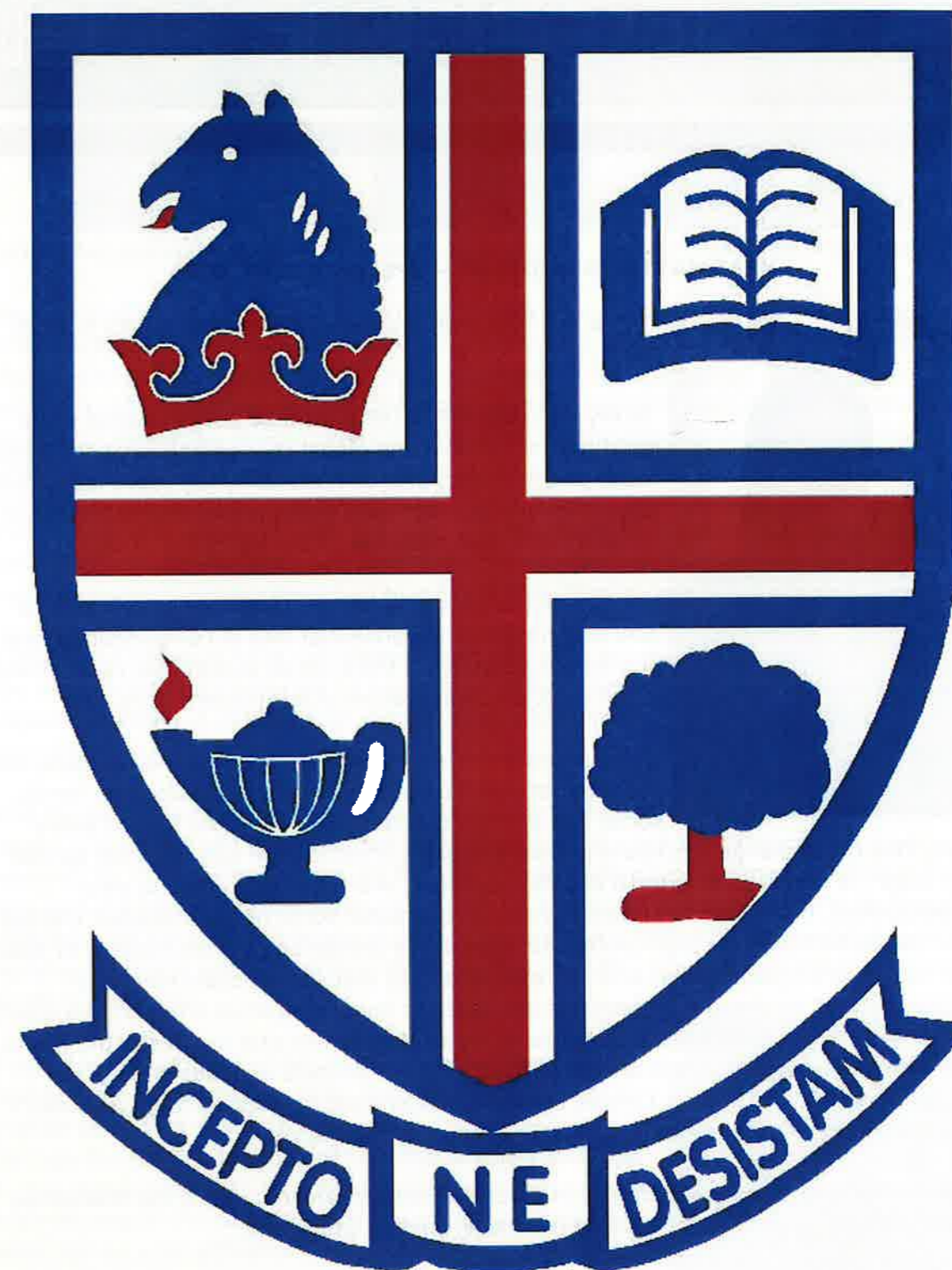

HEADMASTER'S ADDRESS – SPEECH NIGHT 2006



This is my 10th Headmaster's address at a WBHS Speech Night.

In my first address in 1997, I spoke about Change – the rapid rate of national and global change and what this would mean to the Matrics of that year. Now, ten years later, that topic is even more pertinent and it is one to which I return tonight in my final message to the Matrics of 2006.

I don't need to present a history lesson on how change is now occurring at an exponential rate in comparison to that of previous centuries. I think we all accept that rapid change is the most constant feature of our modern lives.

We appreciate this every time we open the newspapers, surf the internet or watch TV. Technological, biological, family, social and political changes stare us in the face at every

turn. This rapid change has had a profound positive effect on the way in which we live our lives – it may lead to growth and development, and may open doors to new opportunities. But it also has its negatives. Just consider some of the attitudes, choices and values portrayed by high-profile individuals who should be our role models, or even our friends or acquaintances, and you will appreciate that some people have not responded well to change. If change is perceived to have a negative effect on the quality of our lives, our natural tendency will be to try to cling to the past and resist the future. The major point is: Change is always with us, and our success depends on how we respond to it. This is a point I would like our Class of 2006 to consider very seriously – the manner in which you deal with future change will define you.

Philosopher and business organization theorist, Frederic Hudson, likens the change we are experiencing in the 21st century to a never-ending whitewater:

"We feel like we are on rafts floating down a commanding river, with each raft having a small mast and sail, a rudder, and some poles. Sometimes when it's calm, our journey is fairly effortless; we can move our rafts on an eddy near a meadow and camp for a while. At other times the whitewater tests every skill we have, as we slide over rocks and rapids and swirl about in unforeseen directions. The image of the river captures two qualities central to our experience of change: a sense of chaotic power beyond our control and a sense of never-ending adventure requiring our continual vigilance and readiness."



I trust that you will regard change as an adventure – one over which you have control.

We have had to deal with much change at WBHS. For example, we are now a school of 1150 learners, even though our classrooms were built for 850. We have had to build clauses into our code of conduct that we would never have dreamed of ten years ago, such as a cell-phone policy, HIV/AIDS policy and a plagiarism policy. We experienced change for the better in February this year when we moved into this new Multi-Purpose Centre which changed our campus forever. Some of the changes you might not have noticed, but as teachers we certainly did – over the years we have had to deal with the many legislative and curriculum changes. Significant technological changes five years ago, when you arrived here, are now taken for granted – you took that change in your stride, but your teachers have had to make a real effort to adapt.

Some of the changes have not always promoted what we stand for as a School. Crime has meant diverting resources to increase security. Lack of common understanding on values and ethics in dealing with modern issues has provided all of us with further challenges, and will continue to do so.

Who knows – maybe in ten years time Mrs Bircher will not be confiscating cell-phones in class – maybe she will be asking her class to please take out their cell-phones to do research for their Maths project. By then Mr Pierides will have become the School's full-time website journalist. Rev Miller might well be asking his class to submit their English homework on his world-wide portal. And, if we are really lucky, Dr Cowie might even be replying to emails without printing them out first, and Mrs Dovey might have learnt how to use a calculator.

I would like you to reflect on your own experiences with change over the past five years. Consider your attitude to change since that day when you walked tentatively through the front gates to confront your first day in Grade 8. Try also to predict the significant change that you will be experiencing in the next five years. How will you respond? What will be your attitude?

In America, Bill Cosby said recently: "Young boys are dropping out of high school, but they've memorized the lyrics of difficult rap songs, and they know how to braid each other's hair ... Never before has life been so perfect for you to take charge."

I trust that your changing conditions will motivate you and



provide you with a deep sense of purpose. I hope that you are more optimistic about your life prospects today than you were five years ago, and that you will be even more optimistic in five years' time – because your attitude and response to change will have a profound effect on the way in which your life will unfold. I trust that your time of change will be a time of opportunity.

Frederic Hudson says that you become your own story. In this epic story, you portray yourself through the way in which you live your life and interact with others. Up until now, the themes or 'plot' of your life story may have been determined by others – your parents, teachers, community or culture. Now, as your life story unfolds into a new chapter, you have the opportunity to become the author of your own script. By now you should also realize that your interaction with others is in effect a transaction – that what you give has an effect on what you get back. It's all about an attitude of mutual respect.

You can definitely determine the direction of your life. In fact, whether you have consciously realized it or not, you are constantly making changes to your life story through the deliberate choices you make. And those choices reflect your attitude.

Take a moment to ask yourself a few important questions. What is the current plot of my life story, and where is it leading? Am I deliberately or unconsciously influencing the outcome of this plot? How many roles do I play in this plot and how do I come across to the other characters in the plot? What do I like best about this plot, and what do I like least? What are the major turning points of my story and how did I change? And, what would be the title of my story should I choose to publish it?

The rules of dealing with change have themselves changed. Your parents and teachers might well have been encouraged by their parents to follow a linear approach – learn hard at school or university, get into a good career, stay there and retire with a good pension. The linear view was a very successful motivator for many centuries, but in an unpredictable and rapidly changing world it no longer applies.

And therein lies a challenge for you – how do you reinvent or renew yourself when circumstances change? How do you do this on your own terms with the right attitude in becoming a self-renewing individual?



The challenge is one of cyclical self-renewal in the many adult directions you might follow in future. The script of your life will contain periods of high energy and determining goals in the 'go for it' stage. In this stage, you are consciously and unconsciously inventing a new life chapter. At some stage, you might enter the doldrums, a period of constancy, but often of negativity. If you stay there too long, you will end up in a rut or lose direction. You must get out of this stage as quickly as possible. Your third stage will be

cocooning. This is a time of introspection and like the butterfly emerging from its cocoon, you have to discover and develop your new strengths yourself. No-one else can do it for you. You will then have new changes to deal with, new dreams and goals to fulfill, and you will enter a stage where you will be 'getting ready' for the next chapter of your life.

The current chapter is now coming to a close. I thank the Matrics of 2006 for their contributions over the past five years. Thank you to David Sweidan, as Head of School, and Clint Wreghitt, as LRC Chairman, for the mature and dignified manner in which you have led from the front. Thank you to the top academics, who we will be honouring tonight, for maintaining our high academic standards, to our leaders and our good solid citizens who we could rely on at all times, and to the sportsmen across the full range of sports, for the positive manner in which you competed. Your fine results, both inside and outside the classroom, speak for themselves.

I wish all of you the best in the exams which lie ahead – some of you, I know, need a lot more than wishes. I wish you well in dealing with the changes which lie ahead of you. Mark Twain once said: "Twenty years from now you may be more disappointed by the things you didn't do than the things you did. So throw off the bowlines, sail away from the safe harbour. Catch the trade winds in your sails. Explore. Dream."

And, in closing, there is one further point I hope you will never forget: It's all about attitude, and there is one thing you have to do before you can turn your dreams turn into reality – you simply have to wake up first.

MR STOKES' AND MRS DOVEY'S FINAL ASSEMBLY

Mr Stokes has given 27 years of his life to this School. Those boys who have been in his English classes will know that he is able to take the subject to a higher level and to inspire you in the process. He has earned the reputation as one of the truly great English teachers, but his role at WBHS has been so much wider than that.

Like Mrs Dovey, he did not teach his subject first, he taught his pupils first. If you were in his class, he would know what made you tick, and he would use that in engaging with you. You would always know that you could have a lively debate with Mr Stokes – and he would enjoy it. He would always be open to the OPV (other point of view). One of his maxims was that he was always prepared to be convinced by others that he might be wrong, and he expected others to have the same disposition towards him. Mr Stokes' influence on this school has been profound. As a teacher, then an HOD, and in the last 10 years as the Senior Deputy, Mr Stokes' influence has touched almost every activity in the school.

His role helped us gain the reputation as the best academic boys' school in the country and he made us believe in ourselves in reaching that pinnacle. He has coached almost every sport in the school, and in recent years he took our golf to unprecedented heights, and his influence in swimming was also significant, which led to our winning major galas over the past two years.

Mr Stokes has thought long and hard about how to make our campus a better place. He is responsible for planting 62 of the trees that you see around us. He was instrumental in conceptualising the school library, and he had a big influence in the design of the Multi-Purpose Centre.

He thought about the systems which we have in place here. In our organisation structures, our policies, code of conduct, and the general way we do things here, Mr Stokes' influence is felt.

As Deputy Principal, Mr Stokes has had to make several unpopular decisions. But he is a man of principle and this gave him the strength and resilience to carry a decision through if it was justified. In fact if you wanted something done, you could allocate it to Mr Stokes and you would know it would happen.

I truly value his role as a Deputy Principal, because I know that he had the ability to ask the provocative question, to force us to take a good look at ourselves. This all resulted in better decision-making which has brought us where we are today.

So for me, I am absolutely convinced that the word "icon" fits both Mrs Dovey and Mr Stokes admirably. They are truly what teaching is all about:

*genuine interest in their pupils
strength of character
resilience and fortitude in completing every task in the interest of their pupils and the school
searching for solutions not problems.*

There is no doubt that the profession will be poorer without them.

When they started out in teaching almost 40 years ago, they must have had some objectives in mind, which expanded over time. Both of them retire now with the knowledge that they have achieved absolutely everything in teaching that they consciously or unconsciously set out to do. Both of them have made WBHS a better place.

MR STOKES' ADDRESS TO SCHOOL



As I stand before you this morning for the last time I am conscious of how privileged I have been in spending such a large part of my life teaching here. Looking at the sea of young faces in front of me the realization of being part of a continuum, a long tradition in this school is brought home. Although there are not many in the audience who I taught this year, in the faces I recognize elder brothers, uncles and fathers from past years that have made up this continuum of our school's life.

It's quite difficult addressing a hall of pupils and saying goodbye as a teacher after 35 years, not so much because of the emotions attached to the occasion, but because you are pretty sure that most of the boys seated in front of you are a lot more anxious to get out of here and enjoy the holidays than to listen to some crustaceous cretin rabbiting on about his memories of this wonderful school

he is eventually leaving. So taking that into account I'm going to summarize for you what I have learnt over the past 35 years as a teacher...

...and I suppose the most obvious thing is that the things you learn at school are really not that important. Geography and Maths and English and sports matches and assemblies are merely "processes" to get you, as I see it, to understand three lessons about life: three words passion, commitment, love.

The first is to appreciate the gift of mortal life. Enjoy this gift. Live life passionately, enthusiastically, optimistically. Bob Marley's famous lines "Live the life you love, love the life you live" urges you not to sit on the shores of life and time, but to swim energetically in its rushing currents.

The second is about defining who you are, what is important to you. The things you hold as important in other words: a faith, or moral code or set of principles. This is important because all of us, as thinking entities, describe ourselves in terms of this moral code, and are judged by others in terms of it. So the second lesson is about commitment to your principles.

The final lesson is about our value as humans. At the end of the line our value as a person is measured not in terms of wealth accumulated or power attained, but in terms of our humanity: our compassion for those that suffer, our selflessness in service, our contribution to the welfare of those around us.

So three simple words: passion, commitment, love. If you get that, the rest is just "process."

16 years ago she came into the school fortuitously when an Afrikaans teacher left. Since that day we have come to know her as the life and soul of the School – it is seldom that you come across someone with such an obvious love for life, someone who always looks for the positives and it is this positive approach that earned her such positive responses from others around her – pupils, parents and teachers.

Mrs Dovey does not teach her subject – she teaches her pupils. Those of you who have had the privilege of being in her classes will know that she really knew all her pupils in an holistic sense, not just what was evident in the classroom or in the work submitted. In dealing with her pupils she was able to see through all the angst, the insecurities and everything else that goes on in a pupil's mind – that is what made her such an effective teacher.



She would watch you play sport, get excited when U14A beat Maritzburg College; she would watch you perform in the school plays; she would be the loudest supporter from the sidelines, and she was even known to fling herself into the pool when we won a big gala.

I remember a couple of times when she went into hospital to rectify injuries or when she was seriously ill several years ago. In fact Mrs Dovey has the record for the most number of injuries on duty at school – I think she has a couple of steel parts in her body and I believe she sets off the security alarms at airports. But the point I want to make is that she always bounced back so quickly from illness or injury because Mrs Dovey always wanted to be in the classroom. That is very special, and I know all her pupils appreciated that special quality.

OPENING OF THE MULTI PURPOSE CENTRE



There are a few significant milestones in the history of the Westville Boys' High campus, and this is certainly one of them.

The completion of this magnificent Multi-Purpose Centre has added a major new dimension to our School, and it enables us to take to another level our time-honoured mission of delivering quality holistic education to all boys in the School.

This project has been on the table since 1988, when a previous Headmaster, Roy Couzens, and the Governing Body and Educational Trust of the time, developed proposals for construction in the area of the change-rooms near the swimming pool. The cost estimates obtained on that occasion amounted to R880 000, a considerable amount in those times but small in relation to today's costs. Constant lack of funding opportunities over the following years meant that the idea never came to fruition – until now, that is.

If anyone had told me then that by 2006 we would be holding this event in a facility such as this tonight, I would never have believed them. I would like to pay tribute to one person here tonight for making the idea happen, and to a number of others for turning the idea into reality.

Neil Nothard has served on the School's Governing Body and Finance Committee for several years. Neil believes passionately in the quality of education that this School offers, and it was his positive attitude that kept reminding us to keep our eye on the big objective. Neil's persistence and his refusal to admit defeat finally enabled us to get our foot in the door of the benefactor we had always been looking for.

There is an erroneous perception in this country that public schools such as ours do not require funding from the private sector. In reality, the situation has swung considerably. From the position in the 1980's of receiving almost 100% of our operational and developmental requirements from the State, we are now in the position where parents are responsible for covering approximately 80%. In fact, the last major project in this School for which State contributions were obtained was in 1974.

Neil was crucial in helping us to set the record straight, and he found a donor who was willing to listen to our story. In doing our presentation jointly with Neil, we were humbled by the true sense of benevolence we encountered from our potential donor. I will never forget the day, when Neil phoned me to say that our appeal had been successful to the tune of R6m. To our donor, who insists on remaining anonymous, I



express the sincere and extreme gratitude of the School, and I assure you that your investment and confidence in us will reap considerable dividends for the youth of the Westville community.

This is the latest in the list of defining moments in the history of our School campus. The first occurred in 1941 when the Bernard family generously bequeathed a farmhouse and 6 acres of land to the people of Westville for educational purposes.



All developments up to 1974 were by courtesy of the Government of the day. 1949 saw the construction of the first block of classrooms, The School got its first Science laboratory in 1957 and shortly thereafter work began on what is now known as Bowdens Field. The history books reveal that, in true government style, the Provincial Building Services provided two bulldozers but only one operator – the lone operator took 12 months to level the field and a further period of many months elapsed before the surface was grassed and ready for use. Having learnt from that experience, a private contractor was

expeditiously called in two years later to level Commons Field and the pastoral scene, with cows grazing in the school precincts was lost forever.

Mr Commons reported in his year-end Headmaster's speech: "1963 saw the completion of a project which the School has long awaited and the lack of which our past students have felt grievously. I refer, of course, to the School Hall. The Hall has been in construction for a long time – considerably more than a year – but has been well worth waiting for." Those words could equally apply to our MPC today.

In 1971 building additions amounted to more than half a million rands and were again funded by the State and in 1974, the State came to the party for the last time when they funded half the cost of our existing swimming pool. Ever since then, the burden of developing the campus has fallen firmly on the shoulders of our parents and donors.

The foundations for the modern era were set by Roy Couzens when he formed the WBH Educational Trust and voluntary donations mainly from our parents have enabled us to develop the campus in line with our ever-changing needs. With the help of the Trust, my predecessor, Ted Maddams, ensured the development of the Computer Centres and the Media Centre which have been crucial to us in delivering the curriculum of the information era.

The last decade has seen significant technological, social, legislative and political change on a global scale and it has been necessary for the School to keep ahead of those changes in order to retain its place as an educational leader, and to meet the aspirations of the community.

We have been at the forefront of the curriculum change that is currently occurring, and we understand that our boys now require different and more advanced skills to cope with and succeed in this challenging and changing world. Rather than internalizing a body of knowledge, our boys now need communication skills, IT skills, teamwork skills, problem-solving skills, and they need to adopt an approach of lifelong learning and ethical and critical thinking to deal with ever-changing circumstances. They also need to adopt healthy and



enriching lifestyles in countering many of the negative forces at play in modern times, and the roles played by Sport and our Co-curricular programme are crucial in helping them do this.

This is why the Multi-Purpose Centre is so vital to our needs. The intention is for this centre to be truly multi-purpose and to help us cater for a growing school population which now stands at 1180 boys. In 1998, WBHS was the first school in this province to introduce a Sport academy which integrated compulsory sport into our curriculum and timetable, but we did this with the limited resources at our disposal. We were ahead of our time because now the new curriculum includes many aspects of the mission of our Sports Academy and this centre will enable us to deliver Life Orientation to 250 boys simultaneously. We also look forward to the Dramatic and Musical performances that will be presented here. Added benefits are that this centre can hold assemblies of the entire School together, and can cater for prize-givings for all our top academic learners.



I would like to insert a short word about the Solitaire Bell, as many old boys might regard it as sacrilegious that it has been moved from its previous site. In fact, the Solitaire Bell has moved around the campus a few times in its lifetime since 1957. I believe its early positions were somewhere in the Bernard Quad and then subsequently near the existing foyer of the School. By the 1970's its position had moved to the point overlooking what was known as "Growler's Patch", but the construction of the Science wing

and the swimming pool in the early 1970's enforced another move, this time to the area outside the hall. The Bell has become an important part of our tradition, with each Westville boy ringing it for the one and only time in his high school career at the Matric farewell and prize-giving. Those events will be held in this centre in future, hence the decision to incorporate the Bell into the Multi-Purpose Centre.

The magnificent structure you see here tonight is the result of the hard work and sacrifices of the most competent men who served on our project team: Project manager Peter Dixon, architect Bruce Douglas, structural engineer Tony Castleden, electrical engineer Eddie Krause, and quantity surveyors Albert Lourens and Reggie Haripersad. At all times, they placed our needs first, and the time, effort and energy that they willingly devoted to this project every day over the past 12 months is sincerely appreciated. I also thank our construction company, Reed Simpson, headed by Ian Simpson and Harry Reed, for the professionalism of their work and their attention to detail.

In closing, we realize that we cannot sit back complacently and hope to think that we have accomplished everything. The Master Plan is still on the table, and we realize that future objectives will include conversion of the old Hall into a Drama and Music centre, while classroom upgrades, IT upgrades, improved traffic flow, an aquatics centre and a shared Astroturf are still part of the big plan. These, of course, depend on funds, and we need to keep looking for major benefactors.

Roy Couzens often referred to WBH as a 'damn fine institution'. Since the bequest of the Bernard farm in 1941, the foundations of this great institution have been continually strengthened and developed. Our mission has always been 'educational excellence' and we aim to continue in that tradition.

"THE MIDDLE LINE"

We recognise that every pupil is a complex and variously talented individual in his own right and at Westville Boys' High we strive to recognise the special needs and potential of each individual to enable him to develop his unique ability. Each boy is guided and counselled by a team of skilled teachers and mentors who are aware of the demands of adolescence, and who accommodate individual needs in an enlightened and caring way. At Westville Boys' High we are acutely aware of our responsibility to our pupils and to their parents, and the School is committed to providing a support framework for each of its pupils. Pupils who experience personal or home problems are counselled and parents are consulted where there are adjustment problems or where their sons are underachieving.

It is our aim to ensure that every student in the School is happy to be here and that each boy enjoys every day that he spends at WBHS. With respect for the happiness and contentment of the individual being central to our educational philosophy, comes the awareness of the individual's responsibilities:

- to others
- to school
- to family, and
- to the society we serve.

Westville boys are brought to the realisation that they are part of a wider community that shares a common humanity. Our emphasis is on trust and the nurturing of self-discipline and a healthy respect for others within the school community.

We are faced with a world where companies employ at senior management level, men and women as Directors of Ethics, whose responsibility it is to monitor practices within the business to ensure that the business does not fall foul of the law. This has become necessary simply because people have become wholly focused on making money and on material values, and have lost all sense of what is ethical. And I believe that most parents don't want their children to accept such values as the only norms of the modern world.



Parents choose to send their sons to WBHS because they want them to get a values education as well as an academic grounding and an exposure to the enjoyment of sport. It is no longer sufficient for us as teachers to see our role and focus as one of imparting

academic content and sporting skills. The onus now falls on the teacher as mentor to instil in our pupils the values and ethics that are pertinent to our 21st century lifestyle. And not simply to teach our children about values and ethics, but to reinforce and practice these values, ethics and norms in everything that we do at this School.

An education system that does not concern itself with ethics and moral values is not serving the needs of our young democracy. In fact an education system that fails to ask why there is such a scarcity of moral champions in the world today is contributing nothing to the ethics of society as a whole.



There is no doubt in my mind that these expectations rank highly amongst the reasons why people send their sons here, and our responsibility as a School in delivering in this area is great. There is a belief that, in addition to all the critical ingredients of an excellent and balanced education, schools like Westville create in their pupils a sense of:

- good citizenship
- common decency, and
- a lifestyle that is moral and ethical.

In keeping with this mission of developing the whole individual and of empowering each individual student to make a positive contribution to the betterment of the School and of society in general our emphasis must continue to be on service.

KZN SENIOR CERTIFICATE RESULTS

Congratulations to our 2006 Matric group of 196 boys and their teachers on their fine results, which set new records for the School:

A-aggregates were achieved by 56 boys (29% of the group)
Matric-exemption rate was 97%, arguably the highest in SA amongst boys' high schools.
Merit passes (C-aggregates and above) were achieved by 165 boys (84% of the group).
15 boys achieved at least six distinctions
The 303 Higher Grade subject distinctions exceeded our expectations.

"Like mine," he said. "Like mine,"

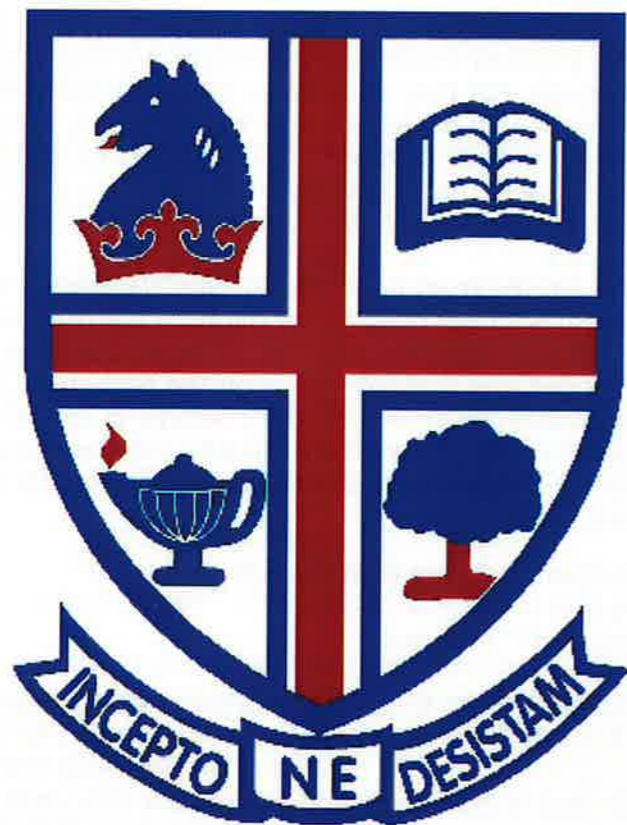
I tried to listen. I tried to stop crying, but I couldn't. Dad didn't even notice.

- 400m freestyle 5th.

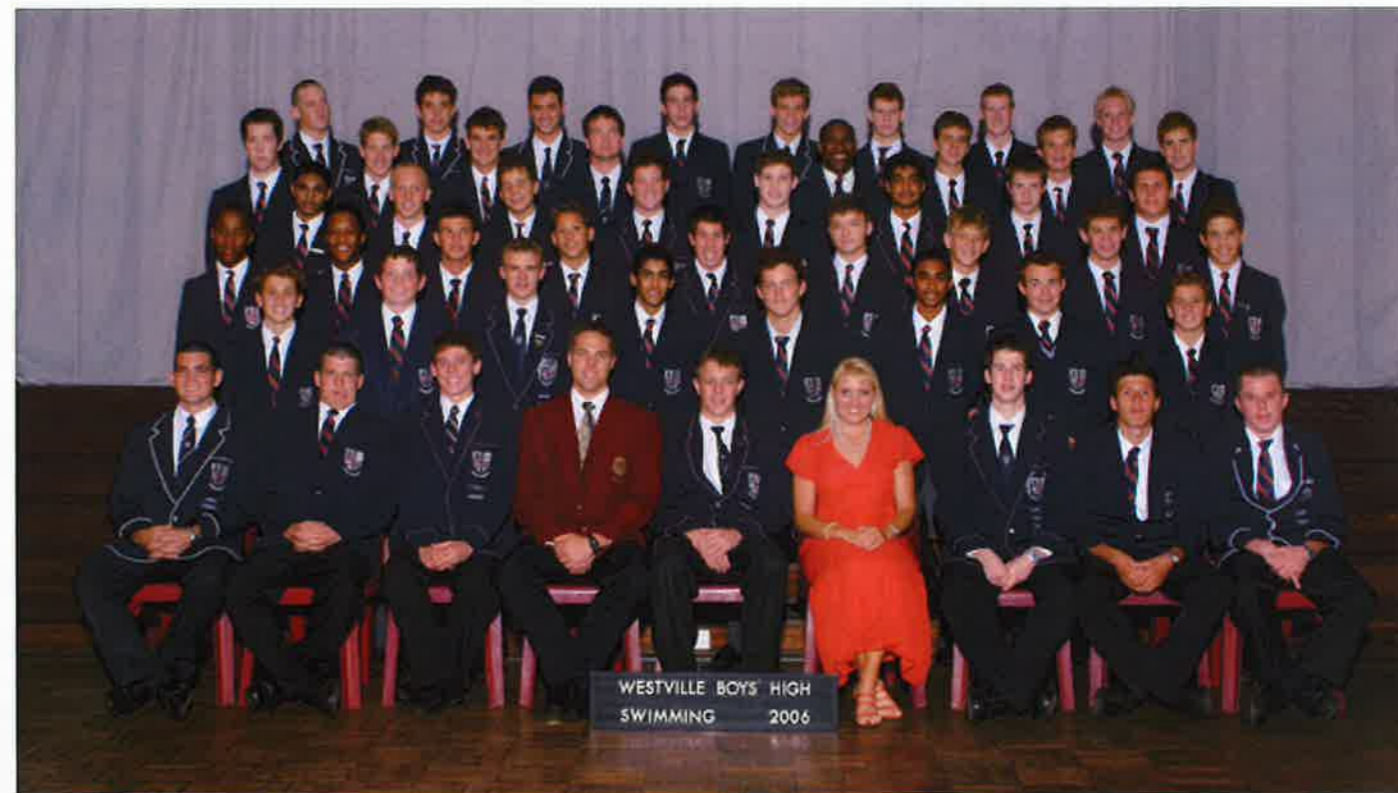
