A Message from the Headmaster

WHEN GENERAL STAFFORD, seated with the Russian cosmonauts in space, was asked if he had any advice for young people he replied: "Young people ought to decide on what they want to do . . . and then stay with that decision until they do it."

The time has come for a clear decision to be made on where we are going. The school is a good place in which to learn to discipline oneself, to learn loyalty in its basic sense and prepare to meet the challenges which will be encountered throughout life.

The Education Department has indicated that parents are required to take over more and more financial obligations in the maintenance of facilities at the school. The amenities provided in the past have to be repaired and cared for by the school, an expense which will fall upon the parents.

It is my intention to meet all the expenses by careful budgeting of the school funds but the onus does rest on the shoulders of each and every family to meet the very nominal amount charged each year.

To date R3 600 is outstanding. This can only mean that there must be a curtailment of expenditure, or we shall have to resort to fêtes and fund raising which disrupt teaching and studying. Fund raising is not the essential function of a school.

To parents who have paid their school funds promptly and assisted with further donations and other support, my sincere appreciation.

It must be clearly understood that amenities do not constitute a school, for a school comprises the parents, pupils and teachers and the spirit that combines them into an integrated unit determined to do its best for its pupils, for education and for the community.

Speech Day

MR R. A. F. SWART presented a most thought-provoking address in which he examined many facets of the change which had taken place in the world and developed the theme that man must also change and adapt to survive.

Murray Erasmus, a matriculant and one of our senior debaters, presented his impression of his high school career:

Standard 6 to Standard 10 in Five Painful Steps

1973 was the year in which most of the Matrics here tonight arrived at Westville Boys' High School in Standard 6. The day before school started I was almost paralysed with fear, because the horrors and terrors of high school life had been explained to me with some sadistic glee by my brother, at that time in Matric. It was with great apprehension that I stepped out of the car, in my short pants, long socks and blazer two sizes too large, to face high school. But my fears were relieved to some extent when I saw that I was not alone; there were 150 other callow and neurotic second-formers trying to appear as inconspicuous as possible, but still managing somehow to stick out like sore thumbs.

As the days passed, we learned rapidly, sometimes painfully, to toe the line at all times. The creed of the prefects of that year was simply, "If we can bring just one little smile to one little face today — then somebody's slipped up somewhere" or "If it moves, jump on it". How many of us do not recall the notorious prefect "Gabby", the rotund giant, who struck fear into the hearts of the second form — even today the mere mention of his name is enough to set my knees knocking and my pupils dilating.

Perhaps I over-emphasize the fears which we endured; it wasn't as bad as all that, and I am sure it was taken with a certain light-heartedness. Indeed, we did have great fun, and formed many close associations, the majority of which we retain today. Above all, however, we learned the dying art of humility and we began to set ourselves goals and objectives, although not always in conformity with the powers-that-be, but nonetheless enthusiastic.

We understood for the first time perhaps, what it means to be laughed at. It was a memorable and enjoyable initiation to our careers at high school and we were soon to realize that high school would be as enjoyable as each one of us would make it.

Standard 7 saw us relinquish our short pants, caps and long socks for a new symbol, a great symbol, that marked our promotion to semi-seniority, "long trousers". At last we could wear the cherished long trousers, although the growth which inevitably accompanies adolescence soon reduced the longs to half-mast symbols of maturation. No longer could anyone see our knees vibrate when we were scared

and we could now stroll past the second formers with a derisive sneer on our faces, and stare at them with that arrogant, self-confident look born of 12 months falsetto exuberance. No longer would we have to sit on the floor in assembly, we were allowed to sit on the hall chairs! Oh yes, it was these small privileges that made life so worthwhile.

Standard 7 was also the year in which we had to make probably the first major decision in our lives. Scarcely being able to spell the word "mathematics" we had to decide which courses we would take in the next three years. I was a little scared of choosing Biology as one of my subjects, as I had a great fear of names such as phosphoglyceraldehyde or deoxyribonucleic-acid. But I chose Biology in preference to Latin which seemed to me to be some barbaric culture with homosexual undertones in which we learnt how "The sailor loves the farmer, the sailor used to love the farmer and the sailor will love the farmer"; and that "bos-bovis" can be masculine or feminine in gender but that it still means an "ox". Instead I felt the knowledge that an earthworm has 147 segments with three holes in each segment held far more promise.

On promotion to Standard 8, we had accepted school life for what it was — a fair amount of work and a lot of fun, with both staff and pupils contributing commonly. And we began to realise that the staff were not totally inhuman.

Indeed, by the time we reached Standard 9, we had established a close rapport with some staff members. At last we had sorted out our ideas and we knew what we wanted from life. We had found our close friends and shrugged off those who were undesirable. We had moved the full circle to individuality and were ready to face the challenge of Matric.

And so to the final school year, and the year that will mould our future, we went. Personally I feel that has been one of the most beneficial and enjoyable years of all. Some of you must be wondering how I can make such a bold statement. You ask "How can he enjoy the year with so much to do; what about all the work?" A good question, a fair question, and one that I intend to ignore altogether tonight.

Seriously, I do feel that this has been one of the most enjoyable years, in that we have sorted out our priorities, have been recognised for what we are by our peers and teachers, and have begun to understand our friends and ourselves.

When we leave the school we will be saying goodbye to old friends, some of whom we may not see again, and goodbye to teachers who have, to some extent, moulded and fashioned our characters. To these people we owe a debt of sincere gratitude.

We should now confidently hope that as we leave our youth, and start on the road to adulthood, we will be equipped to face the ever-increasing problems that lie ahead, and that we will work towards a society in which material pursuits are not the ends of our lives, a

society in which morality and ethical values are held in high regard and one in which we can find a place for every person!

Thank you very much.

Nicholas Kilpin, Head Prefect for 1977, delivered an address in which he thanked the boys, the parents and the staff for their co-operation and hard work for the school. He wished the Sixth Form every success. He concluded by quoting a previous Head Boy:

"Our debt to our school lies in knowledge, discipline, experience of close fellowship, and sport. The foundation for our future lives has been set and it is up to us to build a sturdy structure on this foundation. How do we repay? I have no doubt it is by our later achievement in life, not materially only, but morally and spiritually; in the full development of our personalities and in a proud loyalty to our school."

Our initial three-year plan is completed in its entirety with a shortfall of R3 000. We expect to receive this amount in outstanding school funds by the end of the year.

Newsletters. So far this year eight newsletters and four information bulletins have been sent out to keep parents informed of school activities.

The Highway Youth Council. The Highway Youth Council is a charitable and "self-development" organisation, founded some years ago by the Jaycees of Pinetown. Projects in the fields of charity, civic affairs and leadership are undertaken.

Westville Boys' High School is represented by: P. Steenkamp, R. Brien, M. Powell, G. Kirk, C. Atkinson and D. Bayley.

Biology Excursions. The Standard 8 and Standard 10 pupils spent a day in the Beachwood mangrove swamp. This has recently been taken over by the Natal Parks Board for permanent conservation purposes. Pupils made a detailed study of the structure and specialised adaptations of the plant and animal life in this unique ecosystem with a view to broadening their understanding of the environment and, in particular, the importance of estuaries and related mangrove swamps to the coastal ecology.

Standard 9 pupils travelled to the Umhlanga River mouth area to study the ecology and growth of the sand dunes, the dune scrub and the coastal forest area in order to understand the importance of the undisturbed sequence of these zones to the entire coastal forest vegetation.

Science Week. More than forty pupils entered but none succeeded in reaching the top hundred in the country.

Mathematics Olympiad. Twenty-two boys were entered but no one qualified for the finals.

Business Game. Our team again participated in the Inter-School Business Game. A rash pricing decision unfortunately resulted in their being defeated in the first round.

Students' Christian Association. One of the highlights of the year was winning the Natal Inter-School Bible Quiz in which twenty-six schools participated. The school was well represented at the S.C.A. Leadership Camp held during the October holidays. Throughout the year the S.C.A. has been very active and support at meetings has been excellent. Two meetings have been held each week and full use has been made of guest speakers and films.

Leadership Courses. D. Posel and D. Sloan attended a course for "Tomorrow's Leaders" during April.

G. French was nominated for a Michaelmas Rotary Leadership Course which was unfortunately cancelled.

L. Buxton attended a Leadership Course at Port Shepstone during October.

D. McEwan and S. Rothman attended a Veld and Vlei Leadership Course at Estcourt during December and January. S. Lennert and N. Bense have been accepted for a Veld and Vlei Leadership Course during December 1977.

Geographical Society. This Society is designed to give boys a general interest in things geographical irrespective of school courses they may follow. The inaugural meeting proved that there would be plenty of scope for enthusiasts.

During the year several films of interest were shown. Talks were also arranged. Members of the Astronomy Society gave a lecture on stars as well as a slide show. This was an immensely successful meeting.

A talk was also given by Mr Cotterell on the Palmiet Nature Reserve. The Society is grateful to these gentlemen for their assistance for which we tender our thanks.

Surfing. The Inter-House Surfing Contest was held at Dairy Beach during the first term. Swain won, followed by Carr, Wandsbeck and Cliff.

The Junior Surfing Club held two competitions but conditions were poor.

Outdoor Society. Several groups of boys walked along the Transkei coast enjoying the unspoiled scenery and sharing an experience that has been lost in our modern society: having to rely on their own resources and ingenuity.

Photographic Club. After a slow start with a relatively poor enrolment, a competition "Look at the People" was held. From registration and entry fees, prizes were awarded to the value of R10, with both first and second prizes being won by J. Chananie and the third prize by P. Jamieson.

A competition was organised with an attractive first prize of R10 for the best sports photograph of the year. The response was encouraging but the quality of the prints was disappointing. The prize money, sponsored by the school, was therefore divided among five boys — A. Melville, P. Jamieson, J. Chananie, R. Brien and M. Rennie.

Radio Club. The Radio Club has been most active this year and holds meetings either weekly or bi-weekly. At most of the meetings, pupils swap information on radio stations, new frequencies to listen to, bulletins from stations as far away as Japan and the Vatican, Canada and the Philippines. Regular reports on reception conditions are sent to foreign radio stations such as Australia and Israel. Cards from many world-wide radio stations are received and put on display for all to view. An exhibition of this kind was held in the library early in the year.

A monthly magazine is produced for distribution to members in the school.

Yachting. During the past year several boys have distinguished themselves at national and provincial championships throughout South Africa. Martin Payne was awarded Senior Natal Colours. David Collins and Brian King sailed in the Natal Dabchick Championships at the Albert Falls Dam, coming 4th and 5th respectively. David gained a very creditable 10th place at the 1976 Dabchick National and also won the Under 15 trophy. Wade Janion sailed in the 1977 Mirror 14 Nationals and Craig McKenzie sailed in the 1977 Sprog National Offshore in Durban.

Derek King sailed in the 1976 Sprog National at the Allemanskraal Dam in the Orange Free State.

Numerous other W.B.H.S. yachtsmen sailed exceptionally in various junior regattas during 1977.

However the highlight of the year was the Annual Natal Inter-Schools Regatta held at Midmar Dam on 16 October. Westville fielded a strong team of Mirror 14's and Dabchicks and altogether twenty yachts from W.B.H.S. entered. It is discouraging to note that this entry was made up almost entirely of senior boys, indicating a declining interest in the sport among the juniors. Altogether 177 yachts, representing over 20 Natal schools, started the first of the two races. In the Dabchick class D. Collins and B. King finished in the first five, but in the light variable winds D. King after being "motherless" on the first beat, could contribute only a 10th place. In the Mirrors M. Payne and B. Ross finished well. However a thunderstorm turned the afternoon race into a battle of skill, seamanship and strength. In the strong gusty winds D. Collins came 2nd, D. King 3rd and B. King 5th. This

result ensured that Westville had beaten Maritzburg College. Westville won the Natal Inter-Schools Sailing Trophy for the first time, becoming the first coastal school to do so.

The Mirror team fared less well but again the efforts of Ross and Payne deserve mention.

The Ballroom Dancing Club. During the Second Term this year a Ballroom Dancing Club was formed at school. Partners were provided by girls from the Girls' High School. The Committee arranged many basic dancing lessons permitting members to learn the ballroom dances — Waltz, Quickstep and Foxtrot, and the Latin-American dances — Rumba, Cha-Cha and Samba.

Several dancing evenings were organised enabling pupils to put their lessons into practice.

G. Brookbanks is to be commended for his assistance.

Gymnastics. Gary King won the Natal High School Open competition and came second in the S.A. High School Championships. He was awarded gold medals for the floor exercise and parallel bars, silver medals for horizontal bar, vaulting and rings and a bronze medal for pommel horse.

He was also awarded Junior Springbok Colours and toured the United States of America. The South African side was unable to compete at the U.S.A. National Competition.

Thanks. The school relies very much on the assistance, generosity and support of all parents. To those who contributed their school funds without any coercion, our sincere thanks.

The school is indeed fortunate in having mothers who organise, prepare and serve refreshments with such charm and enthusiasm. A school gains in reputation by the manner in which orange juice, plates of food and cups of tea are served to visiting teams, guests and parents.

To the ladies who have worked so tirelessly in the school gardens and grounds planting and tending, I can only say, the attractive appearance of the school is their reward.

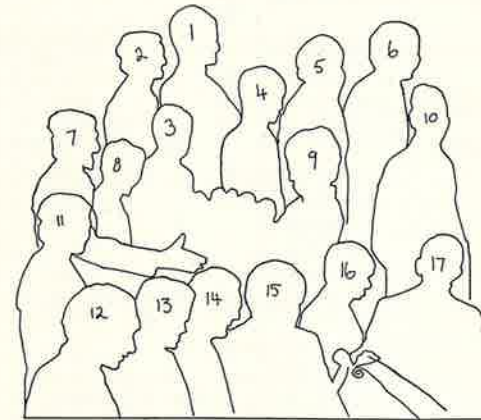

OUR GENERATION IS NO LESS MORAL THAN ANY OTHER

IN AN ESSAY of this nature it is vital to firstly define morality and immorality. A convenient definition of morality is behaviour which helps others and that of immorality behaviour which harms others. A narrow and less useful definition would concern itself with only the sexual side of morality.

A commonly expressed opinion of the older generation is that our present age is of slipping moral standards. These people point out as evidence the permissiveness, noticeably among adolescents, of our age. Examples given are hippies, dropouts, drug addicts and unmarried couples living together.

However it is well known that elderly persons tend to remember their younger days in a warm glow of euphoria and there is no evidence that human principles or human nature has changed for the worse. When our grandparents were young, for instance, the first and most dreadful of world wars was raging and destroying many of the conventional moral principles. Before the war the West believed in Victorian standards. During the war the faith in right and wrong was shaken. How could God allow one man's crass stupidity to cause millions of deaths? The fact that most people of today realize that God's laws have no influence over certain people shows that religion has not declined since World War One. World War Two produced men such as Stalin and Hitler. The latter's genocide of the Jews shows the lowest in human behaviour and my generation has certainly not sunk anywhere near that low.

The Victoria Era is made out by many to be the most upright of ages. Only brief readings of Dickens will show that this age was as decadent as any other. The irrefutable evidence for this is, among others, the existence of houses of prostitution and of child labour. The Romans were intrinsically an upright and orderly society. Their early, simple and puritanical approach to living was summed up by three basic principles: "pietas, gravitas, veritas" — humility, seriousness and manliness. Despite this, they provide some of the most shocking and immoral examples of behaviour in recorded human history; the violent and excessive actions of Nero in the burning of Rome and in his dealings with the Christians spring to mind immediately. The Greeks were the first to be concerned with morality. The philosophers such as Socrates worked out high standards of human behaviour. Nevertheless this made them no less prone to petty warfare and slavery. It is surprising to note that this civilization accepted homosexuality. In fact, no matter what age is considered, examples of shockingly immoral behaviour will crop up again and again.

Cricket Report

FIRST XI

The 1977 1st XI had a very disappointing record indeed, winning only one match during the year and losing seven. As a result the season, at times, seemed depressingly long, but, to their credit, the team members showed a great deal of determination at the end of the year. Although we lost the final match to D.H.S., it was a fine game of cricket and the team showed tenacity and fighting spirit. The existence of this new self-confidence was evident too in the early games of Offord Week. The fielding, which had been mediocre during most of the year, was an outstanding feature during this period and it has been pleasing to end the season on such an enthusiastic note.

In the first term the batting was very brittle and each week the side struggled to make runs. It was in this department that the most progress was made and many high scores were recorded during the fourth quarter. Whereas the team had relied largely on the batting of Craze and Christopher Lister-James in the first quarter, Reid, De Chazal, Jeremy Lister-James and Chandler all began to score runs in the latter part of the season. Reid and Craze, when they concentrated, were both capable of good innings and Reid in particular showed pleasing aggression. De Chazal gained in confidence and showed concentration and determination in making a series of useful scores. Moon, a very aggressive batsman, has had a disappointing year but should do well next year. The two Lister-Jameses, Chandler, Buxton and Bense gave us considerable depth to our batting.

The bowling was not a great strength and relied far too heavily on O'Donoghue who bowled superbly all year but with little luck. The opening bowlers, Moon and De Chazal, were steady but not penetrative. Buxton and Chandler bowled at the end of the season and show much promise for next year. One of the big weaknesses of the team's bowling was the tendency to bowl short, and next year's team must concentrate on keeping the ball up to the bat.

Although not a successful year, the team improved considerably and did not give up, and by the end of the year they

could hold their own with most of the stronger sides in Natal schools.

Rugby Report

FIRST XV

OUR FIRST IMPRESSIONS of this team formed during pre-season training and trials were unanimous — this was going to be a lean season, a season for building for 1978. Frequent comments in discussions of the forthcoming season were invariably related to the lack of size and experience. However, in our prejudgment we were excluding the most important factor — their psyche — the non-physical force driving these boys. This component and the wonderful support by fellow pupils and parents changed the predicted lean season into a season that equalled Westville's best and achieved new heights in approach to the game.

The first match is always important, especially if it is played "at home", as in this match the pattern for the season is often set. This was true in many respects of our first match — against St. Henry's. It was close, hard-fought and, as was the case in many of the matches to follow, we relied on P. Moon's boot to score the bulk of the points (12 out of 16), while determined tackling stopped the opposition from scoring the points they needed to win. The courage of this team was exemplified by G. Macmillan who received two crunching tackles that would have intimidated if not sidelined many bigger players and he came back to deal with his opponent in a similar manner. The balance of the points were scored by K. Fritsch, a try that resulted from a fine "wheel" and drive by the whole pack.

We played D.H.S. twice this season, the first encounter was at D.H.S. on their Founder's Day. Westville took the first ten minutes to settle down but allowed them to score 13 points while doing so. D.H.S. continued to win most of the possession for the remainder of the match but Westville defended well to hold off their persistent attack, and only a further 6 points apiece were added. In our second meeting, at Westville, we led for most of the match but unfortunately the game deteriorated and Westville lost two key players through injuries. With our pattern broken we were unable to hold the much bigger D.H.S. pack, even though it was a player short, and they ran out winners.

Highlights of the season were wins against strong teams from Glenwood (15-10), Northlands (16-15), Queen's College, Queenstown (10-6), and Kingswood High, Grahamstown (18-11). Much of the credit for our win over Glenwood, a team that convincingly beat D.H.S., must be attributed to the clever use of the ball by D. de Chazal and L. Buxton. Their breaks and accurate tactical kicking confused the big Glenwood pack as they were unaccustomed to retreating. Queen's were a big strong side with very fast loose forwards and threequarters. It was an extremely tight match, three-all at half-time. Weary and frustrated Queen's tired in the last quarter and allowed Westville to take command. From a scrum near the line D. McEwan was quick on to his opposite number and I. McLean dived on the loose ball to score. Against Northlands I. McLean was again the sole try scorer after forcing his way across the line near the corner. The other twelve points came from P. Moon's boot — the first penalty of this match gave him his 100th point for the season. The match against Kingswood was played in rain on a very soggy Bowden's II, the main field being inundated, conditions that Kingswood are more accustomed to than we are. K. Gallocher scored from fullback after replacing J. Blewett who was injured in the first few minutes, and G. Woollatt also scored. P. Moon kicked superbly out of the mud to convert both tries and goal two penalties.

In a hard and fast match against Port Natal the scores were even until Westville had a five-minute lapse in tackling that allowed Port Natal to score two goals. With their powerful well-drilled pack and their strong-running backs they were on attack most of the game. Westville's 9 points were all penalties kicked by Moon.

When finally analysing the season the points scored seem unimportant when compared to the manner and spirit in which the game is played. In this respect the team was outstanding. They were humble when victorious and they lost with grace and even when against heavy odds they were steadfast, spirited but played within the laws of the game. 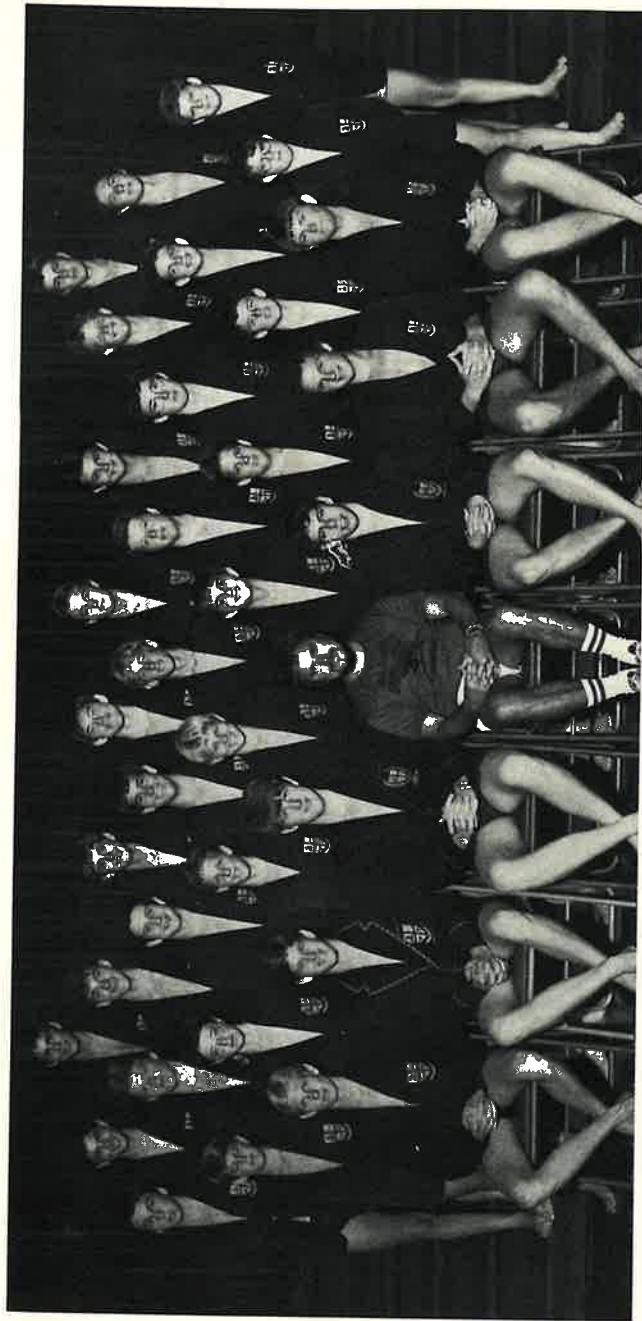

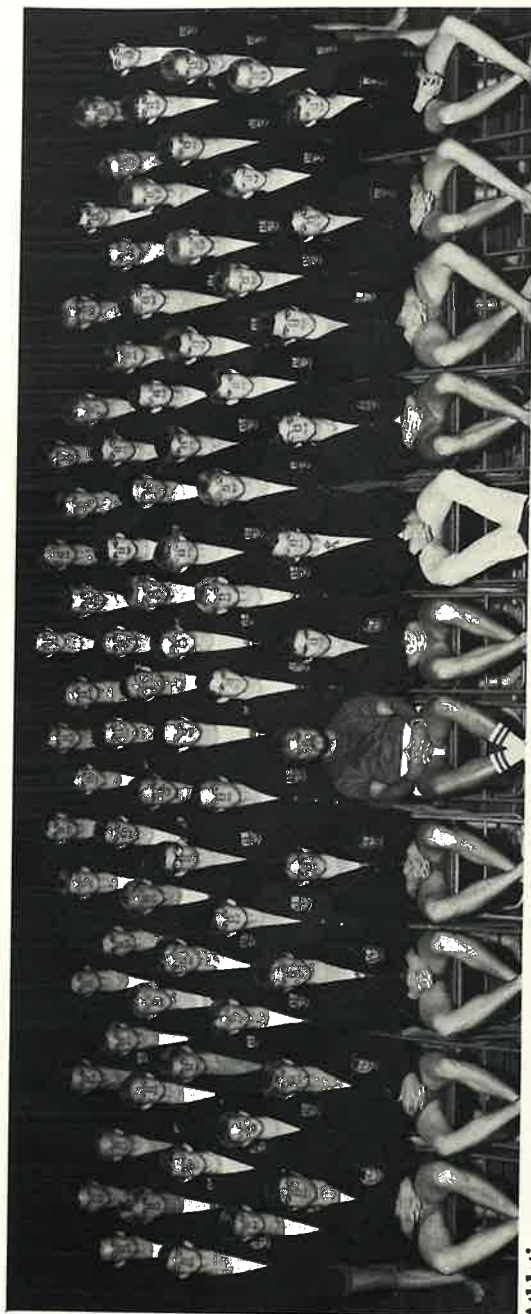

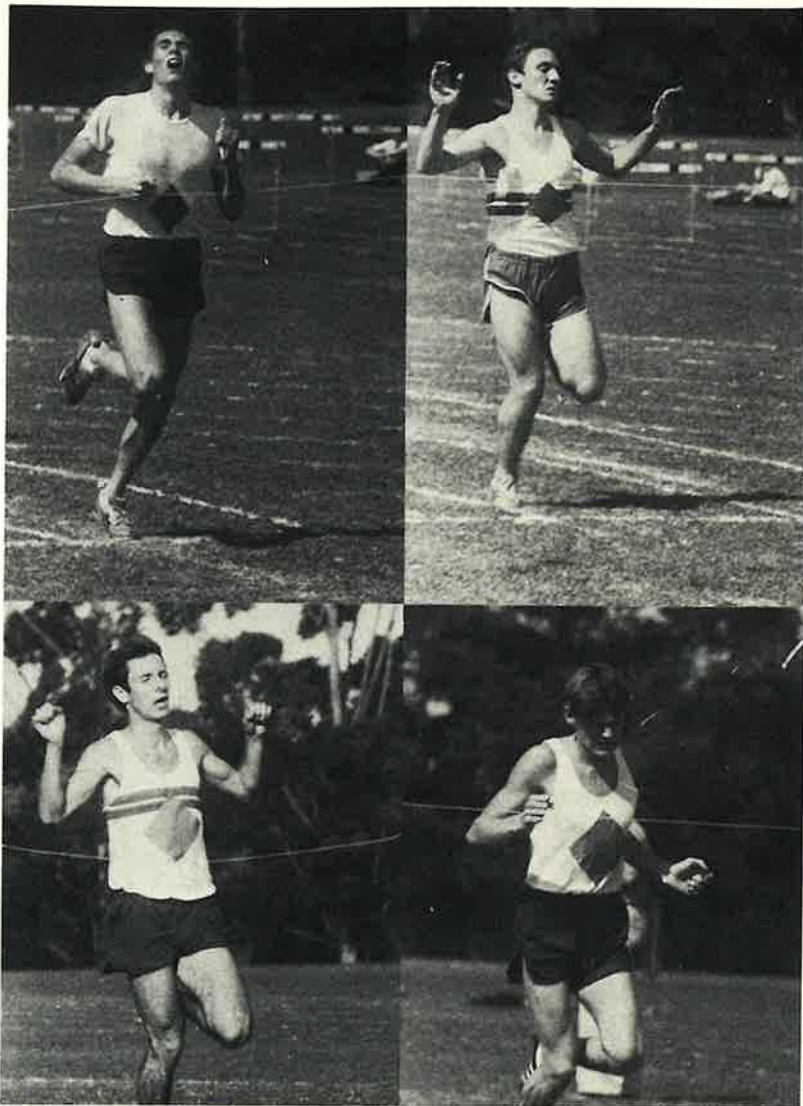
A fairly large squad of athletes will compete in school colours throughout the summer in club meetings.

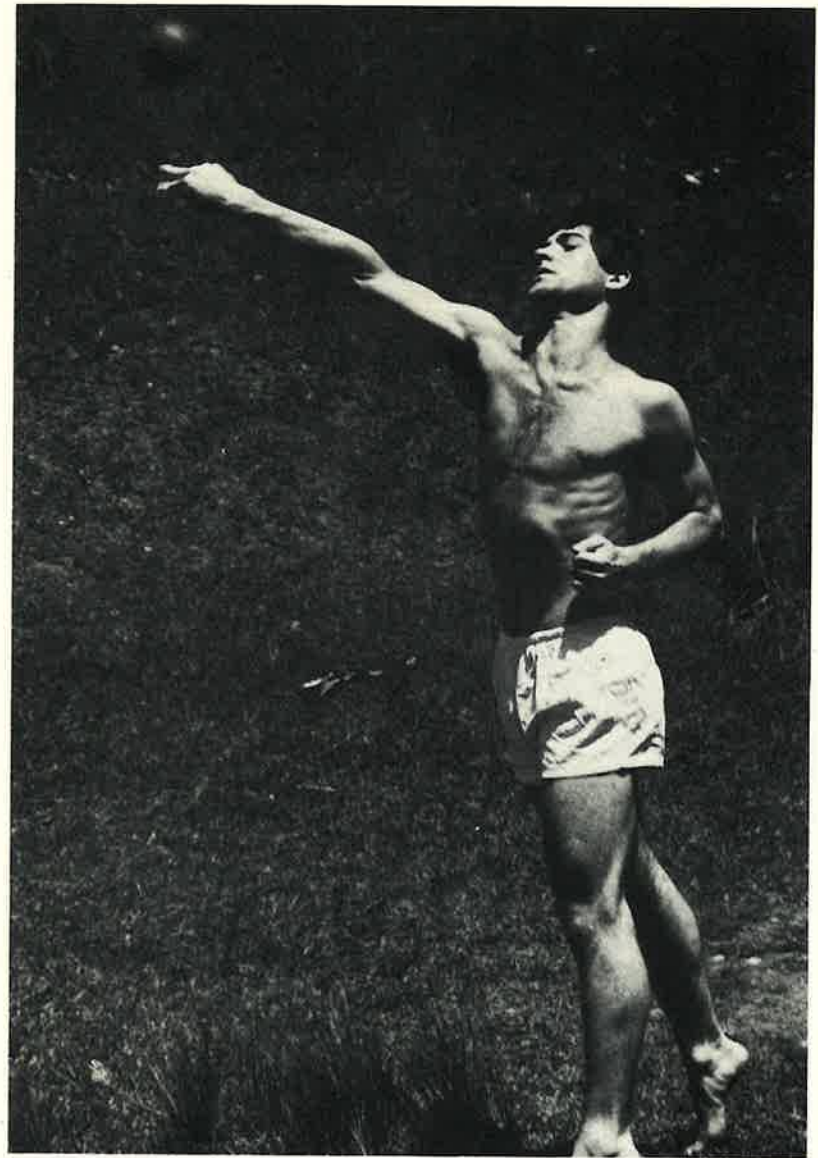

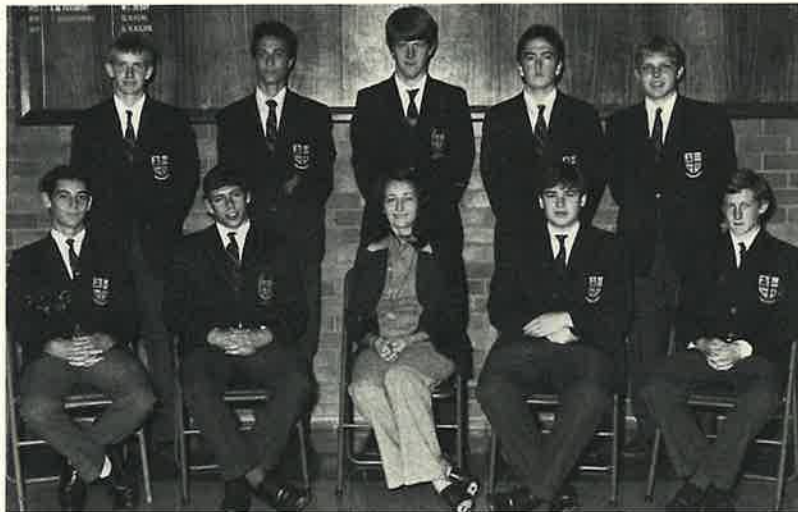

Conservation Symposium: Biology Project

MURRAY ERASMUS and Craig Hilton-Taylor presented their illustrated talk for the "Symposium on Conservation and Pollution" during the third term. Their topic was "The Importance of the Pioneer Dunes at Umhlanga and the Conservation Effort at Beachwood". They systematically studied the basic structure of our coastal dunes in which stress was laid on the need for the undisturbed sequence of these dunes which would ensure a stable coastal environment. They also studied the damage to the dunes at

Beachwood and the conservation efforts to preserve these dunes and the mangrove swamps from destruction.

In the Durban semi-finals, they tied with Mitchell High School for first place, and in the finals of all schools, tied with Newcastle High for third place.

That first and third places were separated by only two points indicates the keenness of the competition. Congratulations to M. Erasmus and C. Hilton-Taylor.

School Advisory Committee

1977 HAS BEEN a quiet, uneventful year as far as fund-raising projects have been concerned. However, with the limited funds at our disposal we have accomplished a great deal.

The paving of the area on the left of the entrance to the school has been completed. The area in front of the senior tuck shop has also been paved.

Finishes to the recently completed Bowden's Pavilion have also been undertaken. Carpeting in the dining area has been laid, novilon floor coverings have been laid in the ladies' cloakroom, the referees' room, the men's cloakroom and the kitchen. NATAL CARBINEERS Rifleman Gary Melville Pakes is recovering in 1 Military Hospital after being injured in a landmine explosion in the operational area.

The 21-year-old Carbineer was driving along a road through the bush to fetch a patrol section when his vehicle struck the mine. He and his co-driver, Rfn Tjel Olsen of Pinetown, were evacuated from the scene by helicopter — coincidentally piloted by another Natal man doing border duty in the operational area at the time, Captain Ray Houghton of 19 Squadron.

Rifleman Pakes is well on the road to recovery from burns and fractures.

Rifleman Pakes's parents were approached by a Military Chaplain within

24 hours of the incident, which is remarkable seeing that it took place in the out-back of the South West African border area. Mr and Mrs Pakes were then offered rail and meal warrants to travel at Defence Force expenses to Pretoria where their son had been transferred. There they were offered further assistance in the form of six days' free accommodation so that they could be with him. They have since returned to their Cowie's Hill home, informed, satisfied and assured that everything possible was being done for their son, who had been injured doing everything he could for them and his country.

Bravo elsewhere reports —

Mrs Pakes has since raised more than R1 000 for a fund to provide occupational therapy for injured white and coloured troops. Gary is making a fine recovery and is keen to get back to the border.

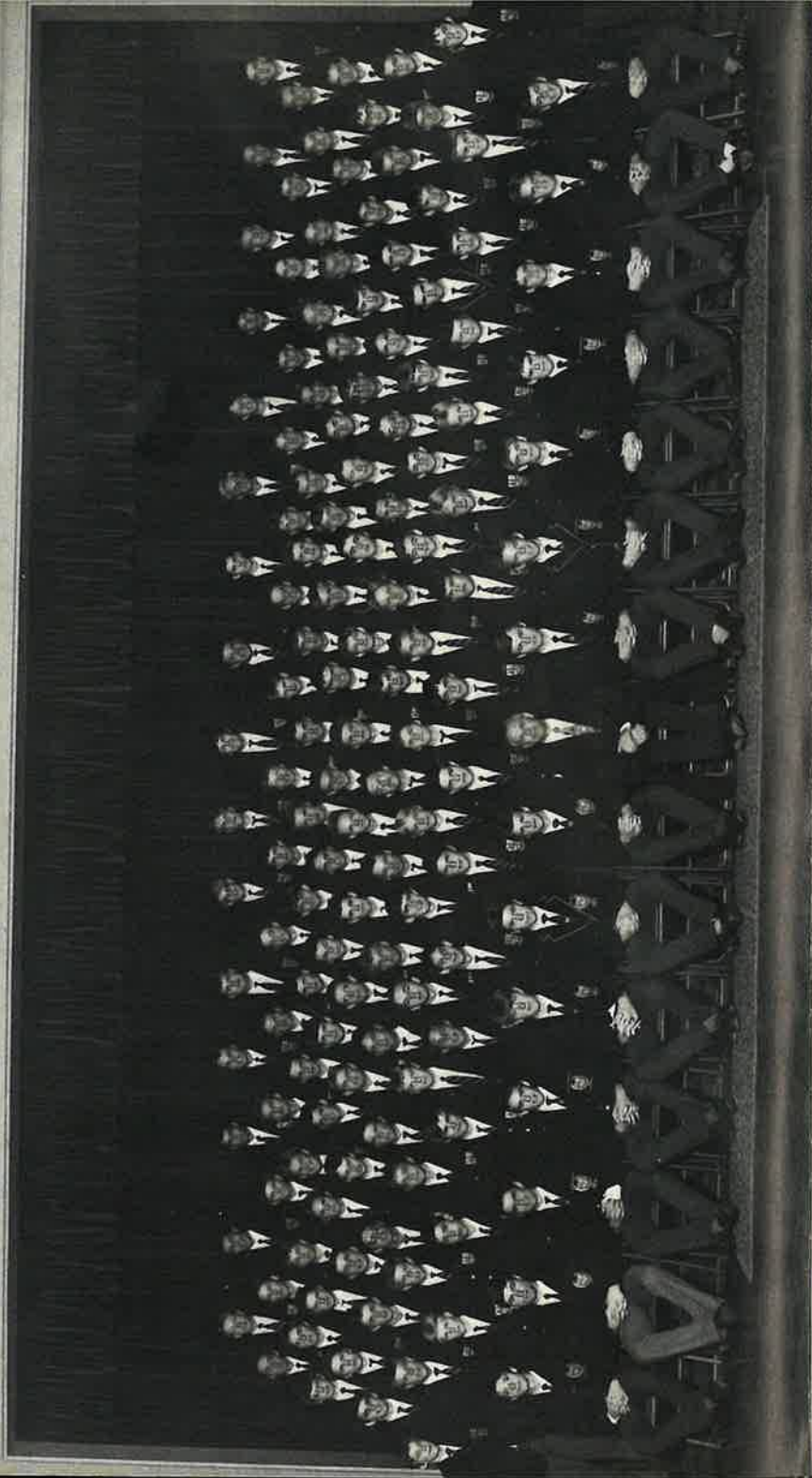

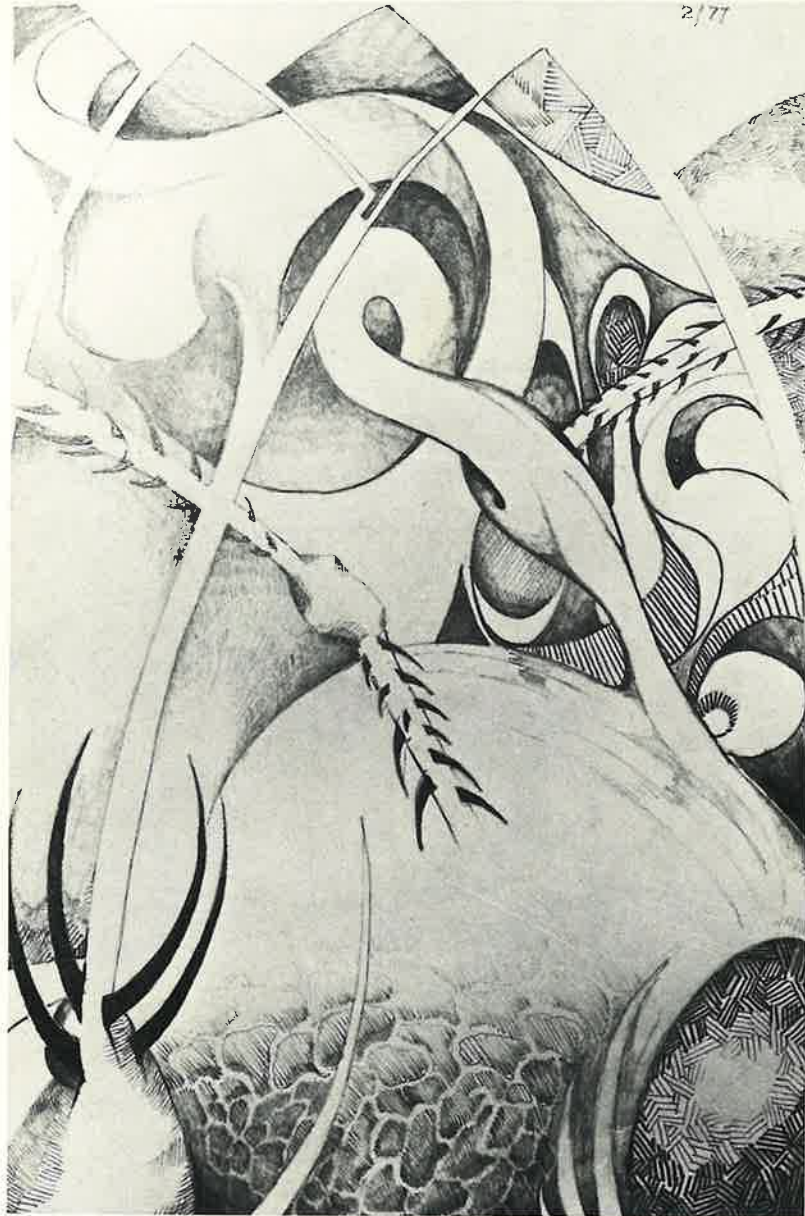
