status position they might eventually fill. The strategy was also intended to give aspiring leaders the experience of working in a team prior to their appointment.

It was most encouraging that this process revealed:

- Leaders who were prepared to serve but who were not interested in status positions – a number of boys who had not submitted CV’s for prefectship came forward and played significant roles on the task teams
- Positive and meaningful involvement by most boys who were involved in discussions by the task teams – the ideas which came out of this process were most enlightening
- An understanding by the boys that they can determine the processes and structures which they want, provided this is done responsibly and within existing boundaries.

2. Leadership camps

Leadership camps for each year group have been introduced. Each leadership group focuses on a different aspect of effective leadership. The moral and ethical component of these camps has become increasingly important. Research as well as feedback from parents and teachers has indicated that moral and ethical regeneration has to be a major priority.

3. Appointment of student leaders

The changes to the Matric leadership structure over the past five years were made to accommodate the changing roles within the School. Last year the position of Head of School was instituted, together with the positions of Heads of House. These new positions replaced the positions of Head Prefect and Deputy Head Prefects. This effectively redefined their roles in the leadership structure and the size of the leadership group increased from 15 pupils to 46. The emphasis has been on increasing the service element associated with 21st century leaders. These changes were made to accommodate:

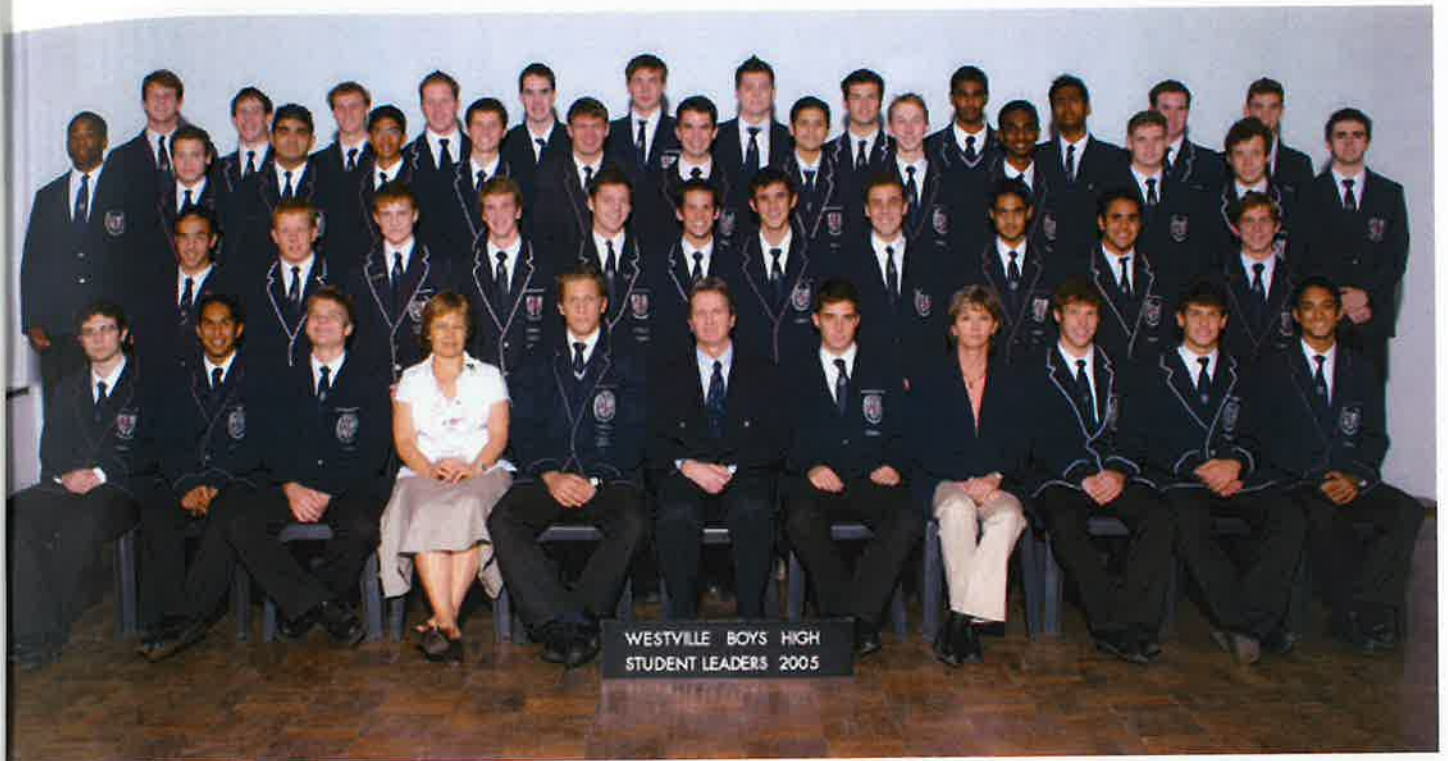


- Changes to our form class structures
- Our timetabled sport programme implemented in 2002
- Our planned counselling and mentoring programme implemented in 2004.
- The implementation of task teams.
- Affording more pupils the chance of leadership experience.

4. Task Teams

Lead by members of the matric group who have embraced the concept of service leadership and was instituted several years ago to provide experience to our matric leaders and to develop skills in decision-making. Task teams covered the following areas:

The Arts

The Arts, both Performing & Visual, are proving to be a decided point of difference for WBHS.

The main dramatic production was *Kismet* – an extremely challenging production and our boys rose superbly to the occasion. Well done to Pippa McHale, the actors and the backstage crew for a fine performance.

Kismet was a celebration of Westville Boys' High School's 50th Anniversary and definitely followed in the footsteps of *Footloose*. For six sold out nights, the cast of *Kismet* left the audience in awe. With a youthful cast of 60, the average age being 15, it was not expected to be such a spectacular musical extravaganza, but it was not only that but much, much more.



Samir Areff's performance in the lead role was superb, and we are sure to hear a lot more of his talents in the future. However, it was not all about Simmi. Darryl Daniel, Christopher Godlonton and Devin Moller were excellent in their roles. The production was brought to life by a live orchestra involving members of the school and Westville old boys.

Kismet showed that the school has a growing cultural contingent, and all of this had been put into the production. *Kismet* was not just an ordinary school play – the show had gone past that barrier and had entered a league of its own.

The stage setting was superb and definitely took the audience to 18th century Baghdad, creating a magic that will always be remembered. For *Kismet* to be such a success there had to be a fantastic imaginative mind behind the production ... there was. Pippa McHale guided the cast and put on a performance that Westville would cherish for another fifty years.



The Matric Drama students also staged a varied and enjoyable Supper Theatre which revealed the talents of the entire Matric group.

Our musicians also continued to bring much credit to themselves and the School. Aristide du Plessis and Christopher Straueli were selected for the KZN Youth Orchestra this year – this is recognized as one of the finest youth orchestras in the country.

Despite being in Grade 10, Aristide was selected as 3rd cello in the Stellenbosch Festival Concert Orchestra, a major honour as this is an orchestra comprising of adults under the baton of Arjan Tien of the Netherlands. Aristide also participated in the first round of the UKZN Classical Performers' Competition, and was announced as the winner of the Scholars' Category. He was subsequently invited to perform as a soloist with the KZN Philharmonic Orchestra under Lykele Temmingh – he played the Saint-Saens *Allegro Appassionato*, a challenging piece that showcased his talents.

The Choir, under Mrs Snoekie du Plessis, has earned the reputation as one of the leading school choirs in the province. The senior members, Samir Areff, Darryl Daniel, Nicholas Gorven, Neil Skea, Kyle Farr and Chris Godlonton, ensured that the Choir developed into a tight and professional unit. Their performances received widespread critical acclaim.

The Matric Art boys, under the tutelage of Mr Paul Lichkus and Mrs Janine Jollands staged another magnificent Art exhibition which drew high praise from around the province. It was an exceptional group of boys in that they produced work of the highest standard from a diversity of disciplines.



- Anand Moodley's super realistic, detailed drawings depicted strange images drawn from psychological sources.
- Brynn Huxtable captivated his audience by editing graphic images of historical importance in his evocative digitally enhanced videos.
- Frederic Lange compiled a remarkable portfolio of work, using video, black and white photography, wood cut drawing and painting, documenting the lifestyle of the people living in the Namibian desert.
- Leshen Vurdiah derived his inspiration from his deep-rooted spiritual awareness, producing a series of exquisite paintings based on rituals and illusions.
- History was made when Christopher Micklewood created several large panels depicting his genuine appreciation of the School's diverse achievements, using digital and traditional photographic techniques. He was also responsible for the design of the new summer shirt. Animation is considered by many to be a difficult genre in which to work.
- Martin Wilson's talent was such that he completed several animated sequences of exceptional merit. Sculpture often requires physical strength as well the ability to realize images in three dimensions.
- Daniel Booyens modeled clay into mythological figures in the classical Greek tradition. The figures were anatomically accurate, possessing implied action and historical detail.

ACADEMICS 2005

KZN SENIOR CERTIFICATE RESULTS:

The Matric group set new standards of achievement in the national public examinations. Congratulations to all 190 boys and their teachers on these fine results:

- Two boys were placed in the KZN Top 10.
- A-aggregates were achieved by 45 boys (24% of the group).
- The Matric-exemption rate was 94%, arguably the highest in the country amongst boys' high schools.
- The pass rate was 100%. All 190 boys passed.
- Merit passes (C-aggregates and above) were achieved by 149 boys (78% of the group).
- 14 boys achieved a full set of six distinctions.
- The 298 Higher Grade subject distinctions exceeded our expectations.



Leshen Vurdiah was placed 4th in the province and Anand Moodley 6th. Our sister school, WGHS, had three representatives in the top 10, which means that half this elite group came from Westville.

The context of these achievements makes their results even more impressive. All boys in this School are required to undertake Mathematics in order to keep their options open for future careers – this is not the case in many other schools. Furthermore, our co-curricular programme places heavy demands on our boys in the interests of their holistic development. Our top Academic pupils are congratulated on the manner in which they have successfully balanced their studies with their sport. Whilst several of our boys were highly placed in the province and in the region, they did not benefit from undertaking a 7th or 8th subject. Our boys generally take Additional Maths or Computer Studies as extra subjects. These are not soft options and the marks on these subjects generally do not exceed those of their basic six subjects, hence there tends to be no effect on their aggregates.

NATIONAL SCIENCE OLYMPIADS:

A total of 14 105 learners from 686 schools entered the 41st National Science Olympiad which took place in March. 63 learners from Westville Boys' High wrote the examination. 29 of these boys were placed in the Top 50, a truly magnificent achievement, particularly as this Olympiad is an extremely challenging one.

Our Matric pupils filled four of the top 20 positions in this Olympiad. Martin Wilson (3rd in KZN, 7th in SA), Rick Lange (4th in KZN, 8th in SA), Leshen Vurdiah (6th in KZN, 13th in SA) and Avikar Singh (11th in KZN, 19th in SA) were selected to write the first ever South African Physics Olympiad.

Jonathan Parker was placed 2nd in SA in Grade 11 and Mihail Avramov also achieved a position in the Top 30. This made them eligible for the National Youth Science Forum held in Australia.

WESTVILLE'S THIRD RHODES SCHOLAR: CHRISTOPHER YOUNG

Christopher Young (24) became the third Westville old boy to win the prestigious CJ Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford University. He follows in the footsteps of Chris Swart and Gareth Morgan, who were recipients of the scholarship in 1982 and 2000 respectively. Chris was born in Taiwan and grew up in Westville. He matriculated from WBHS in 1999 with academic honours. He is presently completing his medical degree at the University of Cape Town. Chris is interested in cognitive neuroscience through an approach bringing together the clinical, pure and human sciences. He believes that the field can contribute greatly to our understanding of human behaviour especially with regard to our learning capacities. He hopes to read for D.Phil in Neuroscience at Oxford. This is a magnificent achievement and we wish him well for the future.



NEW CURRICULUM

WBHS is leading the way with regard to the implementation of the new curriculum for Grades 10-12, which is expected to commence for Grade 10 in 2006. Contrary to media reports, the new curriculum is certainly a vast improvement on the current one which, in many respects, is more than a decade out of date. Welcome features of the new curriculum are the inclusion of skills, values and attitudes in addition to subject knowledge, which is intended to provide learners with education more relevant to the new millennium, and the methodology of converting pupils into more active participants accountable for their own progress.



The Headmaster, Trevor Hall, has been part of the National Training Team responsible for training subject advisers on a national basis, and a number of our teachers have been involved in assisting with the development of the national curriculum statements.



However this School will not simply be content with the national and provincial training that will be on offer. A number of members of Management received accredited training through a professional service provider, and this was extended to subject heads. The School's extensive in-house training under Director of Academics, Alan Miller, focused this year on new curriculum issues, and various presentations were made to the parents on this topic during the course of the year.

Message From Director of Sport

2005 has been a truly memorable sporting year, full of highlights and team/personal achievements. A total of 128 boys achieved either KZN or SA representation in a variety of sports codes and we congratulate them all.

Our sports teams have also achieved well during the year, especially in the pool with the success of our swimming teams at the D & D Gala and our U15A Waterpolo team in the East London and Northwood tournaments. Our rugby teams continued to impress with the 1st XV especially providing us all with enjoyment due to their efforts and achievements. Other sports which enjoyed success this year included Squash, Softball, Golf, Soccer, Hockey, Tennis, Athletics and Cricket.



Sports which enjoyed development and progress this year included Basketball, Volleyball, Sailing and Touch Rugby. Surfing and Bodyboarding will need a boost in 2006

In order to continue developing the standard of our sport in 2006 the following changes need to be noted:

1) The Multi-purpose centre will be available for a variety of indoor sports including Indoor Hockey, Basketball, Badminton, Volleyball, Tennis and nets for Cricket practice. The venue may also be utilized for club sport in the evening, as well as for provincial and national tournaments over the school holidays.

2) An outdoor Astroturf Hockey coaching area (which could also be used for Cricket) is to be constructed adjacent to the Multi-purpose centre near the Art block.

3) The medical needs of our sportsmen will be attended to by a panel which has been assembled to interact with the school coaches on a wide number of sporting issues including diet, stretching, injury prevention, rehabilitation, concussions and so on.

4) With the rising cost of providing sport at the highest possible level, it is proposed that a system of sub-committees for each sport be formed, consisting of : the teacher-in-charge of the sport as chairman, a few of the senior coaches and interested parents who will develop the sport by amongst other things seeking funds/sponsorships.



5) In the absence of overseas tours next year the school's major fundraising drive will be to raise funds for a Hockey Astro turf.

6) The school has appointed Mr Peter Bees as an aquatics co-ordinator from 1st June 2006. Mr Bees is the current KZN Men's Waterpolo coach and a former SA Men's Waterpolo coach. He will be available to assist the school on a part-time basis from January. We look forward to his input in Swimming and Waterpolo as well as his plans to improve the physical appearance of our pool area.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank all the school's sports coaches and managers for their hard work in coaching our boys. Thanks too to the ground staff, Mothers Support Group and all the parents for their support and encouragement of our sport. To the boys well done and keep fit as you approach another busy sporting year.

HOCKEY

U14

Rugby

2005 proved to be yet another successful year for Rugby at Westville.

The 1st XV recorded some fantastic results. 2005 saw the appointment of former Springbok fullback Hugh Reece-Edwards as the school's Head Coach and he was ably assisted by Mike Vowles.
