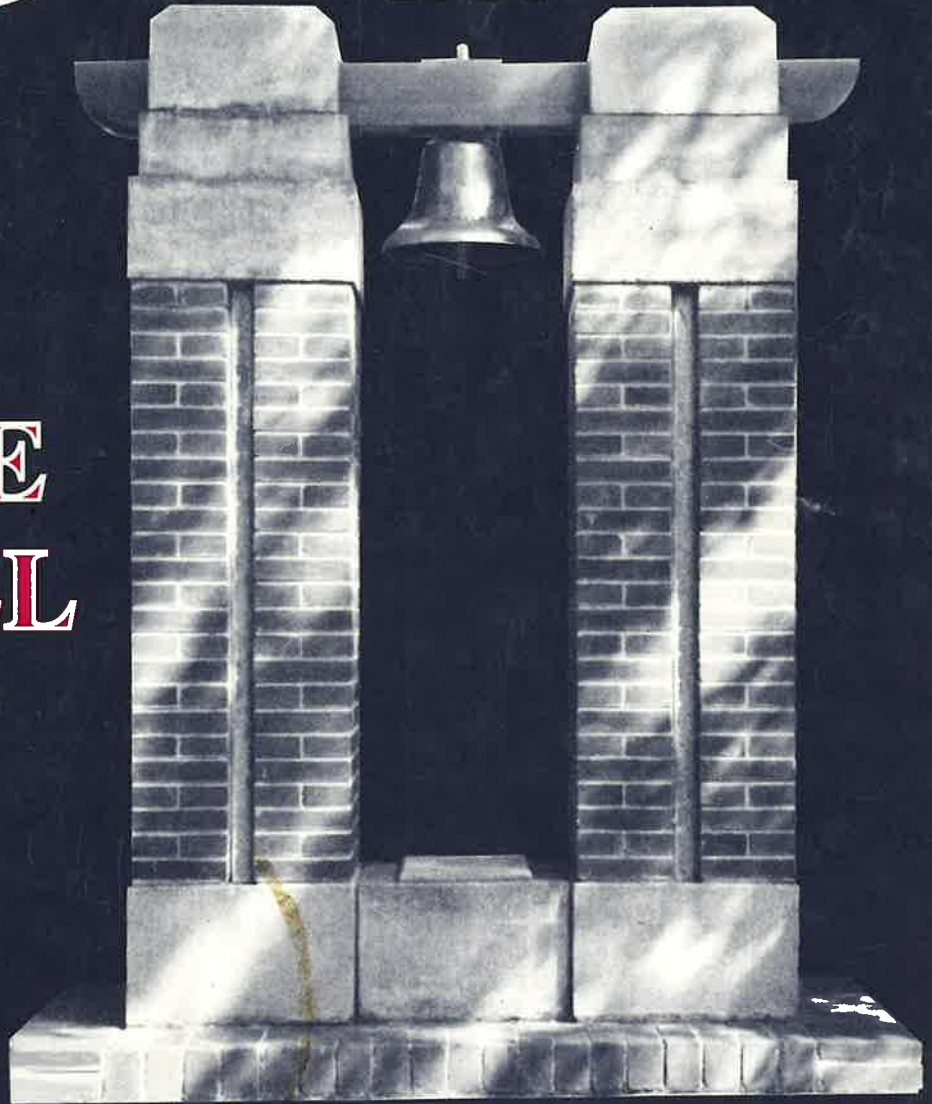

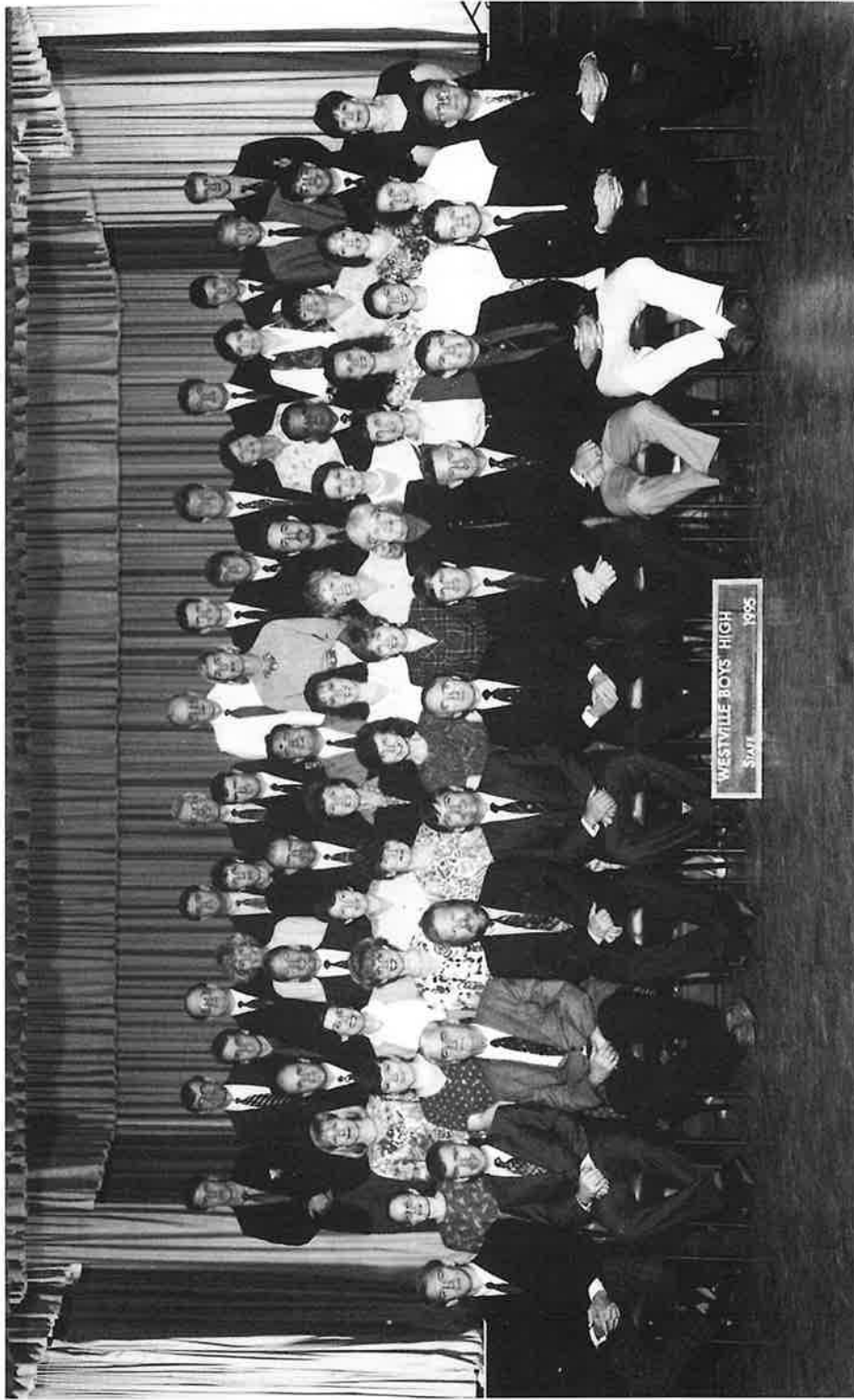

GARY BASHFORD

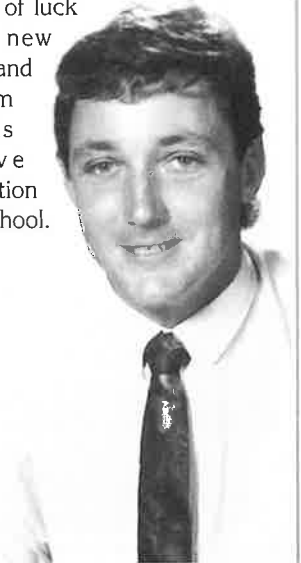

Annual Speech Night and Prizegiving

THE HEADMASTER'S SPEECH:

Good Evening Colleagues, Ladies and Gentlemen

In adding my own welcome to you all this evening I would like to extend a special welcome to our Guest of Honour, Rodger Graham. Mr Graham is our guest this evening as a tribute to his many years of service to Boys' High as a parent representative, and for the majority of these years, as Chairman of the Governing Body.

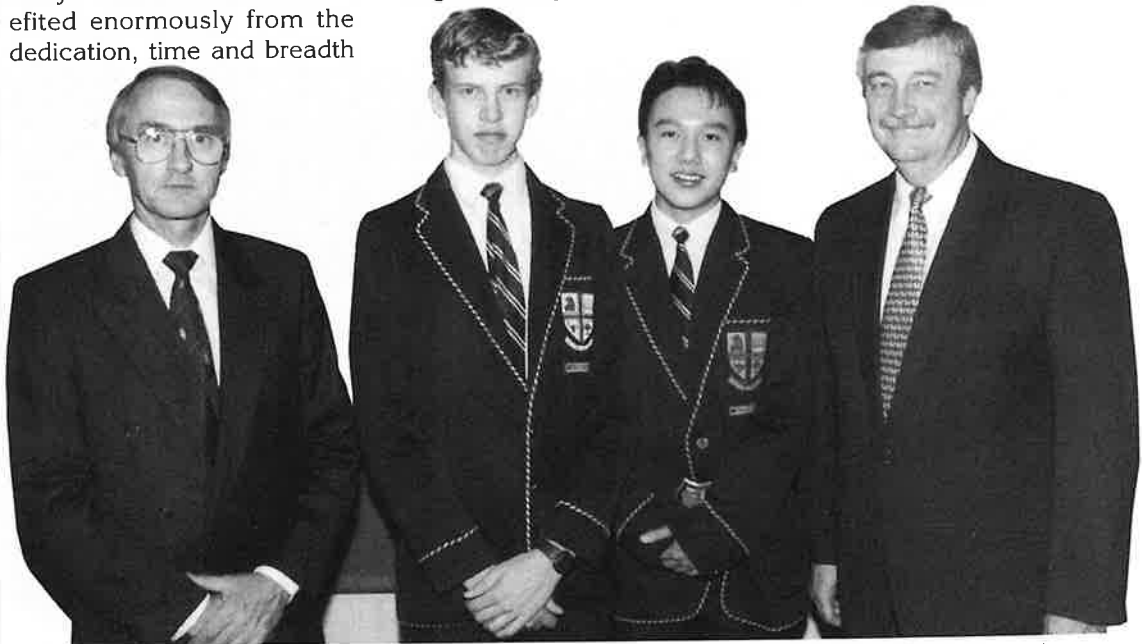
Through this invitation the School is able to pay a formal tribute to his leadership role for close on a decade. It also enables us to recognise the significant input made by the parents' representatives through the structure of the Governing Body. The School has benefited enormously from the dedication, time and breadth

of expertise that members of the Governing Body have willingly dedicated in a most professional manner. Although Rodger has relinquished the 'hotseat' of Chairman he has indicated a willingness to remain in an 'elder statesman' role on the Governing Body and Trust. Dave Jenvey was for several years our Vice Chairman. A full year after his son's successful matriculation he has now indicated a wish to step down. To him, too, go our grateful thanks for his financial stewardship and wise counsel. I hope he can also be prevailed upon to remain a Trustee for some years to come.

Rodger has a personal interest

in this year's Matric group - his son Jonathan is the recipient of academic honours for his major achievement in placing third in South Africa in the Accountancy Olympiad. There have been other Olympiad successes too, as Chanakya Jonnalagadda was placed first in Natal in the Chemistry section of the Science Olympiad, and Bruce Isdale was placed equal tenth in South Africa in the Afrikaans Olympiad.

Just how well the matric group as a whole will fare in the final examinations is now a matter that rests in their own hands. The School - and I am sure, your parents - wish you every success - perhaps even more

than you deserve - in this last examination to be run under the ex-Natal Education Department.

The gauntlet of challenge has certainly been thrown down by the successes of previous years, with last year's group, the class of '94, - particularly strong performers - gaining 81 Higher Grade distinctions spread across all the subjects offered at this School. There were 21 A aggregates, the best achieved by any NED school, and this by a large margin. At the very top particular congratulations go to Robert Kelso, Ahmed Motala (last year's Dux and Proxime Accessit respectively) and Brett Mallen (last year's Head Prefect) who were all placed in the top 30 in Natal. These outstanding results are a tribute to our boys' commitment to their studies, and the expertise and dedication of our staff.

The value that is added to the boys' educational experience through the efforts of our staff cannot be underestimated. It is most unfortunate that the staff have had to operate in a climate of uncertainty for too long now. That their efforts in classrooms, on sportsfields and in cultural areas have not diminished resounds to their credit and professionalism. The 'Report on Activities' which is distributed in printed form at Prizegiving is a formidable document. With reports kept as brief as possible it still runs to 25 pages to do justice

to the full range of academic, cultural and sporting activities, all of which enjoy a high profile at this School. I can't resist dipping into those pages to mention some of the top achievements, and note the Art Department's lucrative top

place in the National Arts Festival, Stuart Butler's placing 12th in the country in the English Olympiad and second in Natal in the Std 9 section in the Alan Paton Literary Competition, while David Barkhuizen won the

Standard Eight Alan Paton. Within the curriculum there have been two significant developments. The purchase of a Novell network and the redevelopment of the old library area have provided us with a computer suite of 30 networked

computers. The expansion of our leadership development programme is also now complete with standards seven and eight all participating in a three-day leadership and development experience under professional guidance. In concluding this

short review I must pay tribute to the teamwork now well developed in the management of the School, and to the support of the senior management : Mr Collier, Mr Hall and Mr Stokes. We are all envious of the year of leave which Mr Stokes will enjoy next year when he embarks on studies towards a Masters Degree in the teaching of South African Literature.

Whilst I share the staff's negative reaction to the current climate of uncertainty I have never lacked confidence in the future of Westville Boys' High - or indeed in the future of the long-established Westville family of schools. Every year brings a White Paper or Hunter Report, but these indications of national policy directions hold no real dangers for schools that enjoy genuine community support and a strong funding base. I do confess to feeling frustrated by the vacuum which has developed in educational leadership in this Province. A modern definition of an optimist is 'one who enjoys uncertainty'. It is a virtue we have all had to cultivate in this period of transition. There is no need to dwell on the tensions that currently afflict this province in particular, and it's easier to be a cynic than an optimist. Minister Buthelezi admits as much (if he was quoted correctly) in calling the R D P : 'Rumours Dreams and Promises'

The School has not allowed itself to stagnate or wilt under the psychological pressures of our times. Some regard these times as the burden of history that we have to drag with us;

others believe they allow space for positive action. The School has moved into a new dimension this year with its first overseas sports tour, building on the many successful educational tours organised by Mr Hall. I left for Sydney within 24 hours of our tour party's return to Durban, so had little time to hear of their many successes. It was with a great deal of pride that I heard from everyone at the Conference who had come into contact with our boys what fine ambassadors they had been for their School and families while in Australasia. We hope to build on the trip's success through our first cricket tour - to England - next July. These tours forge links through sport that can be of real assistance in our determination to ensure the continuance of a world class education at Westville.

In an address delivered not in Sydney but to a Conference in Helsinki, the President of the International Confederation of Principals commented extensively on the enormous effect that technological advances can have on our lives.

We now live in a 'wired world'. Students in schools all over the developed world can now dial up at relatively little cost all kinds of new information. Electronic information knows no boundaries. Personal computers' modems linked to telephone lines cross traditional borders. The borderless world is upon us, and it is here to stay. But information is not knowledge, knowledge is not understanding and understanding is not wisdom. Those who argue that teachers will become less

relevant in the electronic age tend to ignore the fact that one of the fundamental purposes of education is the development of higher order capabilities. The mass of undifferentiated knowledge available on 'the Net' is a conglomeration of facts at the most basic level. I am confident that the approach to learning that this School follows has given our matrics the abilities to make the best use of information technology, and use the computer not as a toy but a tool to assist in the more rapid analysis and synthesis of information.

The School has also ventured beyond its borders this year, both in overseas tours and we are (at last) about to be connected to the Internet. As educated young people this year's matrics move into a world which is seeing a fundamental shift in employment patterns; the era of the job / or profession for life is probably over.

But the intellectual elites of our country must be part of the wealth creation process, using technology and expertise to develop the abundant opportunities that exist, even if they are not packaged in the traditional way. Southern Africa should be a free trade zone by the end of next year, and the markets of the world are only a cellular phone call away.

There will always be a discrepancy between what politicians promise and what a government can deliver, so it will be society itself which will have to deliver. You matrics are not in the same position as many youngsters in

the Northern Hemisphere, well-educated but under-motivated, who have come of age without the hope of being able to make a contribution to their world. You have the education as well as the motivation to make a real difference to your own lives and that of the country. Self-employment is a likely career for many of you, but you have the skills and the attitude to be successful. By thinking globally and acting locally you can not only market yourselves but also assist in the job creation so vital to our country's future; which will bring in its wake as successful and - dare I say it - normal a lifestyle as possible in our developing society.

Rapid economic development is certainly to be sought after, and whether you seek to participate through the professional qualification of a university degree or the more immediate productivity of a Technikon diploma, whether it's in exports or tourism that you see the gap opening for your own enterprise, remember that high achievers don't always end up happiest - or even richest.

The hardware of the brain and the software of the mind must work in harmony with another 'net', that other web of feelings that humans have always believed to be located somewhere near the heart. I don't know whether your advantages in computer literacy are going to be of any real help in the search for truth and meaning in life, but I wish you the emotional resilience never to give up, or to lose the enjoyment of search.

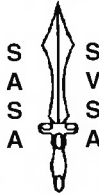

THE HEADMASTER'S PRINTED REPORT

(Extracts from the printed report handed out at Speech night follow; Activities covered elsewhere in this magazine have been omitted).

ACCOUNTING

1. The SBDC Competition

The Small Business Development Corporation runs an annual competition for School pupils which is designed to encourage entrepreneurship and develop business skills. Pupils are required to submit comprehensive business plans outlining their business objectives, technical plan, marketing strategy and financial considerations.

This year, Std 8 and 9 pupils from WBHS once again made up a large percentage of the entries and were commended by the SBDC for the exceptionally high calibre of their work.

2. Accounting Olympiad

S Yang C Haw J Graham S Samjowan C Hockaday and J Bachan qualified for the national final of this competition. Westville Boys' High once again had the highest number of pupils in Natal through to the final. J Graham

achieved the distinction of being placed 3rd in South Africa.

3. Management Contest

The Matric Accounting class entered a team in the 1995 CA / Standard Bank Schools' Management Contest. The team was unfortunately eliminated in the quarter finals.

4. Entrepreneurship

The Westville Boys' High weekly Market Day was instituted this year, during the first two terms. Accounting pupils from Standards 7 and 8 set up their own small businesses and marketed their wares every Tuesday at lunch breaks. Products on offer included doughnuts, T Shirts, running shoes, compact discs, and even breyani. Naturally, some businesses were more successful than others with some placing themselves under voluntary liquidation. It is hoped that the practical experience will stand all prospective entrepreneurs in good stead when this project resumes at the start of 1996.

5. Junior Achievement

Westville Std 9 pupils continue to play a prominent role in this programme organised by the

Wits Business School. Pupils are selected from schools throughout Natal and are invited to form their own real-life companies. The pupils are expected to raise share capital for their particular venture, form a board of directors, manufacture and market their product and then, three months after incorporation, to liquidate the company.

Pupils marketed products ranging from necklaces and mugs to underwear.

AFRIKAANS

The Department is greatly indebted to Mrs D Classen who took over Mr N Scheepers' classes whilst he was hospitalised. We thank Mrs Classen for her dedication and efficiency and we hope that Mr Scheepers will soon enjoy good health again.

Mrs Gimmel will be on long leave during the 1st and 2nd terms of 1996. We wish her a

happy and rewarding holiday.

Mrs T Kriel, who spent many years at Westville Boys' High School, and was for a number of years also Afrikaans Subject Head, has settled in Ireland. We wish her much happiness in her new home.

ART

The Art Department enjoyed another successful year, characterised by excellent work and meaningful developments.

The Art Club

The aim of the Club is to expose as many pupils as possible to places of cultural interest and provide information regarding art in general. During the year, juniors as well as seniors were taken to no fewer than 12 exhibitions. The pupils also enjoyed 3 'walkabouts' - occasions when the artists discussed their work with pupils. Lecturers from the Natal Technikon as well as Old Boys addressed the pupils, highlighting the vocational value of art. We also visited the Durban Municipal Gallery and the two local galleries in Westville. All the Std 6 and 7 pupils were taken on a 'guided tour' of the Grassroots Gallery, a novel experience for the majority of the boys.

Exhibitions and Competitions

Westville Boys' High was placed 1st in the National Arts' Festival in the Std 9 and Std 10 category. We were awarded a Floating Trophy and R1000.00. James Smith,

who matriculated in 1994, was awarded 1st prize and R1000.00 Gareth Davies, who matriculated in 1994, and Eric Fairall shared 2nd prize of R500.00 each. Fred Gray won R800.00 for a poster he designed for another competition.

Pupils and staff visited five major exhibitions, the highlight of which was the matric exhibition in the Grand Foyer of the Playhouse. Pupils from every high school in KwaZulu-Natal were invited to submit work.

Our School was represented by nine pupils with work ranging from photography, drawing, ceramics, painting, textile printing, sculpture and design. This unique exhibition is an indication of the

hard work done by the pupils and the health of art in KwaZulu-Natal generally.

Examples of photography and lino prints from WBHS were on show at Wits University, as examples of excellence from KwaZulu-Natal Schools. Mrs Jollands held a successful solo exhibition at the Anthea Martin Gallery in August.

The Standard 9 class was taken on an excursion to the Tatham Art Gallery in Pietermaritzburg to see a unique exhibition of South African Art. On our way to the Pietermaritzburg Art Gallery, we made a slight diversion to visit the Lion Park. A parent might wonder at the artistic merit of this venue. Well, apart from experiencing the beautiful African Landscape

and sighting a few skittish animals, we also raided the local animal 'graveyard' and brought back a pile of 'trophies': skulls and assorted bones.

Airbrushing

A professional airbrush artist ran a workshop and demonstrated spraying onto T-shirts, paper and ceramics. The department purchased a compressor and an airbrush for daily use and these have proved to be invaluable. We now have 3 portable compressors for home use and two large compressors for use at school. We also have 6 airbrushes.

Special Projects

Staff and pupils installed some 400 concrete blocks in the bank facing the new exten-

sions to the Art Centre. This is part of a larger scheme to enhance the surroundings and instil a sense of pride in the facilities generally.

Photography

The purchase of a 100mm - 500mm zoom lens has made it possible to capture action shots from almost any vantage point. Some excellent photographs were taken, some of which were to be seen in the Rugby Tour brochure. We also acquired a new enlarger for the dark room. I encourage parents to consider photography as an option for your son while at school as it has both vocational and aesthetic potential as a skill.

Ceramics

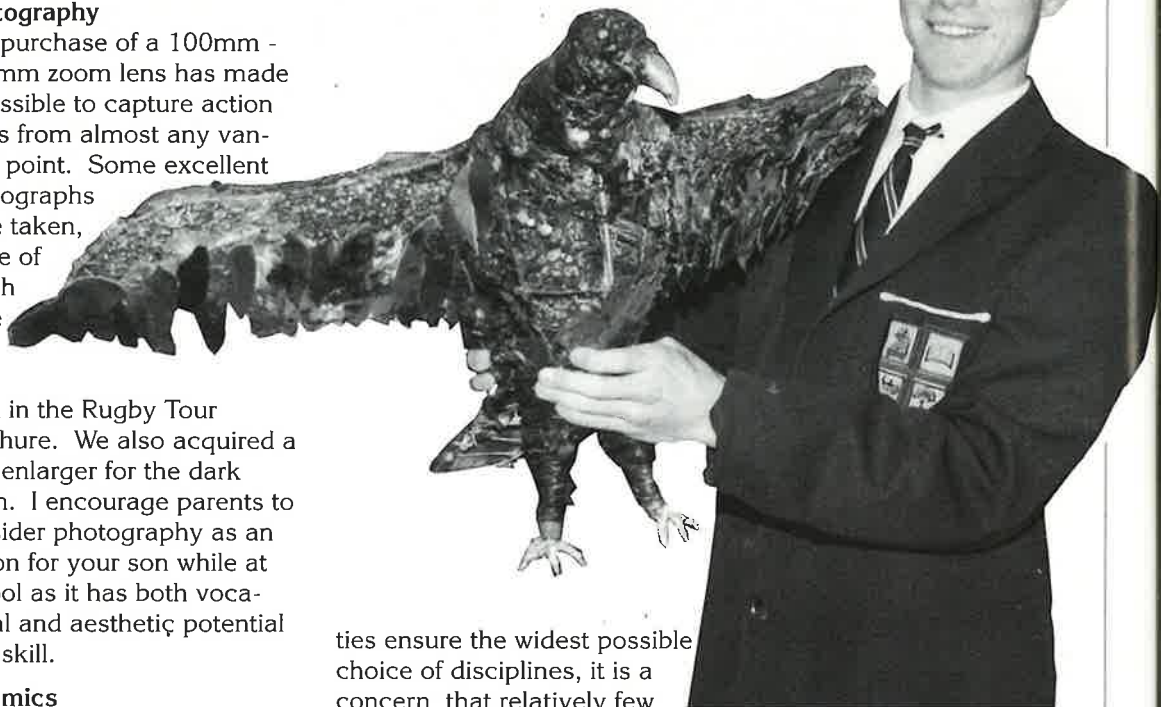
The purchase of a much-needed large electric kiln (we now have two), means that the boys can produce much larger work without the need to have it fired elsewhere.

Printmaking

The boys assisted in the printing of various badges and logos onto a range of items for the rugby tour. The Std 10 pupils produced excellent lino prints, using some of the techniques which won so much praise for our seniors last year

General

Although the results continue to be excellent and the facili-

ties ensure the widest possible choice of disciplines, it is a concern that relatively few boys choose Art as a subject in our School. It is disturbing that many boys with the necessary aptitude and ability to make a success of this subject are not encouraged to do so.

For the first time the Annual Std 10 Art Exhibition was held jointly with the girls at Westville Girls' High School. This collaborative effort ensured a remarkable exhibition reflecting both diversity and a shared vision for excellence. We hope to develop this collaboration between the two art departments in the future.

BIOLOGY

The matric component of the Biology syllabus includes a great deal of practical work as well as theory. These complement one another, and for the first time WBHS ran practical exams in addition to the theory exams in each term.

The Std 9 pupils were 'guinea pigs' of a self-study programme initiated by the Staff at the beginning of the year. This involved staff members putting an enormous amount

of time into designing a work package for a particular section. The pupils studied the section on viruses and bacteria and completed set tasks for a 14 day period in the library. Finally, each pupil presented a document to his teacher. Encouragingly, pupils showed increased interest and recall of the topic when examined on the work. An excursion to Sea-World to study invertebrate biology took place in term 1. Highlights of the day were handling live starfish (the size of a side plate!), sea-urchins and sea cucumbers.

The Std 8 programme is basically an introduction to plant morphology and mammalian anatomy. These intense sections were broken by a study of the ecology of our eastern coastal rocky shores. A visit to Treasure Beach enabled pupils to locate a variety of plants and animals that are found in such a habitat. Finally, the pupils embarked on a self-study programme of the heart and circulatory system.

CIVICS : LIFE SKILLS PROGRAMME

The programme involved speakers from many different organisations and was aimed at informing the pupils about social issues, career options and self-help.

In addition to the talks by guest speakers, certain topics were dealt with in class by class teachers, including study methods, etiquette, developing a

healthy self-image, first aid, human rights and social responsibility to the community.

Civics will continue to include as much as possible that is of value to pupils in understanding and gaining control over their lives.

LEADERSHIP COURSES

As an institution aware of our mission to produce leaders in all facets of adult life, the School has begun to expand its leadership development programme. This year each standard seven class underwent leadership courses at the 'Spirit of Adventure' Leadership School in the Shongweni Nature Reserve. The standard eight group experienced a very beneficial leadership and motivation course at Lexden outside Pietermaritzburg.

The enthusiasm of the boys to learn the values associated with being a leader was enhanced by the 'island' setting of the school and the enjoyment they derived from abseiling, kayaking and stalking in the reserve. The benefits of the course have already been noticed in individuals who have grown in self confidence, and in class groups who have become more cohesive and supportive of each other.

Course reports from the Leadership Schools indicate that with the superior calibre of our pupils we can look forward to retaining our position as a leading academic institution.

COMPUTER LITERACY

Computer Literacy is offered to all Standard 6 and 7 boys. The aim of this subject is to enable pupils to use a computer with confidence and to link computer usage with other subjects. The boys are taught wordprocessing, the spreadsheet, the database and a graphics package. They also learn how a computer works, and the classes include general discussion on the latest technology.

Computer Studies is offered to Standard 8, 9 and 10 boys as a seventh subject. The boys have a choice of either doing the course at Edgewood once a week, or doing a correspondence course through the Department of Education.

COUNSELLING

A great deal of time was spent in consultation with parents and pupils through individual interviews and the successful Std 7 Parents' evening, in an effort to secure the subject package best suited to the aptitude, ability and interest of the pupils.

Through the pastoral care system of form controlling, in close liaison with the School Counsellor, pupils' problems in various aspects of school life were attended to and carefully monitored. The assistance of the School Psychologist and the Westville Community Counsellor proved most helpful in this respect.

The growing difficulty in gaining entrance to tertiary

institutions of education has led to a deeper sense of responsibility amongst pupils, many of whom have applied to a wide spectrum of such institutions. There is also a greater awareness of the spiralling cost and time factors involved in studying, and parents and pupils are urged to explore both full-time and part-time avenues in order to overcome these problems and meet the pupils' respective needs.

Visits to tertiary institutions were well-supported, and pupils are showing a strong awareness of the need in our society for people with an entrepreneurial spirit. To this end, the School has encouraged pupils to participate in a wide range of activities which develop skills in this area, in the awareness that the formal job market is rapidly shrinking.

In addition, a variety of speakers, representing different career and academic options, presented talks to our senior pupils during the Civic Responsibility period.

ENGLISH

The 1994 Matric results were particularly pleasing. 61.6% of the pupils achieved 60% or higher in the Natal Senior Certificate Examination, with 11 boys obtaining distinctions.

In keeping with the Department's philosophy of extending pupils beyond the bounds of the curriculum, we entered candidates in a variety of extra-curricular competitions related to the subject:

a. Alan Paton Literary Competition

In the Std 9 section the school was represented by S Butler who was placed 2nd in the final round of the competition with his paper on J M Coetzee's 'Dusklands'. D Barkhuizen whose paper dealt with the concept of the hero in William Gibson's cyperpunk novel, 'Neuromancer', was adjudged winner of the Std 8 section.

b. English Olympiad

The theme of the 1995 Olympiad was the Language of Propaganda. S Butler of Std 9 was placed 12th in South Africa, earning himself a week at the Grahamstown Festival in July.

c. Rotary Team Speaking Competition

Our School was represented by a team consisting of S Maharaj D Skinner and B Lensvelt, all of Std 10.

d. SA Guild of Speech and Drama Teachers' Public Speaking Competition

This competition consists of two sections: a contest for individual speakers from Std 9 and 10, and a forum discussion for teams of speakers from Stds 6 -9.

12 pupils delivered speeches in the preliminary rounds of the individual Public Speaking Competition.

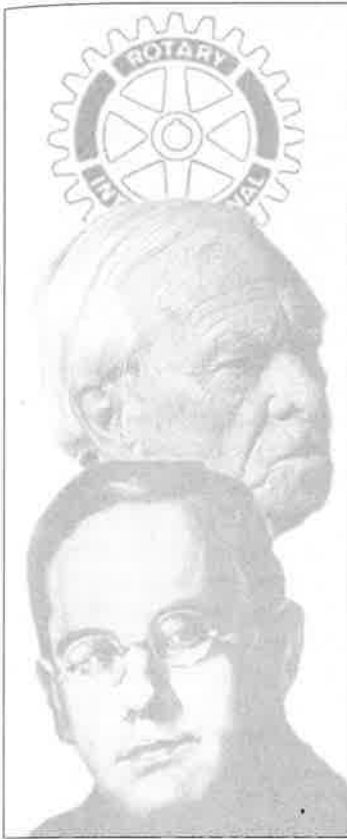

e. Jan Hofmeyr Speech Contest

S Maharaj went through to the semi-final round of this public speaking competition with a speech on the theme of Political Correctness.

f. Speech and Drama Theme Programme

Although Speech and Drama is not offered as a subject at WBHS, an enthusiastic group of our Std 6 boys entered a Theme Programme competition held at the Elizabeth Sneddon Theatre. Although competing against older and more experienced pupils they acquitted themselves well and were commended on their presentation.

GEOGRAPHY

The Geography Department staff remains unchanged from 1994; however, Mr Cowie was away on leave for the duration of the first term, putting the finishing touches to his Doctorate. Miss Norman taught his classes and is presently teaching at Kloof High School.

The department continued with the discovery and experimental approach adopted a few years ago. This approach places emphasis on decision making and skills' acquisition. To this end, pupils were engaged in various projects and competitions which encourage self-discovery and research methodologies.

Generally, project work was of a high standard. Fourteen excellent posters were entered in the Young Geographers' Poster Competition by the Std 7's. N Crosskill was placed 3rd in this competition.

An encouragingly large number of pupils entered the Young Geographers' Competition. D Skinner was placed 3rd in the Matric section, whilst A Craig was placed 2nd in the Std 9 section.

Certain classes enjoyed a break from the classroom by attending an ecology excursion to Treasure Beach on the Bluff where hands-on opportunities extended pupils' geographical knowledge.

HISTORY

Recent developments in our country and abroad have made the study of history a more valuable subject than ever before. The demise of the Soviet Union, the Bosnian Civil War, the ending of the Cold War, the completion of the Channel tunnel and South Africa's re-admittance to the British Commonwealth are but a few major developments which may well leave the non-history student adrift and ignorant of world affairs.

As interesting and as useful as this information may be, however, the shift in the study of history at Westville Boys' High has been away from content towards the acquisition of skills and techniques. Wherever possible, the pupils have been presented with sources and encouraged to analyse, challenge and respond. Historical sources have ranged from documents, cartoons, and photos to videos. Much has been obtained from sources in the new Media Centre, and the History Department, especially the Std 7's and Std 8's, are indebted to Miss Kearns and her team for their assistance.



In keeping with the trend of source-based learning, the Std 6's visited the local Bergtheil Museum. A group of Std 7's went further afield on a three day mission, visiting

Shakaland, Spioenkop, Isandlawana and the two excellent 'living' museums at Rorke's Drift and Ladysmith. In conjunction with the English Department, Std 7 History pupils visited the Anne Frank Exhibition.

The History Society held regular meetings and studied a variety of topics outside the syllabus. Through the encouragement of Mr Ken Gillings, the History Department has become a member of the South African Military History Association.

A number of Westville boys presented papers in both categories of the Young Historians' Conference and they must be complimented on the research which went into their presentations.

MATHEMATICS

The Mathematics Department welcomed the appointment of Mr Sean de Groot to our teaching staff. He has added strength to the teaching in the junior classes.

While we enjoyed a comparatively lean year with regards to outstanding performances in the numerous Mathematics Olympiads, a number of our pupils again performed extremely well and can be justifiably proud of their achievements.

PHYSICAL SCIENCE

1. Schools' Symposium

A number of Std 10 pupils attended the Schools' Information Symposium

organised by the Science Students' Council of the University of Natal. Lectures covering Science-related courses offered by the University were presented.

2. Science Olympiad

40 pupils from Std 9 and 10 wrote the 31st National Youth Science Olympiad. C Jonnalagadda was invited to attend the 31st National Youth Science Week in Pretoria.

The top Science students in the country are invited to attend this annual Science week. He was also awarded a cash prize for the highest chemistry mark in KwaZulu-Natal.

3. Science Expo

A number of pupils submitted entries for the Annual Science Expo. Three of our Std 7 pupils - S Abbett G Bishop and J P le Roux - were awarded certificates placing them in the top Young Scientists' category in Natal.

All three boys were invited to represent Natal in the National Final in Pretoria at the end of term 3. They have also been invited by the Electronics Department of the University of Natal to discuss their project, Isohorn Loudspeakers, with a panel of experts.

Congratulations to all those boys who entered projects.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

In order to understand Christian principles, many Biblical characters were studied. These included Abraham, Esau, Joseph, Samuel, Moses, Daniel and Jesus. The parables and teaching of Jesus were also studied to encourage the boys to follow his example and not to scorn his warnings.

The Ten Commandments and essentials for true happiness, as outlined by Jesus in the Beatitudes, were studied by the Std 9 and 10 classes.

Further Scripture readings about good morals, God's love, peace, care and saving grace were read in Assembly on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. These, followed by very meaningful prayers, were often a challenge and, in sad times, a comfort to our School.

TECHNICAL DRAWING

A decrease in numbers has resulted in the Drawing department having only one Std 8 class, something we hope to rectify in the new year. At the end of the second term we said farewell to Mr Bashford who has been with us for the last 4 years. We wish him well in industry. On a more positive note we welcomed Mr Blore to the Department.

ZULU

The syllabus this year has again been theme-based but with a spiral concept approach: the themes covered in Std 6 are the same as at the primary school level but the

basic foundations laid in the primary school now spiral out to a more complex usage of the language. This approach accommodates boys who come to Westville Boys' High School and who have never done Zulu before and extends the feeder school boys in their learning efforts.

A successful area meeting of all the local feeder schools Zulu teachers was hosted at our School in August in order that a common community effort be made to enhance the teaching of Zulu in Westville. Mr Jenkins (Zulu Inspector) was also present and gave enlightening information on Zulu and 3rd language implementation in Kwa-Zulu Natal.

The introduction of J Thomas's 'Asizwane' (towards better human relations in Kwa-Zulu Natal) articles from the Daily News has provided valuable input into the language and cultural issues in our Zulu lessons.

It is most gratifying to see an improvement in the attitude towards the learning of Zulu compared to 5 years ago.

It is hoped that even more boys will realise the relevance and importance of using the Std 6 Zulu course to maximise their learning efforts.

MEDIA CENTRE

Sadly, February 1995 saw the resignation of Mrs Marge Campbell. Mrs Campbell has been associated with the Media Centre since 1988

when she joined the ranks of mothers who gave of their time on a voluntary basis to assist in the running of the Media Centre. During the 3rd term 1991 she ran the Media Centre when Miss K Kearns was on study leave. In 1992 she was employed on a part-time basis. Her enthusiasm, energy, unfailing cheerfulness and willingness to always go that extra mile proved invaluable during the computerisation of the library as well as during the move to the new Media Centre. We wish her well in her new field of endeavour and thank her for all she has done during her long association with the Media Centre.

We welcome onto the Media Centre staff this year Mrs J Bishop and Mrs M Haw. Already their presence has made an invaluable contribution to the Media Centre's aim of providing a quality service to the boys and the staff of the school.

Some pleasing new accessions have been made to the Media Centre in 1995. At the time of writing this report 694 new book titles have been put into the computerised catalogue and the CD-ROM collection has acquired some exciting new CD's.

Sincere thanks to Mrs B Hockaday, Mrs S Cooper, Mrs L Bonner, Mrs S Duncan, and Mrs D Allison and Mrs B Lane, who have just joined the group. We thank Mrs S Doyle for all she has done and wish her a happy stay in the UK.

An Art, Music and Literary evening was held early in the 4th term. At the evening matric art works were on exhibition, the school choir in conjunction with WGHS choir performed and pupils presented a number of literary pieces ranging from their own writing to pieces of narrative poetry, excerpts from a short story, a novel and an historical drama.

Thanks to this year's library monitors for their efforts; the Media Centre certainly could not offer the services it does at breaks without the assistance of these pupils. This year the library monitors were under the leadership of B Earl who deserves a very special thank-you for his devoted service to the Media Centre.

Matric Examination Results: 1995

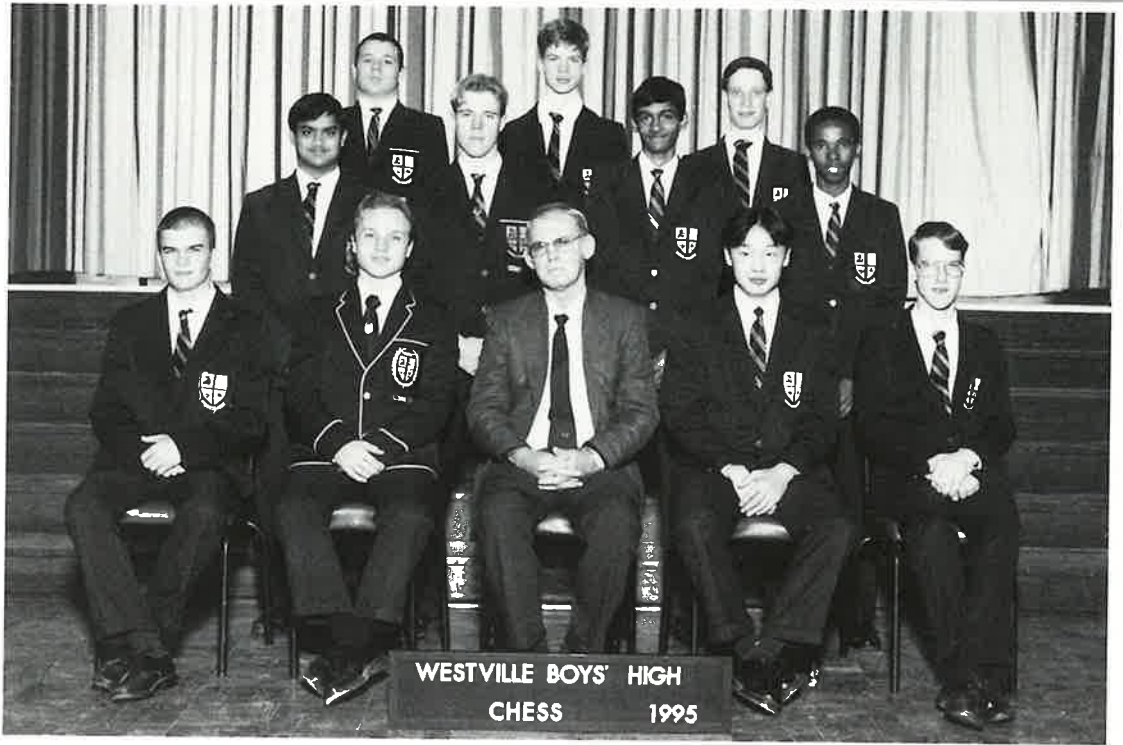
vocalist is called for.

DRAMATICS

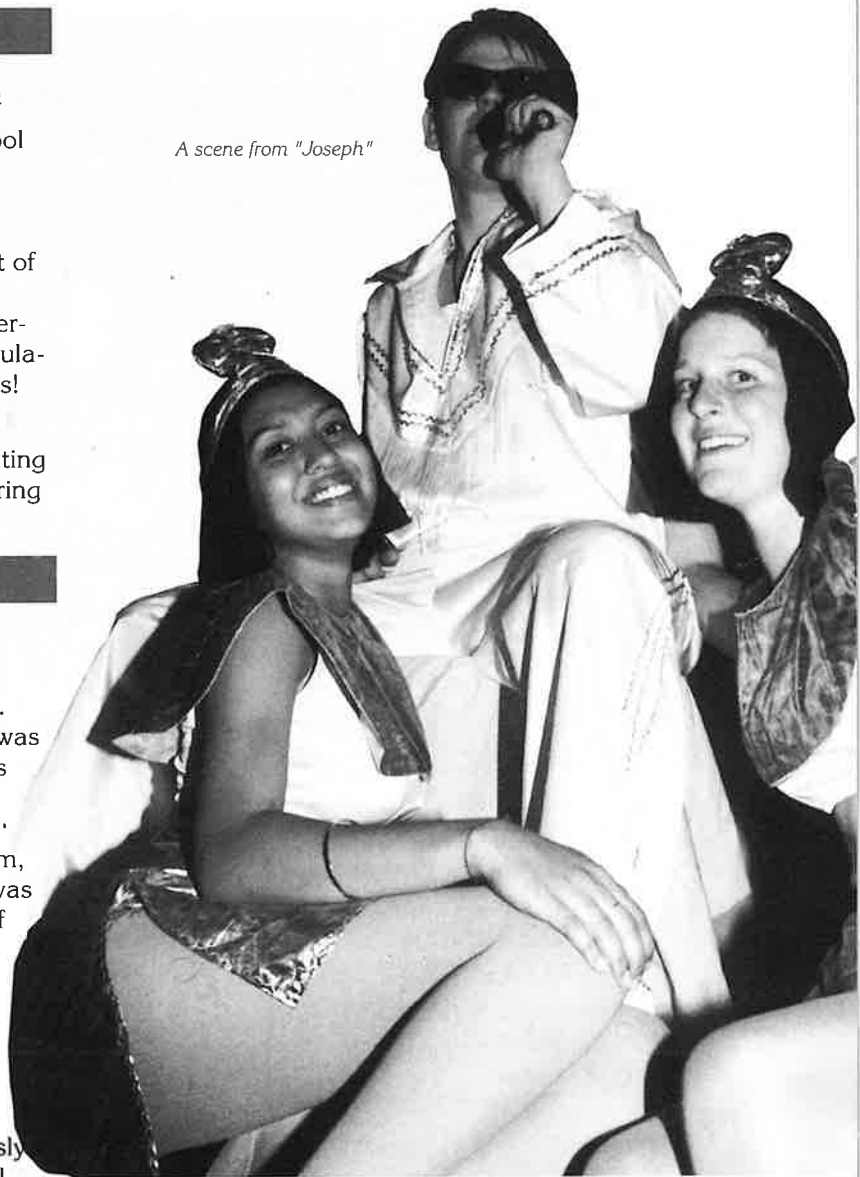

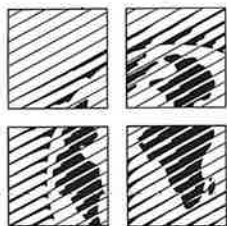

POP/ROCK CLUB

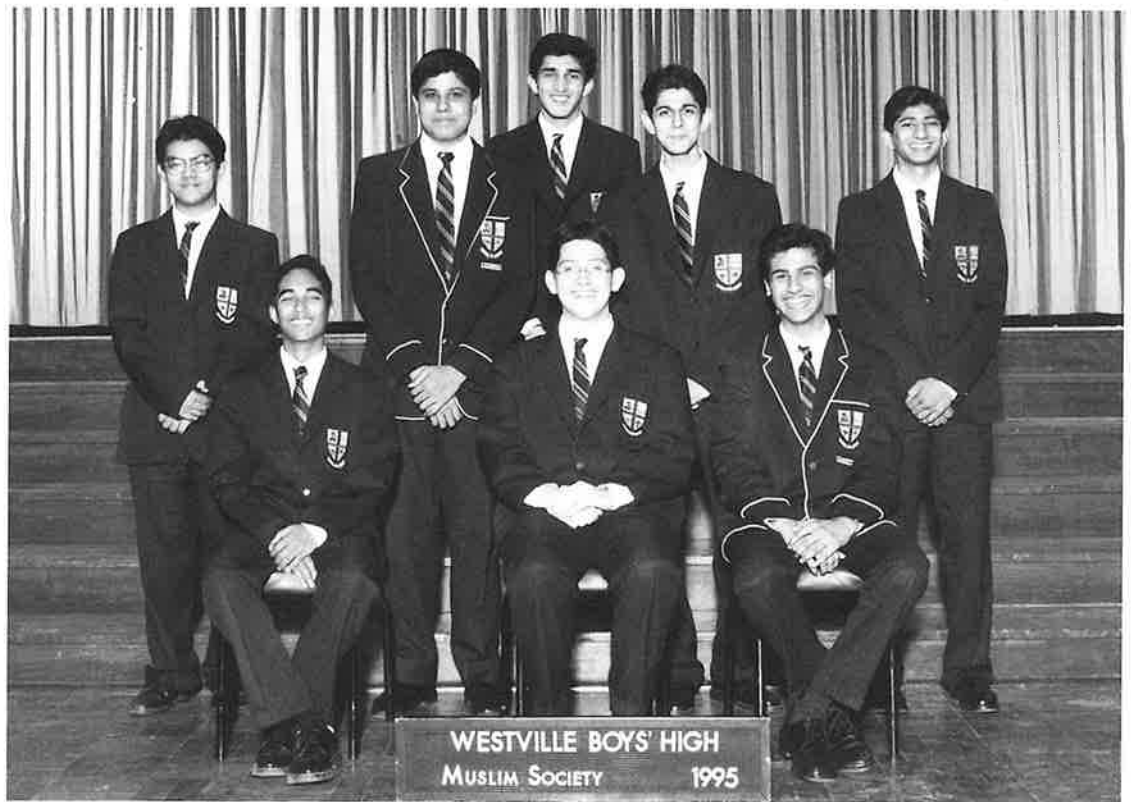

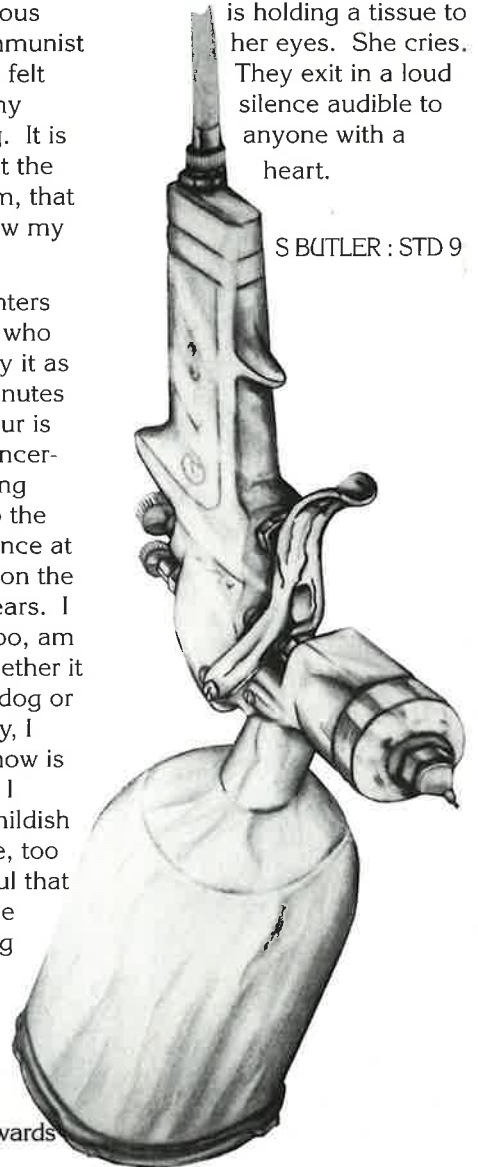
The dog claws its way towards

It's over, Second, Who cares? The time board reads one minute six seconds; personal best, my

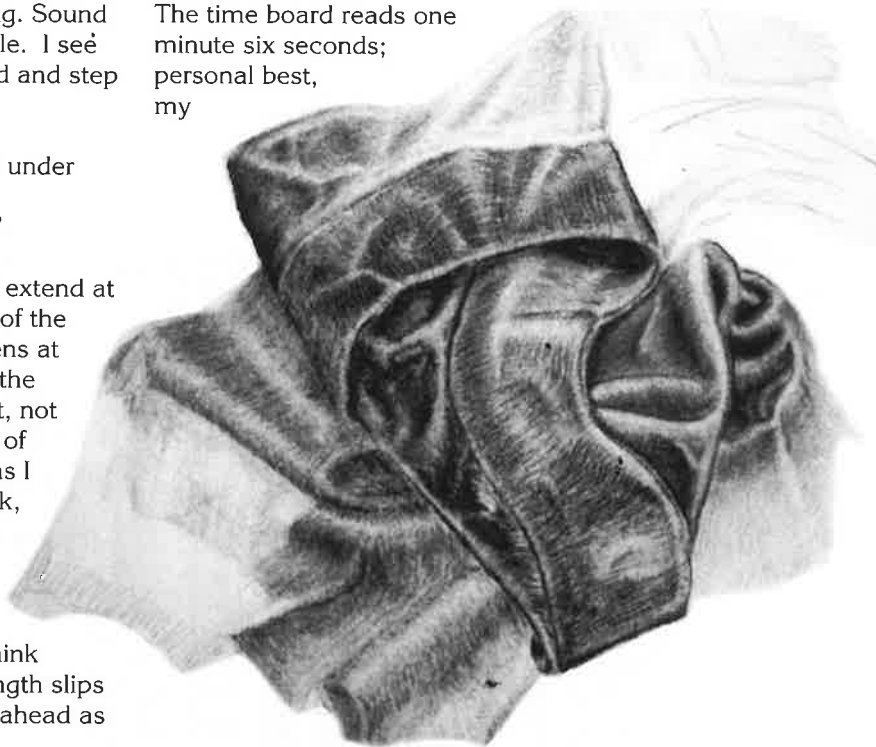
goal and my coach's expectations met. Content, I slip under the water to cool my burning face and scream with joy. I emerge in the bubbles smiling, shake his hand and thank him.

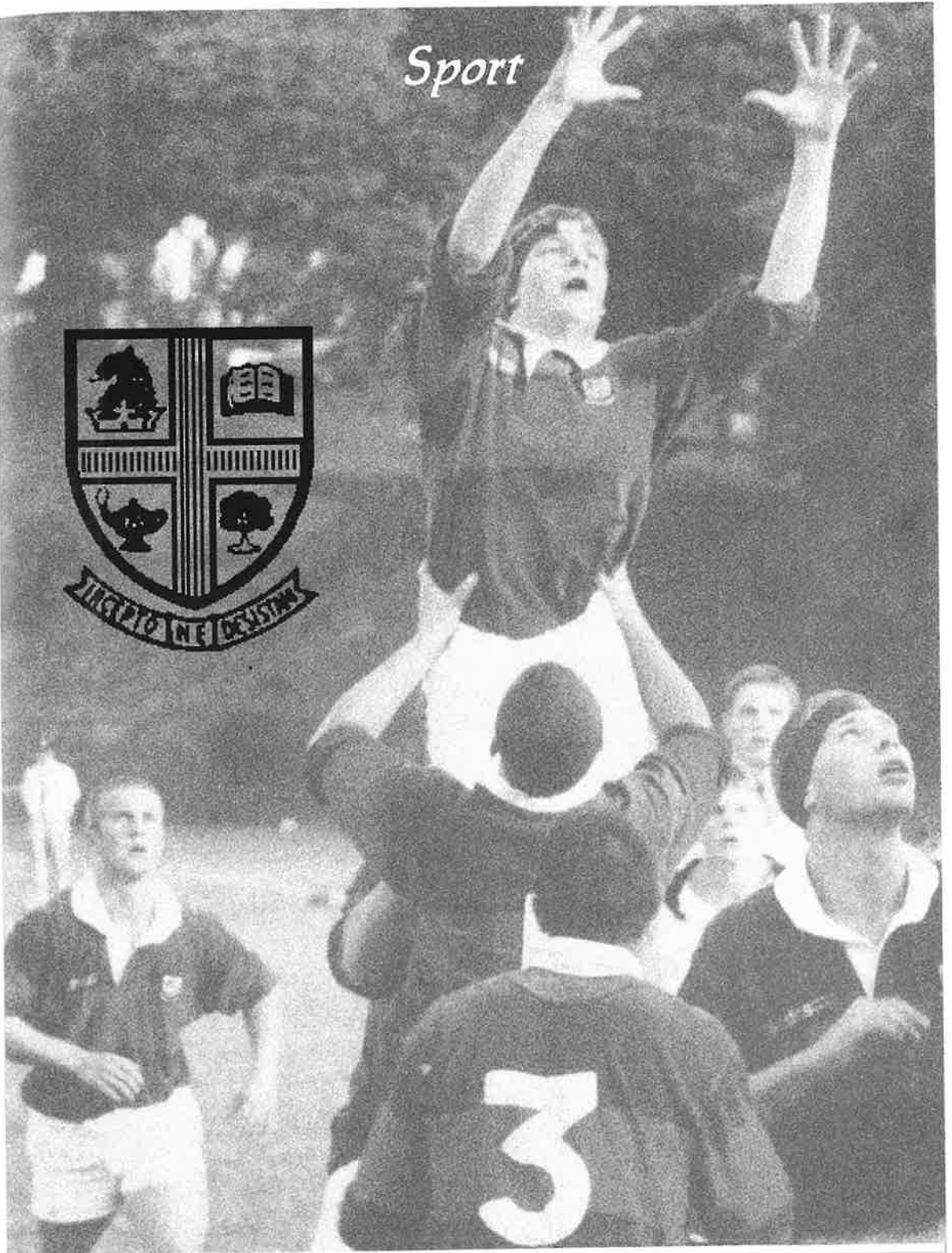

The 1995 Cricket season, in spite of drastic and wide-spread changes, was a highly successful one. January saw the introduction of new age groupings, as well as the formation of the USSASA umbrella body, governing all school sports. As could have been expected, this resulted in many teething problems, including the loss of traditional D & D playing venues as the facilities now have to be shared amongst a far greater number of schools and clubs. team with a particularly strong upper order batting line-up. The first-wicket partnership of 114 against DHS between M Brackett and D Brown was just one of the many memorable partnerships that bore witness to this. The disadvantage of this, however, was that the lower middle order seldom got to the crease, and when they were eventually called on to bat against Kearsney in the last school fixture, they lacked much-needed match practice and the infamous "82 for 2, 97 all out" batting collapse ensued. This disastrous loss, however, provided

the team with an opportunity to show their true character, for instead of allowing it to demoralise team spirit and start a downward spiral, they bounced back 3 days later with an extremely spirited and gutsy performance against a strong Kingsmead Mynahs XI captained by Pat Symcox, and emerged with an honourable draw.

Much of the team's success can be attributed to the outstanding captaincy of D Moffat. He had the uncanny ability of working a batsman out, never being afraid to try something new, often rotating

the bowlers in short succession so as to unsettle a batsman and work on his weakness. His exceptional leadership qualities were recognised by the Natal Schools' selection panel as he was called on to captain an extremely strong Natal Schools' "B" Team at Nuffield Week.

The team's success story of 1995 must be M Mills who deservedly went on to make the Natal Schools' A team. He proved to be an all rounder in every sense of the word scoring 55 (Kearsney), 42 (DHS), 48 (Northwood) and 58 and 57 at the NBS Week

and at the same time excelling with the ball. The most memorable of these performances was his incredible haul of 14 - 33 (including a hat-trick) in the innings and 30 runs defeat of St Henry's.

An exciting young prospect for Westville is D Brown, who although only in standard eight, has proved to be an excellent cricketer. One of the year's highlights was his chanceless and majestic innings of 91 against DHS, where although so close to his 100, he unselfishly sacrificed his wicket in an attempt to win the match for his team. 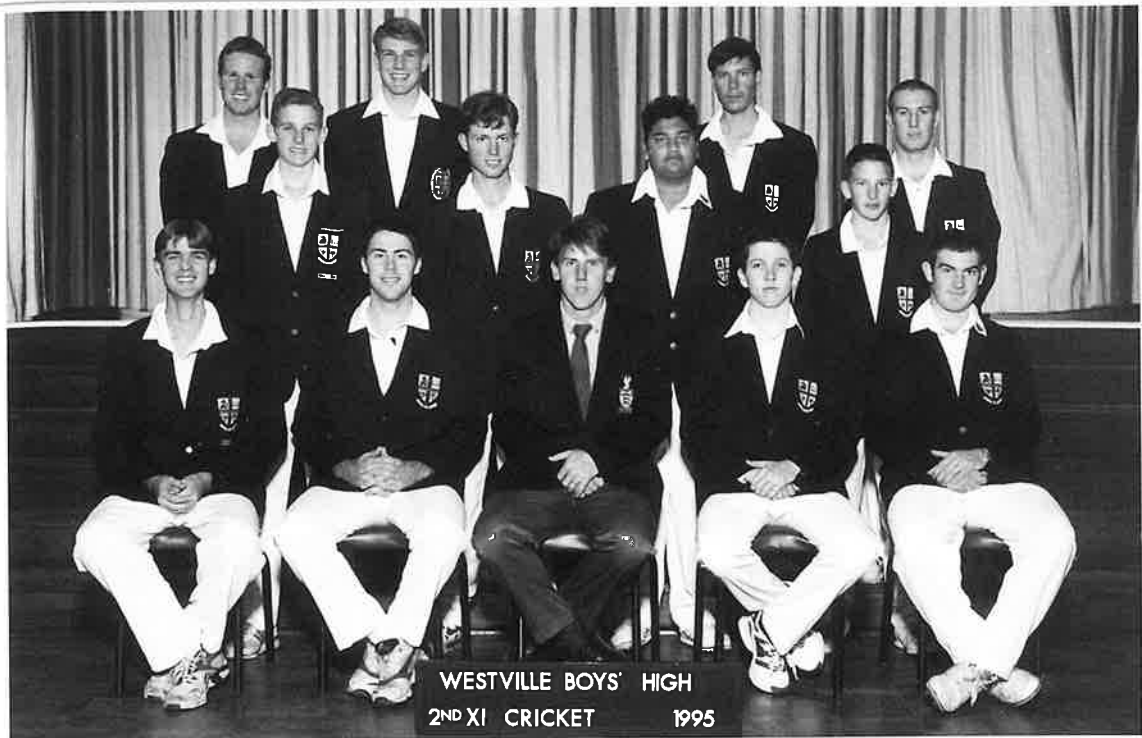

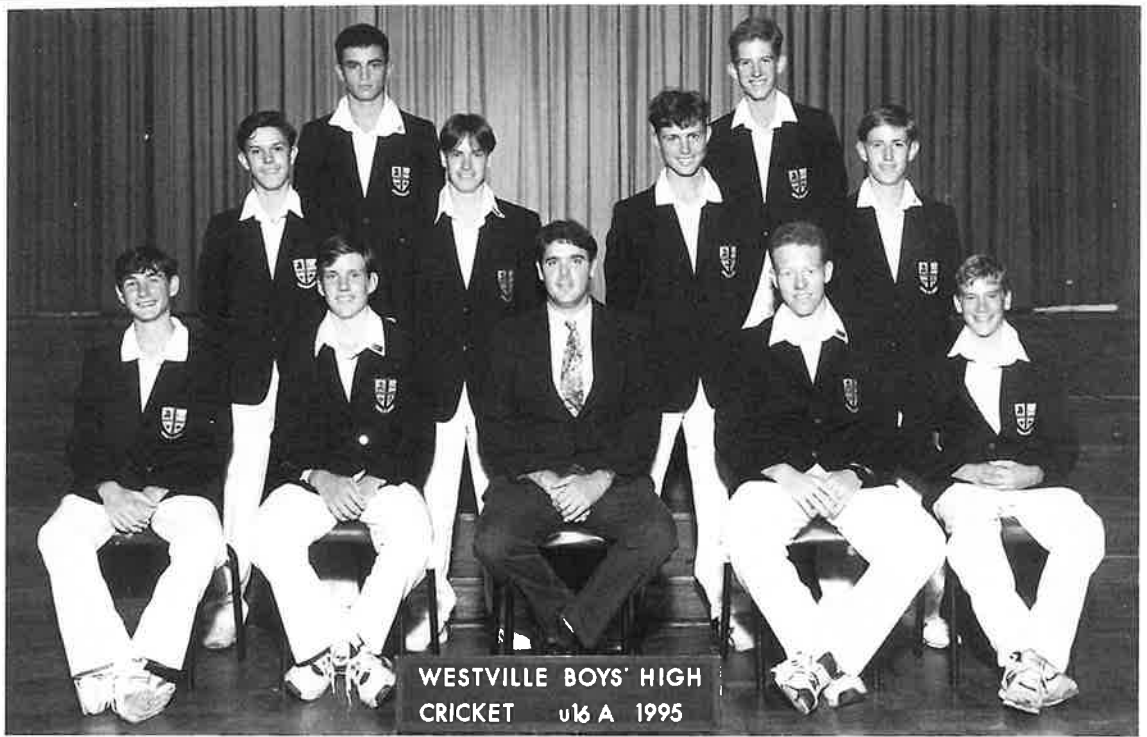

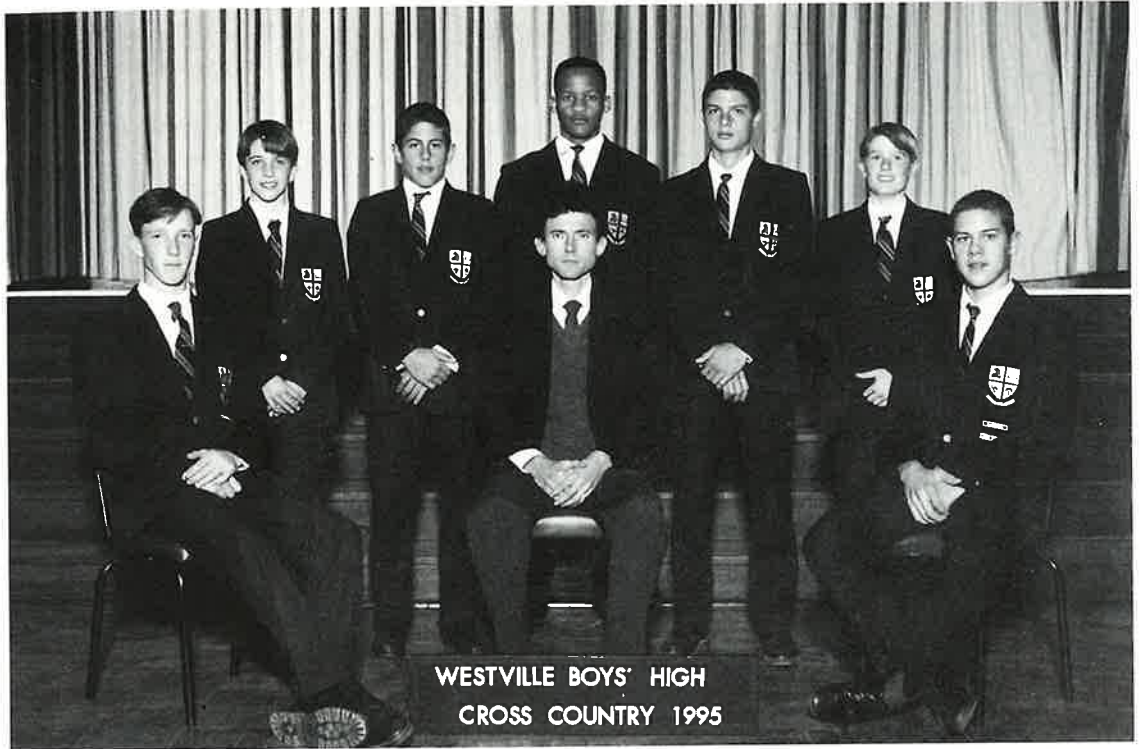

The 1995 season is one which has had its share of highs and lows, but it is one which will be especially remembered for the first hockey tour to Johannesburg and Pretoria.

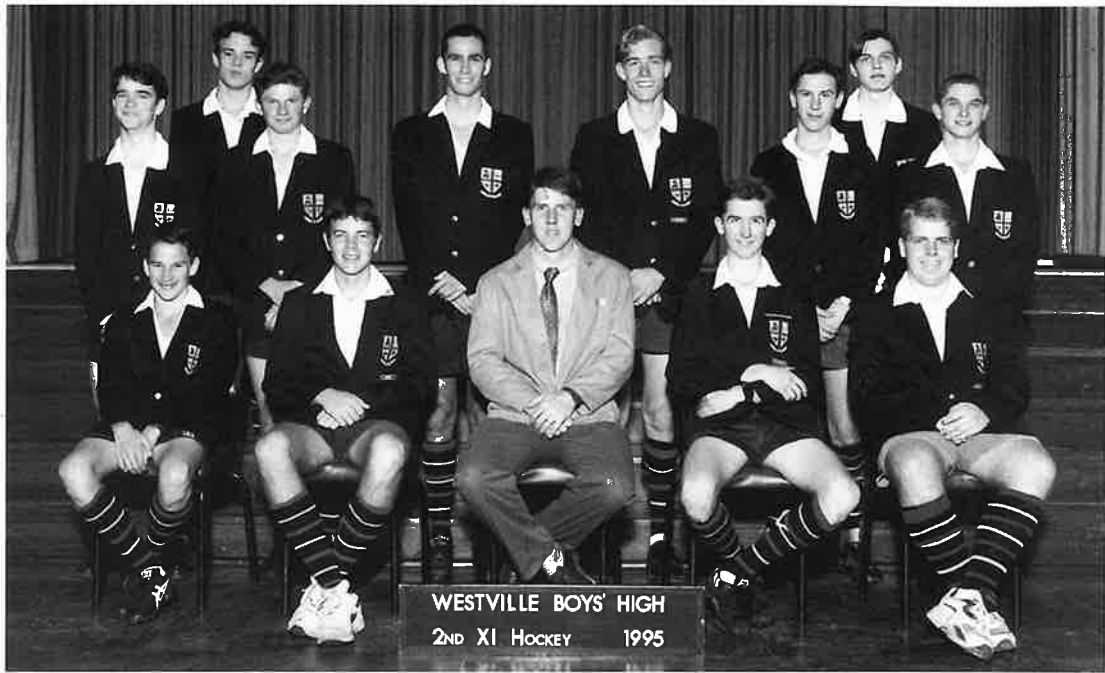

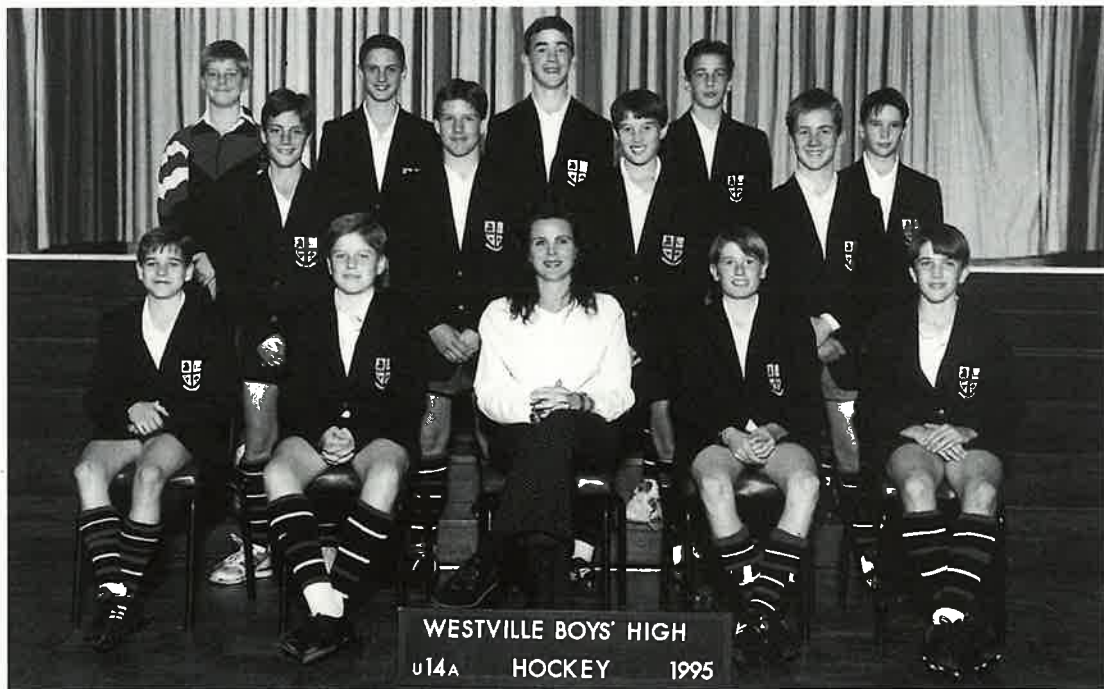


REPORT

LOCAL LEAGUE

The St Alban's game, which we considered a perfect dress rehearsal for Northwood, was won 26 - 0 and spirits were high but we only managed a 13 - 13 draw against our Durban North opponents. Many visiting supporters thanked us after the game for having allowed them a draw.

Although we lost the Michaelhouse game 11 - 23, the score flattered our hosts. Twice we scrummaged 5 m from their line on our ball, only to be sent back with penalties against us.

The best game of the season, and the one which provided some of the best rugby wit-

nessed in many years at Westville, was that against Hilton. With the teams locked 8 - 8 at half time and after absorbing immense pressure early in the 2nd half, Westville opened the taps and produced some scintillating rugby to win 16 - 8.

The College game came at a bad time for us as it was our last trial match before the overseas squad was chosen. It was an away game; it was in the midst of some hard games against Post-Matric sides, and we played with 14 men!! Enough said.

At DHS the following week we had our highly-fancied opponents struggling at 13 - 3 down at the break. Never has such anguish been seen on the faces

of DHS supporters; however, the DHS players changed their play from 'the man' to 'the ball' and with Westville giving away every bit of our hard-earned possession, they were able to rally around behind their little general, Wingfield, and score 4 goals in the second half. Thus we missed out on a golden opportunity, going down 13 - 34.

The Kearsney and Pinetown games are best forgotten for the lack of atmosphere and abundance of basic errors from both sides, but the final local game versus Glenwood was very encouraging (2nd only to the Hilton game) and the 24 - 17 gave us the perfect platform for our Australasian tour.

Overseas Rugby Tour

The Australian leg of the overseas tour kicked off with a game against a spirited 'B' division Mater Maria side in Sydney. The match took place on a 'paddock' with the going very heavy; however, in good old Westville tradition, we were gracious to our hosts, scoring only 38 unmatched points.

In the next game, due to either the revengeful determination of the Mater Maria Coach, who had lost to Oakhill College the previous week or the presence of the Mater Maria girls, our boys were well-motivated against the New South Wales champions, Oakhill. Our poor kicking and the height of their posts (5 m) allowed Oakhill to challenge in the final minutes of this international festival game, but they made a few errors under extreme pressure and we won 10 - 8.

The game against St Paul's, a private school from Hamilton, North Island, New Zealand, was like playing Maritzburg College all over again. They were much bigger than us (\pm 10 kgs per man) and after taking many knocks and 'hits', it was only our tackling that reduced the scoreline.

We ended the Australian leg of the tour with a hard-fought win over another Kiwi side, Taupo-min-a-Tia, - hard-fought because we opted to take the defensive, rather than offensive, role in that game.

We had four ex South African

supporters, including ex pupils and ex teachers, at the opening New Zealand game against Westlake Boys' High (Which is situated in the North Harbour of Auckland) but even this did not motivate the boys, and they turned in a very mediocre performance in wet conditions to lose 8 - 23 - but the pressures of the tour were starting to take their toll.

One of the most memorable occasions of the New Zealand experience was the game against Rotorua Boys' High, considered one of the top 3 teams in New Zealand. In conditions completely foreign to us (pouring rain and a waterlogged field, similar to last year's Springbok/Bay of Plenty game), we courageously defended the South African cause, going down 15 - 32 to a much bigger Maori-represented side.

Reporoa College in our penultimate game were no match for us but again, as good guests, we only scored 25 points to their 5.

Buller High School's beautifully manicured field, situated in the isolated coastal town of Westport on the South island with snow-clad mountains completing a perfect scene, was the venue for the final game of the tour and the season; however, the tranquil setting was in stark contrast to the battle that raged in front of the whole village. (It was ironic that the town's hospital was situated across the road). We sent in 12 fresh troops during

that game (that must be a first) but even with 80% ball we were unable to subdue a smaller gallant side. We found throughout our tour that Aussie/NZ sides concentrate more on defensive patterns than South African sides.

The 1995 Season has been like the scenery of New Zealand, full of contrasts. We have had our highs and lows, our rich experiences and our barren times, but considering our age and size in the local competition, and the fact that we played 8 games in 17 days in two countries, the players fared exceptionally well and can be proud of the way they represented Westville and South Africa.

The National flag was proudly displayed at all our tour matches.

The flight to Sydney via Johannesburg and Perth was, for most of us, a tiring but exhilarating experience. I doubt whether there is a more spectacular sight anywhere in the world than the view of Sydney from the air at night.

The week spent in Sydney with its spotlessly clean streets, countless beaches, and marvellous weather, was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

The singing of the Tour song by supporters and players certainly motivated our boys to play their hearts out. The singing of "Shosholoza" was to become one of the features of this tour, especially in response to the "Haka" performed by the New Zealand school sides just before the kick off.

The public transport system in Sydney is excellent and members of the Tour Group were able to spend a great deal of time exploring Sydney at their leisure.

A good win (38 - 0) against Mater Maria College - despite jet lag and unfamiliar conditions did much to boost the morale of the players.

The Rooty Hill International Rugby/Netball Tournament which was played on the grounds of the Rooty Hill Resort just outside Sydney, was well organised and gave the players the opportunity to meet a wide variety of people. Westville were runners-up in the Tournament in which schools from Australia, New Zealand and England participated. The highlight of the tournament was the narrow 10

Auckland, with its variable weather pattern, was a complete contrast to Sydney.....the difference in the weather pattern accounting for the contrast.

New Zealand people are extremely proud of their rugby tradition and had not taken lightly to coming second in the Rugby World Cup. A second passion for the Kiwis is their love of sailing, and we all realised, after a sightseeing tour of the city, why Auckland is called the "City of Sails". Ninety five percent of the population own yachts. New Zealand's win in the America's

Cup Yacht race had softened the blow of losing to South Africa in the World Cup final.

Our first rugby match on New Zealand soil was against Westlake Boys' High, a school very similar to ours in history and tradition.

The three hour drive to Rotorua was spectacular for its scenery, but better was yet to come. Rotorua, the city of thermal pools and geysers and a smell which reminded many of the science pupils in the tour group of the hydrogen sulphide experiments done in the Science labs back home, has a strong Maori culture.

The rugby match against Rotorua Boys' High, one of the top rugby schools in the country, can only be described as a mudbath. The match was thoroughly enjoyed by the players on both sides.

As a compliment to our perform-

ance on the field, the Rotorua players did the "Haka" and threw mud at the players while they sang "Shosholozha"....a truly memorable match.

A brief stay out in the country, a match against Reporoa, possum hunting and trout fishing, took the tour group to Wellington and then by ferry across the Cook Strait to New Zealand's South Island.

The ferry trip across the Cook Strait was one of the highlights of our tour. The three hour trip took us past Swiss-like scenery, cottages nestling in the hillside with their own private bays and the only access being by boat.

The journey from Picton to Westport (where we played our last game) was a breathtaking experience. A very skilled coach driver managed to thread his way through countless passes covered in snow.

At Westport, prior to our arrival,

there had been a great deal in the local press and on the local radio about the arrival of the first rugby team from South Africa since the visit of the Springboks in 1956. We were very well treated.

The Tour ended with two days skiing at Mount Hutt and a delayed departure from Sydney to Johannesburg.

The boys on Tour were a credit to the School and our country. In both countries we visited there is a deep respect for our rugby and the schooling system in South Africa.

The boys were exposed to a variety of lifestyles which ranged from a sophisticated urban style of living to the rural life in remote areas in New Zealand.

A tour well worth the time and money from both a sporting and educational point of view.

REPORT

REPORT

REPORT

The change in age groups from half years to full years has definitely had a negative effect upon the U15 age group. It was markedly apparent that most opposition teams, with the exception of Hilton, were far 'bigger' sides. The cliché 'size isn't everything' may have some merit but not when it comes to the basics of rugby. Despite this obvious disadvantage, the 'A' side did not lack in courage and commitment and they learnt the important lesson of fighting back in the face of overwhelming odds. To their credit, they suffered several heavy defeats but they kept their heads up and kept coming back. S Duncker, the captain, is to be praised for the role he played in motivating his team in the face of adversity. A leader of few words, he lead by example and inspired his team.

An area of weakness which

was exposed was the lack of mental discipline. The inability to sustain mental concentration throughout a 50 minute match was perhaps the most notable flaw of the team. The skill-based practices attempted to drill into players the 'basics', but sadly there was little carry over from practice to match. This is a flaw that every player will have to improve upon for next season. Few players stood out as 'stars' but mention must be made of flank, S Duncker, hooker, M Herman, centre, G Rutishauser, and fullback, M de Marigny, who show potential to become great first team players of the future.

The 'B' side showed much promise in their opening game against Port Shepstone 'A', playing disciplined and committed rugby to win comfortably. Unfortunately, this good start was not maintained due to two factors: injuries and changes in the 'A' side meant the loss of some of the better players; the gener-

ally small stature of our U15 age group, leading to some heavy losses and consequent drop in morale and discipline. Despite the limited success on the scorecard, there were some moments of real class and a number of players who improved considerably: G Marks, at scrumhalf, showed courage and flair; G Bishop, at prop, always gave 100% against some very large opposition; and M Sartor, at centre, scored some brilliant tries. The loose-forward trio of B Verster, J Ferreira and M Fletcher were the strength of the side and all played for the 'A' team on occasions.

A lack of enthusiasm and discipline on the part of some players handicapped the performance of the 'C' side.

There were, however, others who always gave of their best and played with spirit and commitment. It was the efforts of these players which made the season worthwhile as far as coaching was concerned.

The "E" side got off to a shaky start with two heavy defeats; however, towards the end of the season they managed to raise their game

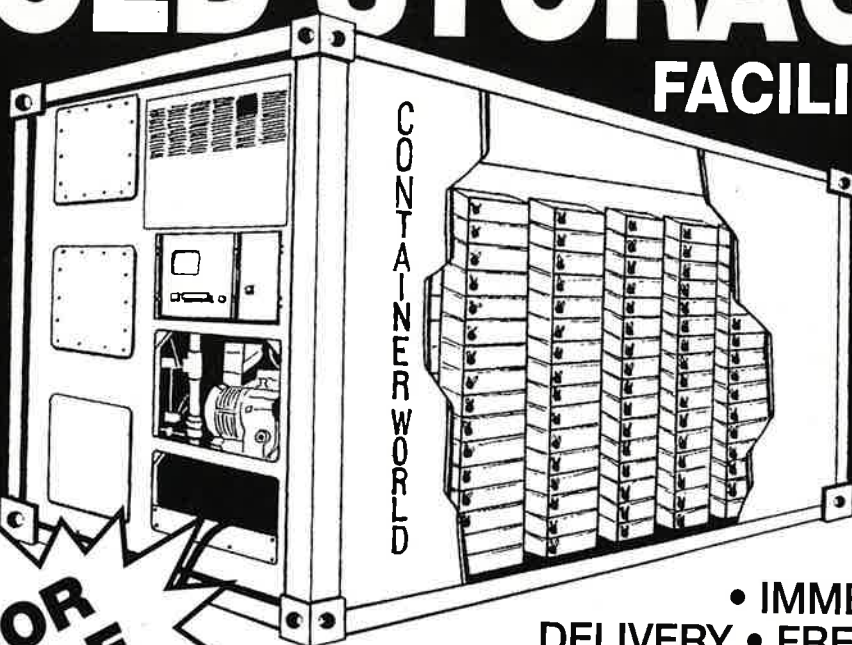

will allow all players the chance of playing regularly and developing their talents and skills. My thanks to those parents who so loyally supported the team and me during the season.

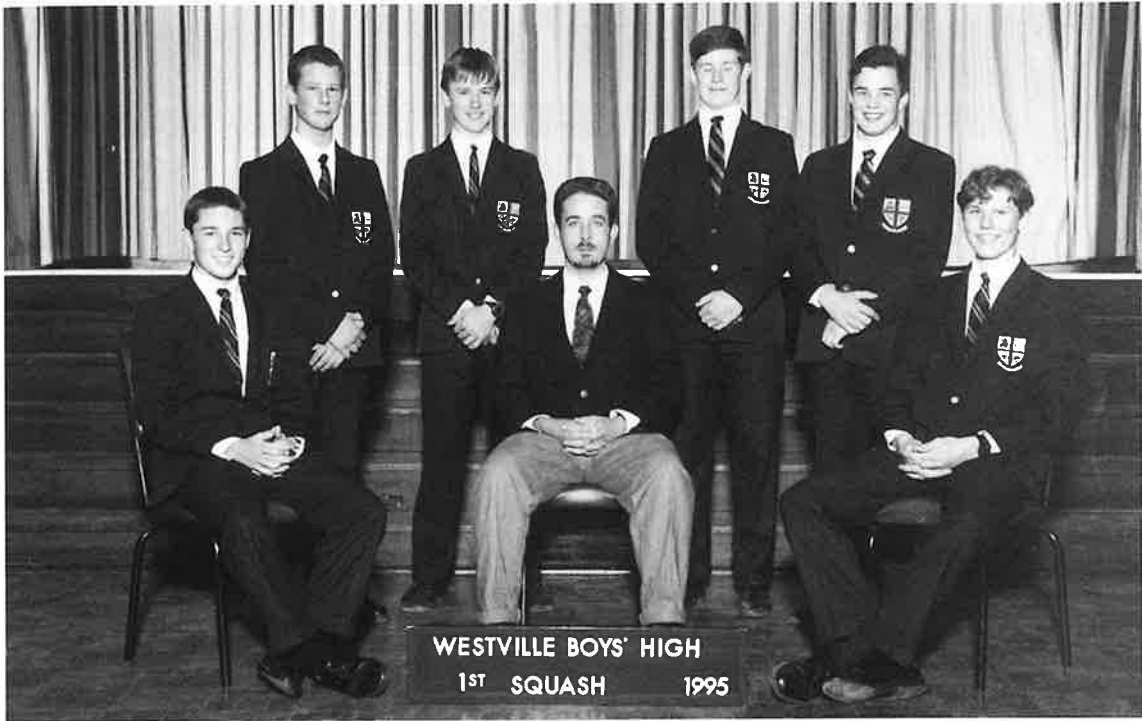

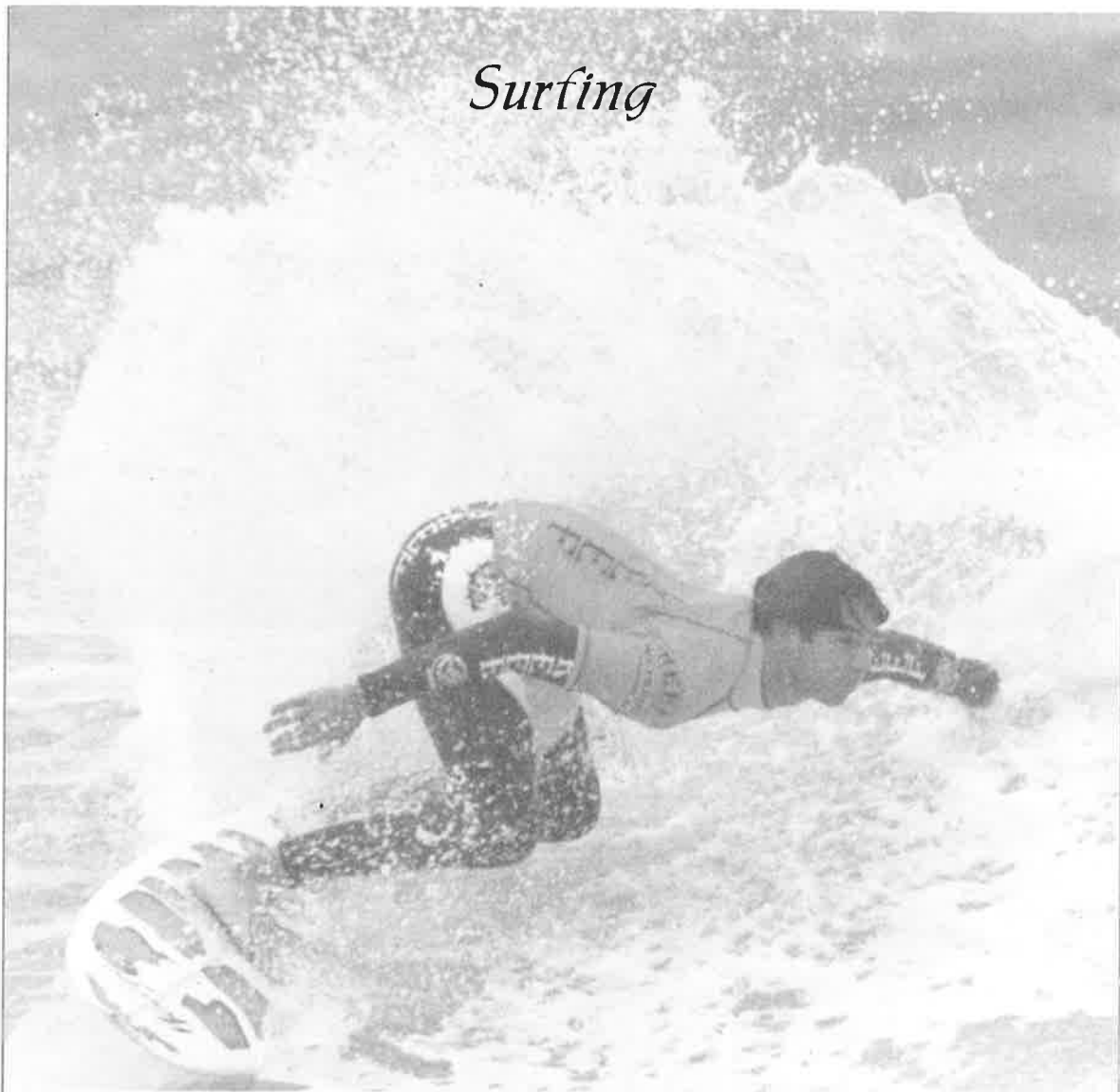

Westville entered one side comprising four U19, two U16 and 2 U14 members in this year's inter-school competition.

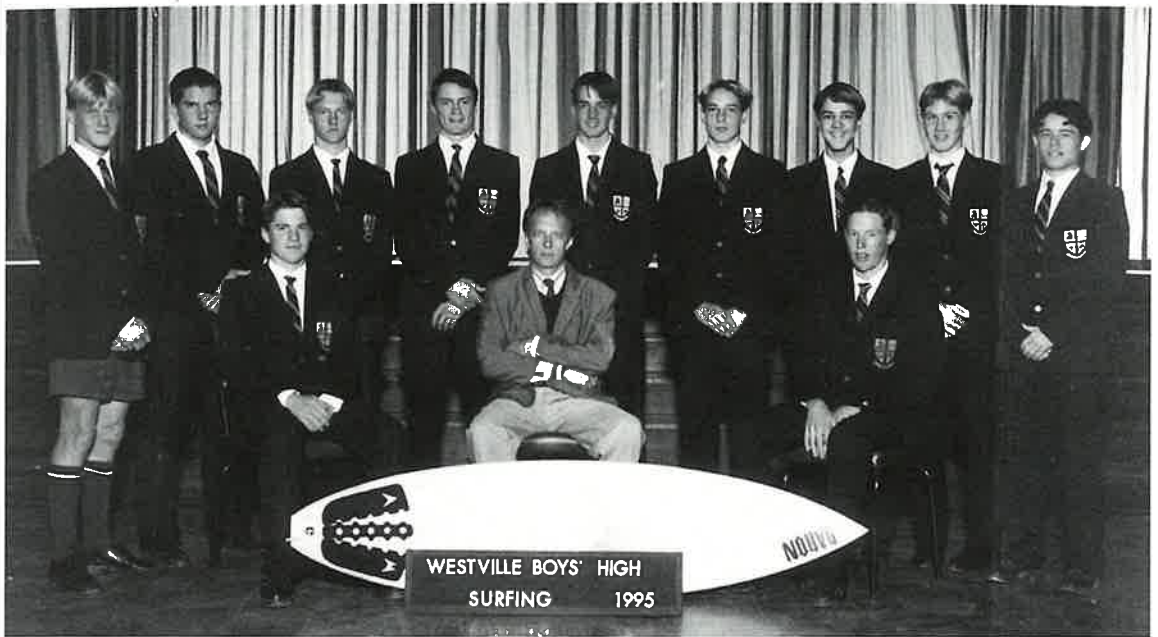
The team was especially strong in the senior ranks but suffered from inexperience in the juniors. Hope-

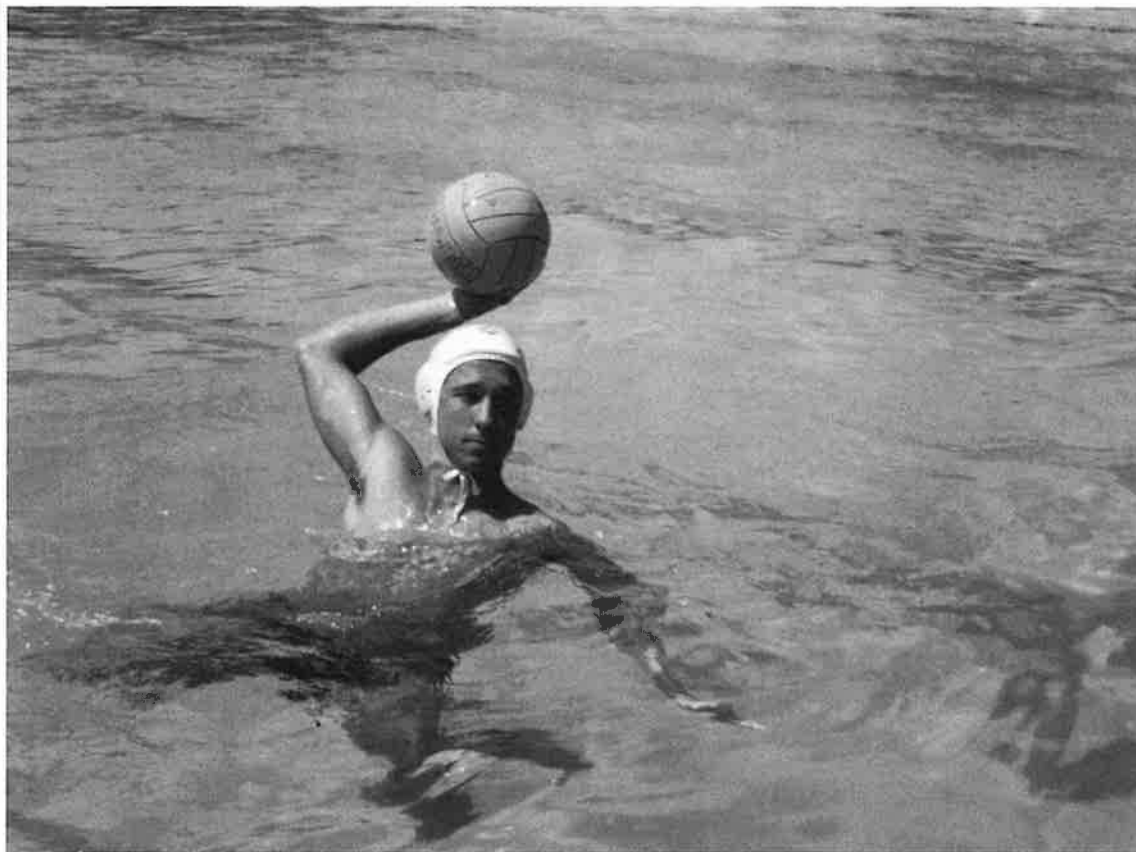

was soon pressed into action at a tournament at King's Park. With two good wins against Kloof and Northwood, the foundations were laid for a promising tour.

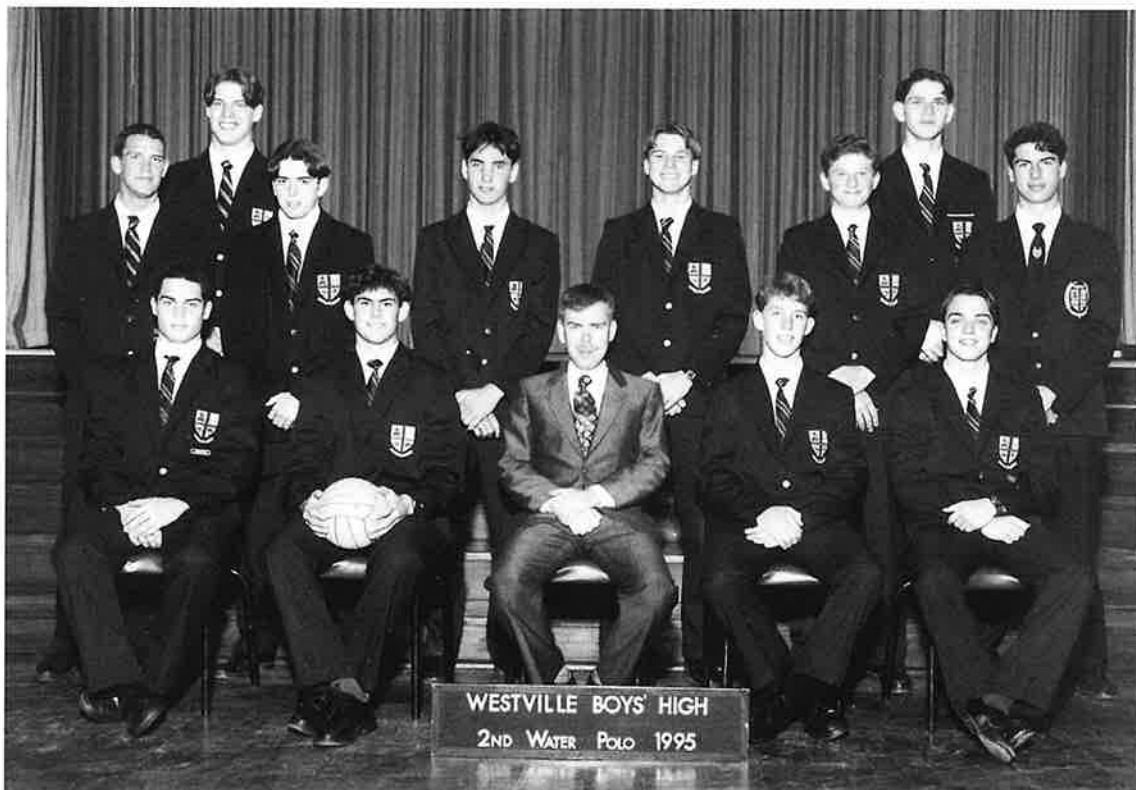
Arriving in Cape Town with some trepidation the team soon sent out a warning that they were a force with which to be reckoned.

Westville Boys' High School Educational Trust

The Trust's financial resources during 1995 were devoted solely to the relocation, expansion and furnishing of the School library. The project was completed during April 1994 at a cost of R505 000 and was financed by means of donations to the Trust (R245 000) and a loan from the School Fund to the Trust of R260 000.

Donations received during the current year have been used to service this loan and no new projects were undertaken by the Trust during 1995; however, there are a number of projects which require attention in

1996, such as replacement of audio visual equipment and pupils' computers.

Furthermore, changing education structures will impact greatly on all Schools in the country, and it is anticipated that the Trust will be called upon to play an increasingly significant role with regard to staffing and the maintenance of facilities.

Support of the Trust, in the form of pledges and donations by parents, is therefore vitally necessary to its continued existence.

The School is again indebted to Mr Richard Watt and his team of fund raisers for their efforts in this regard.

It is important that the role of the Educational Trust be appreciated. The School fee structure makes provision for the maintenance and replacement of assets of the School. The Trust, however, has played a major role over the past eleven years in contributing to our high educational standards through the upgrading of the School's infrastructure.

With the movement towards semi-private status, the School has, over the past decade, relied upon the Trust for assets that would otherwise not have been provided. The upgrading of laboratories and the media

centre, the two audio-visual rooms, computerisation, and the gymnasium, are a few examples of the projects undertaken by the Trust since its inception.

With the increase of school fees, the fund-raising committee was again faced with an extremely difficult task in 1995 in its campaign to generate funds. Pledges to the Trust are usually made over a five-year period, and the challenge facing the fund-raising committee is to ensure that the pledges received from new donors offset those of donors approaching the end of their terms, as well as compensating for the effects of inflation.

An audio-visual presentation was made to the parents of new pupils, and Mr Lichkus is to be thanked for his assistance to Mr Watt in this regard. In response to this appeal, pledges from 133 new donors, totalling R294 300, were received. The generosity of these donors is well appreciated by the School, its governing body and staff. The campaign committee have made it a priority to point out that the school fees of R2 400 per annum do not cover much of the needed capital expenditure. The additional voluntary contributions to the Trust, which are tax-deductible, are essential for the School to maintain its position as one of the leading high schools in the country.

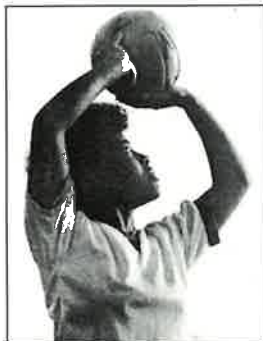

Two of its major special projects for 1996 are the complete refurbishment of the team-teaching room and the second phase of equipping and refurbishing the new computer centre. Our fundraising sub-committee has been very successful in contributing significantly to the overseas rugby tour and to the school games fund. This fund has in turn built a new basketball court and has made other valuable contributions to various games and cultural activities.

Our congratulations and thanks to the management of the school for a job well done over the past year. The partnership of the school and the Governing Body will continue to provide the very best all round education for our sons throughout 1996 and into the future.

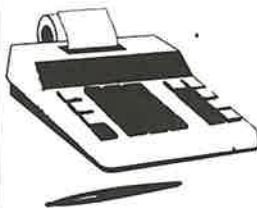
